PROMOTING CULTURAL RELATIONS

The *Scuola di Lingua e Cultura Italiana per Stranieri*, in Siena, Italy, aims at spreading knowledge of the Italian language and of Italian culture in all of its past and present forms: literature, art, history, scientific and philosophical thought, ethnic traditions, political and socio-economic institutions.

The School promotes cultural relations on both a national and international level, with universities, cultural and research societies and institutions, and at the same time benefits from the collaboration of cultural and scientific attaches abroad as well as other Italian institutions abroad.

In order to achieve its objectives the school provides a propaedeutic period of Italian language and culture and advanced courses in: Italian language and literature, archaeology and history of art, Italian history and institutions.

Students of all nationalities are allowed to attend the courses in Italian language and culture provided they are in possession of a certificate which permits them to attend university in the country in which the certificate was awarded.

INDIRA GANDHI WORLD PEACE CONFERENCE

To commemorate the memory of Mrs Indira Gandhi, it has been decided by the Elders Council of India to organise the first Indira Gandhi World Peace Conference at Vigyan Bhavan, New Delhi for three days, starting on October 31. The Screening Committee of the Elders Council will suggest a list of subjects for discussion at the Conference, but would welcome suggestions for

alternative topics, and papers by September 30. The last date for receiving nominations from those who wish to participate in the Conference is September 30.

OVERSEAS SCHOLARSHIPS - FRANCE

The French government is offering postgraduate scholarships to Australian students wishing to undertake a course of study in France at the postgraduate level, during the academic year 1986/87. Scholarships are available in the fields of literature, linguistics, applied linguistics (French language) and education.



Benefits include living allowance of approximately 2,050 FF per month; Economy class air travel from France to Australia; Tuition fees; Assistance with medical expenses; Assistance with accommodation.

VEHICLE DESIGN COMPETITION

During July 1986, the engineering students at the University of British Columbia will be hosting the Innovative Vehicle Design Competition (IVDC). The IVDC is an international competition for engineering students, sanctioned as a special event of the 1986 World Exposition, to be held in Vancouver, B.C., Canada, 2 May to 13 October 1986. The theme of EXPO 86 is Transportation and Communications - World in Motion - World in Touch. The IVDC is the first truly international event of this type. Student teams at participating universities will submit design proposals, build prototype vehicles and accompany them to Vancouver for testing,

during 6 to 19 July 1986. The vehicle must be able to carry two persons, and travel on existing roadways. It will be judged in five categories: performance, functionality, safety, energy efficiency and innovation.

Entries are welcomed from engineering and technical schools in all countries participating in EXPO 86, but are limited to one entry per school. As well as the international recognition accorded the teams, \$250,000 will be awarded in the form of endowed university scholarships. Seed money will also be available to help with the initial organisation of the teams. This will be allocated on the basis of the design proposals.

LAND INFORMATION SYSTEMS DIPLOMA COURSE

The International Institute for Aerial Survey and Earth Sciences (ITC), in The Netherlands, has announced a one-year Post-Graduate Diploma Course in Land Information Systems to start in October this year. The aim is to prepare participants to manage the design, implementation and maintenance of a geographic or cadastre based Land Information System.

The course is open to all those with an interest in Land Information Systems and holding a recognised university degree in one of the following disciplines: geodesy, surveying, topographic science, photogrammetry, cartography, computer science, geography, environmental science, regional planning, agriculture, soil science, forestry, economics, law, management science and public administration.

SOIL SURVEY COURSES

The main subject of the courses can be defined as photo-interpretation as a means of carrying out soil surveys more quickly, more accurately and more efficiently than by conventional methods.

HONOURS STUDENTS

The Undergraduate Studies Committee is currently investigating any problems confronting Honours students. A sub-committee has been formed and would welcome submissions from students regarding their experiences when they were doing Honours.

ENGINEERING/SCIENCE BUILDING

Apart from four stairways, the link and covered way, all reinforced concrete works are complete. Brickwork is in progress with the south wing about 90 per cent complete and North Wing 50 per cent complete.

Internal partitions in progress, with all framing well advanced. Structural steel roof erected for South Wing. Purlines in progress.

All services contracts are progressing satisfactorily. Delays to date are 46.75 days, the 1.75 days delay in June were due to wet weather. Completion is still hoped for at the end of December this year.

SCHOOL OF HEALTH SCIENCES BUILDING

All work was completed and the building occupied in June. External works and landscaping are in progress. Carpark construction is also in progress. All works are expected to be complete by mid-August if the present good weather continues.

KOOLOOBONG (STUDENT AND VISITOR ACCOMMODATION) PROJECT

Stage I - Landscaping and Paving of footpaths are about 80 per cent complete. Another three weeks work are estimated for completion.

