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DISTINGUISHED VISITORS FOR SEMINAR ON PEACE STUDIES

Two distinguished overseas scholars will give talks at the seminar on Peace Studies to be held at the University of Wollongong on August 19. David Aspin, of King's College, London, will discuss the nature of Peace Studies. Barbara Wien, of the World Policy Institute, New York, will introduce international perspectives on the teaching of Peace Studies in tertiary institutions. A third prominent speaker, from the Peace Education Project in Perth, Vanessa Letham, will discuss the teaching of Peace Studies in secondary schools.

The seminar has been organised by the University's Working Party on Peace Studies which is currently formulating proposals for a peace studies program at this University. HSC PHYSICS REVIEW COURSE 2 UNIT CORE TOPICS

Arranged by the Department of Physics, University of Wollongong, Saturday August 9 from 9 am to 5 pm

The Department of Physics is offering a 2 Unit HSC Physics (Core only) Review Course. The aim of the course is to review the Core of the 2 Unit syllabus and to help students understand and apply some basic Physics concepts required for the examination.

The course consists of lectures on Motion, Forces, Mechanical Interactions, Electrostatics, DC Electricity, Electromagnetism and Waves. SPORT FOR CHILDREN UNDER 12

The Human Rights Commission has received many inquiries relating to Section 42(2)(e) of the Sex Discrimination Act. Section 42(2)(e) provides in effect that there may not be discrimination on grounds of sex in the sporting activities of children under 12.

Section 42(2)(e) is not an easy provision to interpret. To assist understanding and acceptance of it, to work towards the elimination of discrimination and to promote equal opportunity in sport for children under 12, the Commission intends to publish an illustrated booklet. The booklet is to be designed as a practical and informative resource for primary school teachers, parents, sporting bodies and others interested in the subject. It is intended that it be ready for publication before the opening of the school year in 1987.

Illustrations for the booklet will be the subject of separate arrangements.

WHAT ABOUT THE MEN?

Question: The new EEO Committee has members on it specifically representing womens' employment issues and none representing mens' issues. You always state EEO is for everyone — but how can this be Equal Opportunity?

Answer: EEO is for everyone. It is based on the principle of access to opportunities based on ability to perform the job, rather than sex, race, or other criteria not related to the job.

The EEO Committee's primary role therefore is to advise on ways that such abilities are recognized and awarded opportunities throughout the University, and relates to both men and women with equal vigour.

Both men and women will be represented on the Committee and this is only fair and proper.

However, it is quite clear from any scrutiny of the workplace, including this University, that there are certain groups that, for a variety of reasons, (some social, some attitudinal and some as a result of accepted policies and practices), are in a disadvantaged position.

There is a wealth of evidence to support that being a female has been, and continues to be, a disadvantage in terms of employment opportunities.

For Example: In the Australian workforce at large, the average full time earnings for men is \$453.60 per week, whereas the average full time earnings for women is \$353.70 per week — \$100 per week less.

This of course reflects many things, but particularly the narrower range of employment fields open to women and the dearth of women at senior positions in the few fields in which they are represented.

This pattern of women occupying traditional, lower paid, lower status jobs is reflected at this University as was shown clearly in the 1984 EEO Staff Survey.

It is the task of EEO programs to identify the barriers which are responsible for the restricted choices and lower status of women in a particular organization and to seek ways of removing any unfair restrictions.

This is why the EEO Committee seeks representation from different womens' employment areas in the University — to alert us to ways that barriers may be operating to reduce opportunities for women in those areas.

Similarly we are seeking representation from other groups identified as obviously disadvantaged in employment at this University (eg: people with physical disabilities) to help direct activities which may open up those opportunities.

All staff including men obviously benefit from the removal of unfair or restrictive barriers because systems become more open to everyone.

No one denies that men as individuals can be disadvantaged in employment; ('wrong' personality, no 'degree' etc) but there is quite clear statistical evidence that being a male in itself is not a disadvantage in employment in the same way that being a female is, and to include a representative for male employment issues on the EEO Committee, although it may have staved off criticism, would have been quite inappropriate and hypocritical.

It would be like asking for representatives on the Committee to examine the special employment problems of the able bodied (does anyone suffer from having no disabilities?) or for people from English speaking backgrounds (is that a disadvantage in English speaking countries?).

I think that would be similarly inappropriate.

The Committee will end up with several male representatives and so it should, but not to put forward the special disadvantages men face as a group in employment. Such a position would be clearly to ignore the realities of the workplace at large, and at this University.

The Division of Radiophysics is currently designing and building the Australia Telescope – a large array of individual radio telescopes of state-of-the-art technology which will be a significant bicentennial project – to ensure a future in astrophysical research. In addition, modern technology to support Australian industry is actively pursued by research in antenna design, microwave systems, cooled electronics, device fabrication, signal processing, VLSI design and computer systems.

Vacation Scholarships are offered to undergraduate and graduate students who have completed not less than three years of full-time courses in Electronics, Electrical
