UNIADVICE NEGOTIATES RESEARCH SCHEME

Professor Ken McKinnon, Vice-Chancellor of the Unversity of Wollongong, and Mr Malcolm Booth, General Manager of Metal Manufactures Limited, have signed a formal acceptance of one of the first Teaching Company Scheme grants awarded in Australia by the Department of Industry, Technology and Commerce.

The Teaching Company Scheme aims to encourage the development of a lasting Research and Development relationship of mutual benefit to companies and institutions and generally stimulate the flow of technology required for the development of Australian industry.

The arrangements will allow for up to \$90,000 for research into Computer-assisted Quality Control Monitoring Systems, and will be jointly funded by the Department of Industry, Technology and Commerce and Metal Manufactures Limited.

The scheme offers the unique opportunity for research by industry at both the company facilities and the University. An electrical engineer will be appointed under these arrangements for two years, with an optional third year to conduct research into the subject area. The Scheme is a pilot program operating successfully in the United Kingdom. The University of Wollongong has managed to obtain approval to operate the Scheme under the newly introduced arrangements for Australia.

Uniadvice, using industry contacts, negotiated the arrangements with the Department of Industry, Technology and Commerce and the other parties. It is hoped that similar arrangements can be made with other University departments in time for the next round of applications.

NURSING AT THE WOLLONGONG HOSPITAL 1926 – 1982

That is the title of a book by Josephine Castle of the Department of History in the University. The book was presented to the nurses at a special ceremony in the hospital boardroom on June 4.

The book begins with an account of the development of the Hospital and the region it serves, linking the growth of the hospital with the economic growth of the steel and coal industries. The book then examines all aspects of the training at The Wollongong Hospital, from living-in to the work process in the wards. It deals with changes in the academic training from the days of lectures by Matron and local General Practitioners to the days of specialised Nurse Educators, Preliminary Training Schools and 'Blocks' down to the phasing out of hospital-based training in 1982.

The book is intended as a record of the Official Training School, based at the Hospital from 1926 to 1982. It has been written mainly from oral interviews with nurses whose time at the Hospital spanned the years between 1925 to 1982. Using the oral and written testimony of nurses themselves the book looks at the work of nurses, showing how it changed over time in response to changes in medical knowledge and practice and to changes in government funding in the past sixty years.

Nursing at The Wollongong Hospital is one of the publications marking the sesquicentenary of the city of Wollongong.

AUSTRALIA IN TRANSITION

A new book, for which Dr Philip R. de Lacey was one of three co-authors, is to be published in August. Entitled Australia in Transition and sub-titled Culture and Life. Possibilities the book looks at ethnic groupings in Australia. There are over 100 ethnic groups in this country, ranging from a few individuals to several thousand. The book inquires into issues and processes which affect them all. It first looks at the changing pattern of Australian society, plotting the shift from monoculturalism to pluralism and raising issues of life chances and opportunities. The second section focuses on issues of sociocultural adaptation and conflict and processes of adaptation. The third section examines more closely the family, social and cultural environments, which help construct possibilities and preferred options for various ethnic groups. The fourth and final section deals with major social questions of participation and equity in areas such as the maintenance of cultures and the emergence of a national culture, political partisanship and government policies directed towards access and participation.

The theme of commonality as well as diversity emerges from the sections, as does a picture of change. Australia currently faces the prospect of increased fragmentation through the maintenance of numerous diverse cultures or the emergence of a new national culture which incorporates aspects of various cultures but develops its own uniqueness.

The book is suitable for lay readers, undergraduate and postgraduate students. The philosophical perspectives it presents are diverse and cover a spectrum of those wanting to return to a more multicultural society to those advocating more cultural maintenance or the emergence of a new culture.

The other two authors are M.E. Poole of Macquarie University and B.S. Randhawa of the University of Saskatchewan, Saskatoon, Canada.

The book will be published by the Harcourt Brace Jovanovich Group in Australia. It runs to approximately 300 pages.

THE N.S.W. INSTITUTE FOR EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH

FACULTY OF EDUCATION ESTABLISHES A UNIT FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

A new Unit for Special Education has been established within the Faculty of Education's Centre for Policy Studies in Education. Headed by Dr Lyn Gow, this Unit will provide a consultative service in the Illawarra Region for disabled people, their advocates, parents and educators.

One of the first activities of the Unit for Special Education was to invite Dr Gillian Turner from the Prince of Wales Hospital to address a group of professionals working in the area of developmental disabilities from as far afield as Goulburn. Dr Turner is a world expert on "Fragile X" - a newly found syndrome accounting for three per cent of intellectual disability - who has a major research grant to continue her important preventative work in identifying intellectually disabled expressers and carriers of this syndrome.

The Unit has also been approached by TAFE Consultant for the Disabled, Illawarra, to develop a staff training program for TAFE teachers of Basic Education to provide them with advanced teaching skills to more efficiently cater for their disabled students.

YEAR 12 HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS TO VISIT THE UNIVERSITY

The University of Wollongong held its Year 12 Introduction Days on June 12 and 14.