Stage II - Contract has been awarded to Hughes Bros Pty Ltd, for a lump sum price of \$853,471. Possession of site was given to the contractor with effect from July 1. Completion is scheduled for mid-December this year.

NEW ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

Documentation is in progress and is well-advanced. Tenders are scheduled to be called in September with construction to start after the University Open Day, on October 21 this year.

CAMPUS RING ROAD

The centre-line of the proposed approved route has been pegged out. Arrangements are being made to lay out the relocated running track and rugby field, once the positions have been plotted on plan. Construction is scheduled to begin on October 21.

UNION BUILDING

Following a request from Mr N. Diffey, Secretary/Manager of the Union, the Architects and Consulting Engineers have been asked to advise on structural alterations necessary to provide for possible future

development of existing Union Building, particularly in the Lounge areas on the first floor.

SESSION I EXAMINATIONS

Purchasing Review

The Purchasing Review was scheduled to begin on Monday June 17. However, this was postponed to mid-July because Coopers and Lybrand have advised that Mr G. Failes, from their Sydney Office, would not be available due to an extended commitment on a previous task.

The final report for the Purchase Review must be presented to the University not later than August 31.

Workers Compensation Seminar

Some work is being carried out in the Budgets Section, to evaluate the financial implications of the recent changes to Workers Compensation legislation. Staff have attended a seminar conducted by the Chamber of Manufactures, where a paper was presented, which outlined in detail the major amendments to the legislation.

150 Per Cent R. & D. Taxation Scheme

The University has asked for approval to become an "Approved Research Institution", under the Provisions of S73A(6) of the Income Tax Assessment Act. This formal approval is necessary where the cost of Research, being carried out on behalf of the body wishing to claim the benefit of the 150 per cent allowance, falls below \$50,000 in any one year.

FRIENDS VISITING CATHOLIC SCHOLAR FOR 1985

The Friends Visiting Catholic Scholar for 1985 will be Bishop Eric D'Arcy, Bishop of Sale in Gippsland. He will visit Wollongong on Friday, August 2.

Bishop D'Arcy was born in Melbourne in 1924, studied at Corpus Christi College, Melbourne and was ordained priest in 1949. He holds the degrees of M.A. in Philosophy from Melbourne, Ph.D from the Gregorian University in Rome and D.Phil from Oxford.

From 1962-81 he was Senior Lecturer and Reader in Philosophy at the University of Melbourne and from 1969-81 he was Episcopal Vicar for Tertiary Education in the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne.

He was made Bishop of Sale in 1981 and in 1982 became a member of the Vatican Secretariat for Non-Believers.

Books he has published include 'Conscience and Its Right to Freedom', published in London in 1961, in New York 1962, Spanish translation published in Madrid 1963, French translation published in Paris 1964, new re-printing London 1980. 'Human Acts', published by the Oxford University Press. 'The Emotions', published in London and New York. 'Pleasure', published in London and New York.

Bishop D'Arcy will give two addresses during his visit. The first will be at 12.30 pm in the Union Common Room. A light luncheon will be served.

International Youth Year:

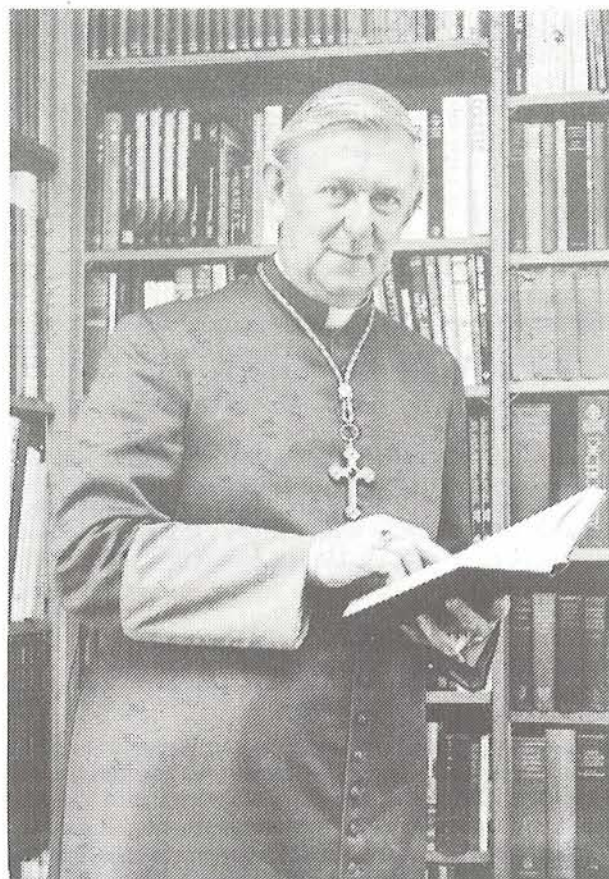
