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## TEACHING COMPANY SCHEME LINK WITH ICI

The University on Wednesday May 21 entered into a formal agreement with ICI Australia Operations under an award made by the Commonwealth Government in relation to the Teaching Company Scheme. This scheme was introduced earlier this year by the Department of Industry, Technology and Commerce. It is designed to enhance industry performance and to assist restructuring by improving links between industry and the tertiary education sector. The scheme involves a company working in partnership with a tertiary education institution on an R & D program that will substantially improve the company's technology and performance.

The University has previously entered into an agreement with Metal Manufactures under an award made in the first round of Teaching Scheme grants. A Research Associate is now engaged at MM implementing a program for computer-assisted quality control monitoring systems.

The successful submission linking the University with ICI was initiated by Dr Gordon Wallace of the Department

of Chemistry. The project will be concerned with the development and application of an electro-chemical sampler.

A Research Associate will be employed at ICI's Botany plant to optimise the cell design of a reticulated vitreous carbon-based sampler. The researcher will work under Dr Wallace's direction.

It is hoped that on development the sampler will be commercialised and offered for sale to industry on the scientific industry market.

The University has recently been advised that it has been successful with a further joint application made with Metal Manufactures. This project, which links MM with the Department of Mechanical Engineering, is concerned with the development of aluminium conductor data for transmission lines.

It appears likely that a fourth award may soon be made to the University under the Teaching Company scheme. The University's performance in this area would appear to rival that of any other Australian university.

### PROFESSOR OF STATISTICS APPOINTED TO UNIVERSITY

I am pleased to announce that the Chancellor of The University of Wollongong has approved the appointment of Dr David Griffiths as Professor of Statistics. Dr Griffiths has accepted the appointment and will join the University in time for the commencement of the 1987 academic year.

Dr Griffiths was awarded a Bachelor of Science Degree with First Class Honours in 1966 from the University of New South Wales. He was also awarded the University Medal and the S.T.C. Award and Medal.

In 1968 he was awarded a N.S.W. Rhodes Scholarship which culminated in the award of his D.Phil. from Oxford University in 1971. At the end of 1971 Dr Griffiths joined the staff of CSIRO, Division of Mathematics and Statistics, as a Research Scientist, progressing to Senior Research

Scientist in 1976, Acting Senior Regional Officer N.S.W. in 1979-1980, and Principal Research Scientist in 1982. Dr Griffiths joined the University of New South Wales as a Lecturer in 1984 and was promoted to Senior Lecturer in 1985. Within the University Dr Griffiths is Assistant Director of the new Industrial Mathematics and Statistics Group. He was a member of the N.S.W. Rhodes Scholarship Selection Committee 1974-1977.

Dr Griffiths has published extensively in a wide range of prestigious journals on a wide range of topics. Current research and interests, both personally and as a member of the Group, include Analysis of Traffic Crash Patterns, evaluation of vaccines, modelling the shape of lenses, investigation of concrete faults in high rise buildings and research on length-based sampling for cancer screening trials. Consulting has involved liaison with a wide range of Government departments, Statutory Authorities, Tertiary Institutions and other bodies such as The Cornea and Contact Lens Research Unit, Siromath and Biotechnology Australia. Epidemiology is an area of increasing research attention.

### COMMUNITY RADIO INVITES UNIVERSITY STAFF INVOLVEMENT

Illawarra FM Community Broadcasters (ICB), the community-based FM Radio group, were granted a Class C (Community) license by the Australian Broadcasting Tribunal on March 14 this year, to establish an FM Community Access station to serve the Illawarra region from Helensburgh to Gerringong. This group has been active for over five years in its efforts to establish the station.

The University of Wollongong has been involved in test transmissions held by the group over the past five years and is presently a Corporate member of the group. The University has now been invited by ICB to become permanently involved in producing programs which have some relationship to University interests, research, teaching or other activities.

Examples of possible programs would be broadcasts



of concerts and performances by the Conservatorium and the University Singers; drama; political and social comment; discourses on research activities (possibly a Wollongong-based 'Science Show'); and informative or promotional programs. Some idea of the style such programs may take may be gained from listening to 2SER-FM in Sydney. This station is controlled by Macquarie University and the NSW Institute of Technology, and despite being licensed as an educational station 2SER functions as a community station of the type that it is anticipated will be established here.

