HELPING IN THE PSYCHOLOGY DEPARTMENT

A substantial research project, examining the processes involved in helping and being helped is in its second year. The project which is currently funded by a University Research Grant, is conducted by Associate Professor Linda Viney, Dr. Rachael Henry and Dr. Beverly Walker. The initial aim is to develop a model depicting the various aspects of the help giving/help getting relationship. Following the trialing phase, it is hoped the model can be tested out in the various real life helping professions. An ARGS submission has been prepared, which if fruitful will assist in realizing this goal.

At present the Department is seeking assistance from people who could devote a few hours to enable data collection. All information is confidential and respondents are primarily asked to retell some experiences where they have helped somebody or received help from someone. While we are looking for subjects of all ages, we are finding it most difficult to locate subjects in the 15-18, 30-50 and 60-80 age ranges. Should you

COMMISSION FOR THE FUTURE

The appointment of Mr. Phillip Adams as the Chairman of the newly established Commission for the Future has been announced by the Minister for Science, Mr. Barry Jones.

Mr. Adams is Chairman of the Australian Film Commission, a film maker, advertising director, author and columnist.

'He is a genius as a publicist and communicator. Mr. Adams' gifts as a controversialist will assist the Commission to stimulate widespread public debate,' Mr. Jones said.

*Professor Leonie Sandercock, Professor of Urban Studies at Macquarie University. Professor Sandercock is also the Chair of the National Research Fellowship Advisory Committee.

'Commission members represent an unusually strong combination of skills and experience,' Mr. Jones said.

'The aim of the Commission for the Future is to focus on and inform Australians about the options each of us will have to choose about the future. In a period of almost unprecedented technological change many people feel confused and alienated.

'Our new technological environment makes many people feel powerless. If we cannot understand the opportunities, and the threats, how can we make effective choices for ourselves or democratic decisions as a community?'

'The Commission will not be a policy making body, nor will it be advising government, at least not directly,' the Minister said.

'Its work will be addressed to the community at large. We hope that the media, schools, local government, unions and business will use the Commission as a valuable resource.'

'Discussion papers and audio-visual material will be published by the Commission as a means of stimulating public debate. It will also promote seminars and discussions, especially in areas particularly threatened by change.'

'The Commission for the Future will not be pushing a line. Its emphasis will be on explaining future scenarios, pointing out the range of options opened by new technology and then saying to the people of the community: "You must choose for yourselves," said Mr. Jones.

'It is essential that individuals feel able to exercise meaningful choices about careers, working life, appropriate and relevant education, use of leisure time and all related matters.'

'I am confident the Commission will achieve its aims and restore power to the powerless, reduce apprehension about the future and add to the nation's strength,' Mr. Jones said.

'Finally, I am delighted that the Commission for the Future, like the Human Rights Commission, is one of the first bodies of this kind in which the majority of members are women.'

Dear Editor,

On 4th November, 1983, Campus News published a letter from me on the naming of the Nepean River. As the letter made plain, it was not a product of research but of idle reflection on a drive back to Wollongong from the hospitable ward room of H.M.A.S. Creswell. Shortly afterwards I proceeded on study leave and became immersed in British painters of the late eighteenth century.

Returning from leave, I had occasion to investigate the career of the Scottish painter Thomas Watling, a convict whose painting of Sydney in 1794 is in the Mitchell Library. In the course of this investigation, I inadvertently found that my assumption that the Nepean River owed its name to Evan Nepean was contradicted by Tench. Captain Watkin Tench discovered the river in June, 1789, and his record of the discovery is the first account of Australian land exploration. According to Tench, the river was named by Governor Phillip after Captain Nicholas Nepean of the N.S.W. Corps, the younger brother of Evan Nepean.

So much, it would seem, for idle reflection. However, I suspect Tench was mistaken. The year before Tench's discovery, King, en route to Norfolk Island, had named a small island off its southern coast 'after Evan Nepean',

as his journal informs us. Phillip, for his part, was despatching reports and solicitations to Evan Nepean in London. It is possible that Phillip gave Tench to understand that he had named the river after the Captain in the N.S.W. Corps rather than after the Captain in the Marines who discovered it, but he would not have so honoured Nicholas Nepean if he had not been related to the villainous bureaucrat. After whom, then, was Philip really naming the river when he called it the Nepean? Whatever Tench or Nicholas Nepean may have been led to believe, the Governor was complimenting Evan Nepean.

I trust that you will be permitted to publish this letter, even though some of my letters and all of my cartoons are now banned from Campus News.

Dear Friend,

As you would know 1985 is International Youth Year, a major function of which is The 12th World Festival of Youth and Students, to be held this year in Moscow. Between the 27th of July and the 3rd of August somewhere in the vicinity of 40,000 young people will gather to discuss matters relating to the youth of today.

The International Preparatory Committee has advised the Australian National Organising body for the festival that 50 places are available for the Australian delegation. The Wollongong committee has been advised that a number of positions will be available for delegates from this area.

It is for this reason that we are contacting youth organisations and individuals involved with youth in this area, to announce that the committee is now taking nominations for delegates to participate in the Festival as a member of the Australian delegation.

The delegation will leave Australia on approximately the 20th of July and return 3 weeks later. It is hoped that after the Festival ends the delegation will be able to do a tour of some parts of the U.S.S.R. The committee has been advised that the cost per delegate is \$2,000 which covers return airfare and board and all meals. This amount is the responsibility of the delegate or their organisation, but it should be noted that the committee will do everything possible to assist a delegate to raise their fee.
