UNIVERSITY TOTAL MASTER PLAN LOOKS AHEAD 50 YEARS

The extensive building development on the Wollongong campus throughout 1986 and the early part of 1987 can hardly have passed unnoticed! Some projects will continue further into the year. Several are now approaching completion.

The impact on the University of Wollongong campus will be significant. The provision of new and interesting buildings, an improved roadway system, better parking facilities and attractive landscape and other aesthetic developments will all contribute towards making the University campus one of the most, if not the most, interesting and pleasant in the country.

All projects are components of the Total Master Plan as it is envisaged looking ahead 50 years. What are some-

times perceived today as inconveniences, or even unnecessary changes, will be significant in laying the groundwork for the University of the future.

A draft Master Plan Colour Scheme has been prepared which will attempt to link aesthetically through the use of colour, the built, the manufactured and natural components which coalesce to make up the campus.

Much of the work has been undertaken at the initiative of the University. The new Administration Building and the extensions to the Michael Birt Library have been funded by the Commonwealth Government. The Illawarra Technology Centre is a specially funded project shared between the Commonwealth and State governments. Other projects

WOLLONGONG WRITERS ON A PUBLISHING SPREE

The writing staff in the School of Creative Arts at the University has begun the year on a very high note, with an array of new books to mark the beginning of activities for the year.

This week, new lecturer Martin Buzacott has published his new novel *Charivari* under the Picador imprint. He has a contract with the same company for a second novel. Martin has previously published two other books. He is the editor of the internationally acclaimed *Music Australia*, and of the major reference work, *The Musica Viva Chamber Music Guide*. He is currently writing a book on Australia's young composers.

Another new member of staff, David Young, has written the scripts for two major films currently under production — *Prince at the Court of Yarralumla* and *Synthesizers*, both with budgets of \$1.5 million. David previously wrote and directed the film *Clutch*, and has written episodes for *Beyond 2000*. He is contracted for three more feature films for 1987-88.

Dianne Bates, who teaches the Writing for Children strand in the course, has had a great deal of success with her books recently. Late last year *Thirteen going on forty* was published by Hodder and Stoughton. Since then, Angus and Robertson has published her *Grandma Cadbury's Trucking Tales*, and, with Bill Condon, she has produced *Madcap Cafe* and other humorous plays, published by Brooks Waterloo. In June this year, Dianne's book *The Worst Cook in the World* will be published by Methuen, and Methuen are also considering another of her books, *The Slacky Flat Gang*. Dianne has previously published several other books, including *Piggy Moss, Terri* and *The Belligrumble Bigfoot*.

UNIVERSITY CELEBRATES ITS 25TH BIRTHDAY ON APRIL 3

The University of Wollongong had its beginnings as a College of the University of New South Wales in 1962. We thus have our 25th anniversary this year. The occasion is to be marked with a celebration ceremony on April 3, a date chosen to coincide with the opening of the new administration building. More details will be announced in *Campus News* as planning proceeds.

A good deal has happened between 1962 and the present day. Then 280 students were enrolled in Science, Engineering and Metallurgy courses. In subsequent years the College resources and student intake increased to the point where the institution gained autonomy and became The University of Wollongong in January 1975.

In 1982 the University federated with the Wollongong Institute of Education which effectively extended the range of courses available from those offered at university level to include advanced education courses.

In more recent years the rapid increase in student enrolments has allowed the progressive development of courses which are designed to keep pace with advances in technology and thought. In 1987 the total number of students enrolled reached 8,000, which in terms of size place The University of Wollongong in the middle range of Australian universities.

WORKSHOP - PERSONAL CONSTRUCT THERAPY WITH THE ELDERLY

During 1985 and 1986 Associate Professor Linda L. Viney conducted an action-oriented research project, Promoting Independence in the Elderly. The project's aims were to develop and evaluate psychotherapy programs for elderly people using personal construct psychology as a theoretical framework. Both individual and family therapy programs were trialled successfully.

A workshop on this personal construct approach to the elderly will be held at the Institute of Psychiatry, Rozelle, on Saturday April 4. This workshop is sponsored by the Australian College of Clinical Psychologists and will be conducted by Professor Viney and Research Officers Ms Yvonne Benjamin and Ms Carol Preston.

A FLYING START

There's a new publisher on the scene, the University of Wollongong Press. Its first publication is an original little book about Charles Darwin's visit to Australia during the **Beagle** voyage in 1835—6.

Entitled *The Eye of Reason*, it's by Drs John Laurent and Margaret Campbell, and sells at \$9.95 in paperback. Laurent and Campbell are both from the Wollongong Department of Science and Technology Studies, though Dr Laurent has now moved on to the University of Sydney's Department of History.

They draw extensively on Darwin's journals and publications and on a variety of drawings and paintings to illustrate the story of the voyage, and indicate what a great impact the profusion of Australian plant and animal species had on the development of Darwin's theory of natural selection.

The book is readable, enlightening, well-documented and cheap — academic publishing at its best. A promising start.