The limitations on program styles and content are only those imposed by available facilities and the programmer's imagination. It is understood that programs can be produced by both staff and students, and that intrinsic to the concept of public broadcasting is the principle of a 'hands-on' approach to broadcasting and program preparation which means that University members will be encouraged to prepare and produce their own program material with assistance from ICB volunteers should this be required, as well as becoming involved in the station as volunteers.

At the present, program production facilities are restricted to those that will be available at the ICB studios in 6 Ellen Street. However some units may already own suitable facilities capable of producing programs of acceptable technical broadcast standard, and we might expect that, provided the interest of the University as a whole were great enough, a satellite studio could be established on campus similar to that at Macquarie University for 2SER.

## FURTHER GRANT FOR AEAC

The Automation and Engineering Applications Centre Ltd (AEAC) has recently received \$200,000 from the Department of Industry Technology and Commerce towards its recurrent costs. This makes a total of \$700,000 which has been received to date to fund the activities of AEAC.

AEAC's Managing Director, Chris Cook, said that nearly 80 per cent of this total will be spent in Wollongong. Jobs have been provided for five full-time engineers and three technical support staff, in addition to a number of contract staff.

AEAC manufactures and installs high-technology manufacturing equipment, most of which has been developed for clients in Sydney and Melbourne.

## AUSTRALIAN STUDENT WORKSHOPS IN MANAGEMENT RESEARCH

Following the success of the three previous Australian Student Workshops in Management Research held at the Australian Graduate School of Management, the school is conducting the fourth Workshop from July 25-27. Uncle Ben's of Australia is again supporting the Workshop and will be providing free travel and accommodation for students selected to attend. The aim is to attract students from a wide range of disciplines including economics, psychology, finance, operations research, law, mathematics and statistics and other management related disciplines. This is an opportunity to visit the AGSM and discuss research with its faculty and with other student researchers.

This year we particularly wish to attract students who are at an early stage in their research career, that is, Honours and Masters students. Applications from more advanced students are still invited since the Workshop is designed to cater for both kinds of students. ### APPLICATIONS FOR FELLOWSHIPS

#### FELLOWSHIPS AWARDED TO AUSTRALIAN SCHOLARS

Two Fellowships will be awarded annually, and the selection committee will allocate the awards to ensure that no one country receives both Visiting Fellows in any one year.

Awards will be announced in December 1986. Successful applicants will be required to make their own travel and accommodation arrangements.

#### FELLOWSHIPS AWARDED TO OVERSEAS SCHOLARS

Two Fellowships will be awarded annually. Australian universities will be responsible for inviting scholars from any of the participating countries and the following universities are rostered to receive Fellows until 1995.

The visiting university is asked to nominate at least two people, each from a different country.

It is expected that the nominating university will extend all the necessary hospitality to the Visiting Fellow and will make the necessary travel and accommodation arrange-

ments for the Fellow. The Visiting Fellow will be responsible for meeting all accommodation and other living expenses while in Australia.

As the Visiting Fellows are intended to mix with other workers in their own fields, it would be expected that the nominating university will arrange visits to other Australian universities.

## VISITING FELLOWSHIPS

A number of grants towards the cost of travel and subsistence will be made to facilitate visits between universities in Australia and the following countries: Bangladesh, Burma, Fiji, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, Papua New Guinea, Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Thailand.

The Awards Are Designed To Cover Visits Of Distinguished University Scholars Actively Engaged In Academic Work.

Visits so assisted should be of a minimum of 60 days duration and, it is emphasised, should enable the visiting scholars to meet and mix with workers in their own fields and to have discussions with academics and personnel in relevant organisations on subjects of mutual interest, rather than to give a series of public lectures.

The Fellowships are not intended for persons wishing to attend conferences or seminars.

Four Fellowships will be awarded annually — two for Australian scholars to visit universities in any one of the overseas countries listed above, and two for scholars from universities in the above countries to visit Australia.

Any suitably qualified members of an Australian university and a recognised university institution in one of the above countries, who fulfil the conditions, are eligible for consideration.

The AVCC Fellowship provides for an allowance, to be determined by the AVCC, of up to \$5,000 maximum as a contribution to the cost of travel to or from Australia and within the country to be visited, including living expenses in the visited country.

No provision is made for the payment of fares or allowances for dependents of the Visiting Fellow.
