MAJOR INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE HOSTED BY MECHANICAL ENGINEERING

The Second International Conference on Bulk Materials Storage Handling and Transportation was hosted by the Department of Mechanical Engineering at the University of Wollongong from July 7 to 9. Organised by the National Committee on Bulk Materials Handling of the Institute of Engineers Australia, the Conference was the first major conference of its kind to be held in Wollongong, Over 200 delegates attended from all over Australia and from ten overseas countries.

Keynote speaker was Mr J.K. Ellis, General Manager, BHP Steel International, Slab and Plate Products Division, Port Kembla. Mr Ellis chose as the theme for his paper, 'BHP The Materials Handling Company'.

The topic for Mr Ellis was clearly appropriate for, he said, BHP was built on successful bulk materials handling. BHP is often referred to as a steel or mining company, occasionally as an oil company, but seldom is it recognised as a major materials handling company.

He continued: 'From its earliest days, BHP used land and sea transport to move its silver and lead production from Broken Hill to destinations in Britain and Europe, From the moment BHP moved into steelmaking in 1915, its transportation activities took on a new dimension and an original fleet of just two small vessels has now expanded to a 17 vessel fleet with a deadweight tonnage close to 1.4 billion with the addition this month of the 220,000 tonne Iron Pacific. These vessels move steel products and raw materials - iron ore, coal, coke, limestone, dolomite, manganese ore - to domestic and international markets,

MUELLER MEDAL 1987

Nominations are sought for the Mueller Medal, to be presented at the 56th ANZAAS Congress in New Zealand at Massey University 26 to 30 January 1987.

The Mueller Memorial Medal honours Baron Sir Ferdinand von Mueller, one of the great pioneers of exploration and science in Australia, who arrived in the country in 1847 and was Government Botanist in Victoria for 44 years. The Medal may be awarded at each ANZAAS Congress, to a scientist who is the author of important contributions to anthropology, botany, geology, zoology or biology, preferably with special reference to Australia and published within the British Commonwealth. A selection committee will be appointed by ANZAAS Council.

A.J. GRASSBY TO GIVE LECTURE ON ITALIAN MIGRANTS' CONTRIBUTIONS TO AUSTRALIAN POLITICS

As well as their significant contribution to the economic development of Australia, Italian immigrants from Raffaello Carboni on have made interesting contributions to Australian political life.

This little-known but important aspect regarding Italian immigration to Australia will be the topic of a lecture by Mr A.J. Grassby, Special Advisor on Community Relations to the Premier of NSW, to be held on Monday July 29 at 12.30 pm in the Pentagon 5 Lecture Theatre, University of Wollongong. This lecture is being given as the keynote lecture for the EURO372 (Italo-Australian Studies course) and it is open to attendance by all interested persons.

including Japan, Korea, South East Asia, and Europe. Shipping operations have more recently diversified to carry alumina, sugar, gypsum, salt, grain and fertilisers between Australian ports and to ports in New Zealand and elsewhere.

'To illustrate developments this century, in 1907 it took a week to load 112,000 tonnes of coal aboard several ships. In January 1986 it took just 24 hours to load 138,000 tonnes into the *Iron Newcastle* at Kooragang Coal Loader in Newcastle.

'Sea-borne transportation of bulk cargoes is, however, only part of BHP's investment and involvement in a larger scene which dovetails this activity with extensive use of virtually every other means available — road and rail services, both within and outside BHP's plans and mineral operations; the widespread use of belt conveyors in underground

coal mining and in the movement of iron ore and other steelmaking raw materials at mine, port and plant, the movement of bauxite from mine to refinery by overload cable conveyor, and the intensive use of fleets of haul trucks, dozers, loaders, and shovels to load or complement our other facilities. Throughout BHP operations materials moved once was approximately 1.2 billion tonnes in 1985 and are expected to increase significantly by 1990 to close to 1.5 billion.'

In the remainder of his address, Mr Ellis illustrated the investment BHP has in materials handling equipment and systems, some of the efforts being made by the company to increase the efficiency of our operations in this area and the sorts of new systems which might be employed in the future.

Q & A – DOES PERSONALITY COUNT?

Question:

In selecting someone for a job, can the Selection Committee take personality into account? Or is that against EEO principles?

Answer:

Without going into an in-depth discussion of what constitutes 'personality', EEO always comes back to merit — best person for the job. The focus has to be on performance of the job and 'personality' or one's personal characteristics are obviously important in contributing to that performance. For example, one's ability to deal in a friendly way with people matters greatly in a counter or front line position but is hardly important in a technical or research position where client contact rarely occurs.

Instead of considering personality as a composite of the person's characteristics, EEO tries to focus on those particular personal skills and abilities which relate to the performance of the vacant position.

Job advertisements should reflect the personal abilities required for the position rather than focus only on the technical aspects of the job. This honest statement of required personal characteristics is entirely consistent with EEO principles as long as they are realistic and job related.

This is a different proposition from the selection committee which selects the person they 'like the most' because she or he would 'fit in' best.

Too many people who are a little 'different' have been denied jobs on this spurious ground (usually assumptions based on little or no information) and talent is lost.

People whose 'personalities' shine at interviews do not always turn out to be the best (most efficient and effective) person for the job, and sometimes their personalities do not live up to expectations either. So be clear about what you require in a position and stick to an assessment of relevant skills and abilities (technical and personal IF relevant) and good luck. You might even get someone you like as well.