Year 12 students from throughout the Illawarra and neighbouring regions were given the opportunity to view the campus and learn as much as they could of the University and its offerings.

The day began at 9.30 am and consisted of five sessions - each one hour long.

HSC candidates were able to hear introductory lectures, go on tours, watch demonstrations, view videos and operate computer terminals.

They also had the opportunity to ask questions of members of academic staff.

Many young people in the past have found the day useful in helping decide their future career paths.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR OCEANOGRAPHIC RESEARCH

Ship Time on RV Franklin

RV FRANKLIN is a 55 metre oceanographic research vessel operated by the CSIRO Division of Oceanography as a National Facility. Proposals are invited from individuals or research teams for projects to be included in the cruise schedule for 1987.

Ancillary (piggy back) projects of a minor nature, not cruise determining, may be considered at any time and may be accommodated provided that time and space are available.

Area of Operation:

For logistic reasons the Steering Committee has fixed the general geographic area of operation of the vessel two years ahead. For 1987 the area of operation will be off the Australian west coast (Fremantle to North West Shelf). The vessel will leave north western Australian waters at the end of 1987 and proceed via Torres Strait and northern seas for operation in the latter part of 1988 in the south Tasman Sea.

Areas of operation for subsequent years are notional and subject to proposals received. As a guide the Steering Committee has nominated southern Australian waters extending into southern Tasman Seas for 1989 and for 1990 southern Australasian waters. Expressions of interest in proposed cruise areas for 1988-90 are invited at any time and will contribute to long term planning.

THE BRIDGE WILL OPEN ON THE FOURTH OF JULY

It's not every fourth of July when there's a reason to kick up your heels in Wollongong. But this fourth of July there will be people coming from all over the place, and a lot of Wollongong people heading for the unlikely mecca of Coniston to engage in right royal activities of the celebratory kind. They'll be going to the greatest Opening Night ever held in Wollongong: the opening of Theatre South's new home, THE BRIDGE THEATRE.

In what seems to be a miraculously short time, Theatre South have made a theatre out of a hall, and, on the fourth of July, Wollongong, Theatre South sponsors and supporters from far and wide, and Wollongong and Sydney press will sit down in the theatre for the first time and see a play.

Like the Opening Night, the play will be very special. It's a new play, Say Goodbye to the Past, written for

the opening by Wollongong playwright, Bill Neskovski. Nevskovski is one of Australia's most promising young playwrights and has already had a play workshopped and very favourably received at the National Playwrights' Conference in Canberra, the annual gathering of Australian playwrights, actors, directors and working professionals in the theatre.

Say Goodbye to the Past (a title not without significance for this theatre company, until recently without a home) is a very moving, very funny play set in a suburban Port Kembla home. Its main character, Ilinka, is a Macedonian woman of 65. She's raised two children in Australia, and her husband has died. Her children have left home. Her son, Sasho has done the unforgivable thing: he's married a "kangaroo".

In her youth, Ilinka was a very good actress in her homeland, Macedonia. Her husband, Dimce, was also an actor, and when he pays his frequent "visits" to her during the play, they act out scenes from their former triumphs. Dimce's "visits" (in his wife's memory) represent some of the comic highlights of the play. The scenes with her son are also delightfully comic, in the "Mother and Son" vein.

Say Goodbye to the Past, says director Des Davis, is a an exciting new play. "You don't often see a new play so well-finished when it goes into its first rehearsal", he said. "This is a beautifully-written piece of theatre, which can't fail to touch the audience."

Ilinka is played by Faye Montgomery, well-known to Theatre South audiences for her many excellent performances in their productions. Dimce is played by David Ives, who played various roles in Theatre South's recent production, And Tonight we Anchor in Twofold Bay. Craig Pearce, a new member of Theatre South's company, will play Sasho. Craig is a recent graduate of the National Institute of Dramatic Art, and plays Greg in Theatre South's Pressure Points.

Say Goodbye to the Past is designed by Cliff Kelsall, Theatre South's production manager, who also designed the BRIDGE THEATRE. He will have two reasons to celebrate July 4th.

1985 THE YEAR OF YOUTH — "YOUNG ARTISTS OF PROMISE"

A free public exhibition of drawings by children and students

It is singularly appropriate in this Year of Youth that an Australian University is promoting an exhibition of drawings titled "Young Artists of Promise". Selected drawings cover an age range from Pre Primary, Primary, Secondary to Tertiary Education.

These young artists are currently studying in either Schools, Colleges or University in the Illawarra region or Sydney.

In a single exhibition space it is possible to enjoy, compare and evaluate drawings done by very young children through to adult tertiary students. Thus the exhibition gives emphasis to drawing as a visual language - an international language. We would have to be specialist scholars to understand ancient foreign texts such as the 'Dead Sea Scrolls' or ancient Egyptian writing. Yet we can comprehend, appreciate and enjoy drawings made by our distant forebears who lived sixteen thousand or more years ago, and drew on cave walls such as Lascaux in Southern France.

