Sponsored by the Union, the SRC and the Sports Association, the match was the first in a week of activities to celebrate the University's tenth anniversary.

In presenting the trophy to the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Ken McKinnon, the Lord Mayor of Wollongong, Alderman Frank Arkell, said that he hoped that this match would be the first of many matches between Town and Gown teams.

INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL FOR DISTANCE EDUCATION

The Head of External Studies, Mr J. Hazell, will be attending the 13th World Conference of the International Council for Distance Education (I.C.D.E.), to be held at La Trobe University from August 13 to 20. He will be presenting a paper on Search Strategies of External Students, based on a questionnaire survey of external students in the Institute of Advanced Education.

The Conference is being held in conjunction with the Biennial Forum of the Australian and South Pacific External Studies Association and will be officially opened by Senator Susan Ryan, Federal Minister for Education.

Feature sessions include the Broady Lecture, presented by Professor Geoffrey Bolton, Professor of History and Dean of the School of Social Inquiry at Murdoch University, Western Australia, and a keynote address by Dr Michael Moore of the U.K. Open University, Many approaches - a common concern.

Distinguished Visitors

PROFESSOR KEITH HANCOCK TO DELIVER FIRST SIR RICHARD KIRBY LECTURE

Professor Keith Hancock, Vice-Chancellor of Flinders University and chairman of the recent federal government enquiry into industrial relations, will deliver the first Sir Richard Kirby Lecture on Monday, September 23, at 7.30 pm at the University of Wollongong.

This public lecture is named in honour of Sir Richard Kirby, sometime President of the Conciliation and Arbitration Commission. Sir Richard was also a member of the Council of the University of Wollongong between 1975 and 1982 and is Chairman of the Advertising Standards Council. He delivered the university's first industrial relations public lecture in 1978.

Subsequent speakers have included Simon Crean, Vice-President of the ACTU, Brian Neales of the Confederation of Australian Industry and Mr. Justice Staples of the Conciliation and Arbitration Commission.

The aim of the lecture is to introduce a distinguished practitioner in industrial relations to a Wollongong audience as part of the Industrial Relations Program at the University of Wollongong. Professor Keith Hancock has long experience in Australian industrial relations, both as an academic and as a practitioner. The inquiry which he recently chaired will provide the basis for major changes to industrial relations legislation and will set the scene for Australian industrial relations over the next few years.

The lecture will be of great interest to all with a concern for the future of industrial relations in this country.

EILEEN ADAMS – ART EDUCATOR? SOCIAL SCIENTIST? ENVIRONMENTALIST?

Visiting English academic Eileen Adams is neither an Art Educator, a Social Scientist nor an Environmentalist. She describes herself as being at that point where all three disciplines meet. Her primary interest is to combine these studies to produce a curriculum in schools to encourage the development of an appreciation of good design in the man-made environment.

Recently in England she has been involved in launching an interdisciplinary project 'The Design Dimension of the Curriculum.' She has written three books on the project and produced film strips relating to it. She was also consultant for two programs in the TV series Design Matters.

Eileen Adams lectures and holds workshops in Eire, Scotland, France, West Germany, Austria, Cyprus, Sweden and Portugal. She will be at the University of Wollongong until August 27. Art educators and social scientists from all over Australia and New Zealand have accepted invitations to attend workshops with Eileen on August 22 and 23. Interested members of the public will be welcome at these workshops.

Eileen Adams has an interesting background. She undertook her initial training at Trent Park College of Education, and subsequently studied for her BEd. (in Art and Education) at London University.

From 1970 to 1976 she taught in London secondary schools, during which time she also became Co-ordinator, Front Door Project which was run in conjunction with the Royal College of Art and the Greater London Council Department of Architecture and Civic Design.

In 1976 she was seconded from the Inner London Education Authority to the Schools Council, first as Project Officer (1976-79) and then as Project Director for Art and the Built Environment Project (ABE). During the latter period of this secondment she was also Research Fellow at the Royal College of Art, studying inter-professional working parties as a medium for curriculum development. Her research in this area led to the award of an MA degree in 1983.

Since 1983 Eileen has continued her lecturing and research at the Royal College of Art, and also at Birmingham Polytechic. Most recently she has been involved in launching a new interdisciplinary project *The Design Dimension of the Curriculum*.

She has been active in publication, her efforts including newsletters for ABE over a number of years, as well as three books on the project and its approach and a set of three film strips relating to it.

JOINT SEMINAR

The Centre for Technology and Social Change and the Department of Sociology will hold a joint seminar on Thursday, August 15 in the HPS Laboratory, from 12.30 to 2 pm. The topic will be Technology, Gender and the Labour Process and the Speaker will be Dr Roberta Hill.

Dr Hill is a social scientist employed by New Zealand's equivalent of the CSIRO (the DSIR). She has an MA in political science and a PhD in Sociology from the University of Canterbury. Her research interests fall within the broad area of science, technology and society. She is particularly interested in methodological problems of the social sciences, and is deeply involved in research on women's issues.

On the same day, from 2.15 to 3.45 pm, in the Sociology Seminar Room (19.2103), another seminar will be held. The topic is Colonising Control: The Rise and Rise of Homo Faber, and the speaker, Mr Frank Fisher.

Frank Fisher is an environmental consultant and lecturer at the Graduate School of Environmental Science in Monash University. He worked as an electrical engineer for ten years with transnational corporations in Europe and later, supported by his wife Robyn, retrained in languages and environmental studies. He is active in the deep-ecology movement and particularly critical of the direction modern technologies are taking.