LEAVE WITHOUT PAY AND SUPERANNUATION

The University Council recently approved an amendment to the policy of contributions to the State Superannuation Scheme by staff on leave without pay. In line with new legislative provisions, staff who take *more than three months* (or full-time equivalent) leave without pay will be given the option to either: a) accept a permanent reduction in unit entitlement; or b) elect to maintain their full unit entitlement.

Where a staff member chooses option a) above, the final benefit is reduced as a result of the period of leave without pay by pro-rating their unit entitlement to reflect the service not given. In this case, the staff member is not required to meet any part of the University's liability for employer contributions.

Where a staff member chooses option b) above, the cost of the University's liability (current and deferred) (ie employer contributions) for the period of leave without pay must be met by the staff member.

Staff should also note that if they take any period of leave without pay they are required to meet their own employee contributions.

If you are considering taking leave without pay you should contact the Salaries Section, ext 3930, to ascertain the procedures for superannuation contributions.

are generally being financed from the University's own funds and from the raising of loans.

Main Entrance

The roadway for the Main Entrance is completed, apart from the Security Booth, and is awaiting completion of the roundabout. The booth is almost complete. The Wollongong City Council and the other public authorities involved in the construction of the roundabout have been extremely co-operative and have done a superb job in having this facility available in minimum time.

It is expected that the Main Entrance will operate from March 12.

When this occurs the present Entrance 1 will be closed at the alignment with Northfields Avenue and this roadway will become the access road to, and part of, the Union car park

Work will also proceed soon towards establishing a significant 'Entrance' to the University. The landscape design is almost finished and it is expected that all work will be completed towards the end of April.

Western Entrance

Construction of the Western Entrance is proceeding well and is expected to be operating by the end of March. The added complexity of constructing a new weir and crossing has meant that the construction time is a little longer than for the Main Entrance.

The roadworks and the security booth are almost complete

The new weir will raise the water level of the dam by one metre, which should provide a more attractive slope and appearance for the dam.

When the Western Entrance is in use, the present Entrance 3 will be closed at the alignment with Northfields Avenue and access to the Social Science car park will be via the link which at present exists between the Entrance 3 roadway and the new ring road (just north of the weir).

Administration Building

The new Administration Building is very close to completion. It is planned that the IBM emputer, the nerve centre of the Administration, will be transferred to the new building during the weekend March 21-22. The new building will be fully occupied and open for business on Monday, March 23

Illawarra Technology Centre

The building currently being built at the eastern end of the campus is the Illawarra Technology Centre. It is being constructed from funds specially allocated from the Commonwealth and State governments.

When completed in late April, the building will house the Technology Centre which will provide valuable links between the academic and research activities of the University and the fostering and development of new industrial initiatives.

Extension to Michael Birt Library

Work is continuing on the three-level extension to the Library. The contract also provides for changes to the present library including desk and circulation areas. Every effort is being made to minimise interruption to library activities for both users and staff during the period of construction. It is expected that the total project will be completed by the end of 1987.

Second Square Landscaping

The area surrounded by the new Administration Building, Greenery, Social Sciences Building and Pentagon is being extensively landscaped to provide a second square.

Closely linked to the square at the north-western corner of the Administration Building will be the Forum amphitheatre

Work is going well on this project and should be completed by the end of April.

Union

Extensive alterations to the Union Building are being carried out in stages.

The first stage, at present under construction, is the Union Arcade which will provide facilities for a chemist, hairdresser, solicitor, Chaplain's office, medical centre, credit union, banking, student travel, Counselling Centre, student accommodation service, the Co-op Bookshop and a mini-market.

The Arcade is due for completion in May.

The second stage will incorporate a number of internal rearrangements of accommodation to provide improved dining and entertainment facilities. This stage is being designed at present and construction will begin soon after the completion of the Arcade project.

These projects are being funded by the Union with assistance from the University.

Sports Centre

The original sports centre is being significantly improved by an expansion of existing facilities and the addition of new facilities.

This project centres on the need to relocate the squash courts from their present location in the Union building and to provide a 'home' for the Sports Association. Other facilities to be included are a second indoor court, three squash courts, a gymnasium area and sports shop.

This project is being funded by the Sports Association with assistance from the University.

Northern Car Park

The Northern carpark (formerly known as the Coalwash Carpark) has been progressively constructed over recent months. The completion of work on the service easement at the western end of the carpark has meant that the remaining 25 per cent of spaces has taken a little longer to construct than was originally planned.

This carpark should be completed and ready for use early in the week beginning March 7, and will provide a total of 202 car spaces including four disabled parking spaces, and 13 motor cycle spaces.

It should be noted that from the time of the completion of this carpark, no parking will be permitted beyond its western boundary. This particularly refers to parking around the Animal House.

Western Carpark

The Western Carpark has been constructed in two stages, each providing approximately 150 spaces.

The first stage was completed late in 1986. The second stage is nearing completion and will be available about March 16.

This carpark will be surrounded by landscaped mounds to minimise the effect of a 'sea of cars'. It will provide a landscaped barrier on the northern side to minimise any inconvenience for our neighbours and will have sufficient lighting to allow safe movement within the area.

Pentagon

It has been decided that as part of the Master Plan Colour Scheme, the Pentagon building should be repainted. The scheme is intended to provide the basis of future colour co-ordination of the built environment on campus.