It could also be argued that never was there more need for educational establishments to cultivate the creative side of the young who live in a world full of changes; facing as they do the potential horrors of nuclear holocaust; the ever rising world population and the inability of human beings to organise their affairs to prevent acute hunger, indeed famine, now widespread in certain regions of the world. Perhaps less dramatically but no less importantly is the need to ensure that living in city complexes does not blight or diminish the human spirit but enriches it.

In this context this exhibition is one to be enjoyed but it has an underlying seriousness of purpose. Not least in the continuing validity and worth of drawing as an essential discipline in training young children and students.

ROYAL SOCIETY OF VICTORIA MEDAL

In its Centenary Year 1959 the Royal Society of Victoria instituted a Medal for Scientific Research. The award consists of a silver medal, which will be awarded annually for scientific research in one of the following four categories:-

- A. Biological Sciences Agriculture, Biochemistry, Botany, Forestry, Physiology, Zoology and related sciences.
- B. Earth Sciences Geology, Geochemistry, Geochronology, Geophysics, Planetary Physics, Meteorology, Oceanography, Physical Geography and related sciences.
- C. Physical Sciences Astronomy, Chemistry, Engineering, Mathematics, Physics and related sciences.
- D. Social Sciences Anthroplogy, Archaeology, Economics, Human Geography, Psychology, Sociology and related sciences.

The work shall be carried out in Australia (including the territories) or on Australia, with preference for work done in Victoria, or on Victoria.

Scientific Societies, Universities, C.S.I.R.O. and members of the Royal Society of Victoria have the right to make nominations, though the Council need not be limited by these nominations. No posthumous award will be made, and, in any one year, if no nominee of sufficient merit is presented, no award need be made. The person/s

receiving the award may be required to address the society, in which case expenses shall be allowed.

In order to assist the Adjudicating Committee, the Society requires that each sponsor supplies a written statement as to why he/she believes that the candidate is worthy of the Medal.

THE TWENTY—THIRD AWARD will be made for work falling in "C" CATEGORY, this work to have been published during the six years from 1 January, 1979, to 31 December, 1984. Nominations should be in the hands of the Honorary Secretary not later than 30 September 1985.

Forthcoming Awards will be made as follows:

Twenty-third - Category 'C' - Work published between 1st January 1979 - 31st December 1984 - Closing date 30th September, 1985.

Twenty-fourth - Category 'A' - Work published between 1st January 1980 - 31st December 1985 - Closing date 30th September, 1986.

Twenty-fifth - Category 'B' - Work published between 1st January 1981 - 31st December 1986 - Closing date 30th September, 1987.

Twenty-Sixth - Category 'D' - Work published between 1st January 1982 - 31st December 1987 - Closing date 30th September, 1988.

Nominations should be made to the Honorary Secretary of the Royal Society of Victoria, 9 Victoria Street, Melbourne, 3000, by the 30th September of each year as set out above.

APPLICATIONS FOR FELLOWSHIPS

Applications for exchange fellowships are invited from scholars interested in visiting China, either individually or as a member of a small group with common study programmes, under the joint exchange agreement presently operating between the Australian Academies of Humanities and the Social Sciences in Beijing.

The scholarship, if granted, takes the form of a straightforward \$5,000 p.a. supplementation to the stipend of a postgraduate student who holds a Commonwealth Postgraduate Research Award (CPRA) or comparable qualification. The Board's scholarships are tenable for a maximum of three years and are subject to satisfactory progress being made by the scholarship holder.

These scholarships are *project attached*, that is, they are awarded in conjunction with a grant made to a university or college staff member for a research proposal submitted to the Board for support.

The Board's purpose in establishing these supplementary scholarships is to make the prospect of postgraduate research on projects that it supports through its existing grants program more financially attractive to students.

Supplementary scholarships may be applied for by the incorporation of a substantiated request for their award in the usual ERB application form. This year applications will close on Friday 2 August and decisions should be advised to universities and colleges by early November.

It is suggested that interested students approach university or college staff members who are undertaking research in areas of interest to the Electrical Research Board so as to discuss the development of suitable proposals.

RESEARCH PROPOSALS AND GRANT APPLICATIONS

Also from the Electrical Research Board: Applications are invited for grants in support of research on interest to the electricity supply authorities and to manufacturers of associated equipment. The Board makes grants to tertiary institutions in support of specific research projects under the direction of named Chief Investigators. Grants may be used in general for equipment, maintenance and computer time, and in specially approved circumstances for other purposes.

Apart from a limited contribution from CSIRO and the manufacturing industry, all the Board's normal finances are raised by contributions from members of the Electricity Supply Association of Australia according to an agreed formula, which includes a growth factor, and the resources available are thus limited. Total funds have limited the number of projects to about 30 in any one year with the major proportion of annual income being committed to work in progress.

The Board wishes to stimulate the rate of turnover of its sponsored projects and, in the main, will now be seeking

proposals which require support for no longer than three years. In this way, and by a regular evaluation of progress and of the likelihood of projects obtaining results, the Board hopes to increase the scope for new work. In those instances where longer term projects are suported, because of their special nature and continuing interest to Supply Authorities, their eventual lifetime after the three year period will be determined by annual critical review.
