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## AUSTRALIAN VICE-CHANCELLORS – AND NEW ADVISORY ARRANGEMENTS FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

The Australian Vice-Chancellors' Committee has expressed concern at the increased scope for political influence in the higher-education sector in the government's proposal to establish a National Board of Employment, Education and Training.

AVCC Acting Chairman Professor Brian Wilson said that one of the great strengths of the Commonwealth Tertiary Education Commission was its substantial in-house capacity to gather and evaluate information about universities and colleges and to formulate policy.

Under the arrangements associated with the proposed new Board, that capacity would be transferred to the Department of Employment, Education and Training whose primary allegiance was clearly to the Minister, Mr Dawkins.

'To be most effective, the university sector needs to deal with long-term as well as short-term priorities. Guidelines from government are useful, but the emphasis must be on rational long-term planning for the provision of balanced education services which take into account the need for Australia to advance in both economic and non-economic areas', Professor Wilson said.

Professor Wilson went on to comment that the AVCC acknowledged that the regrouped responsibilities of the new super department would require a revised advisory structure. The AVCC welcomed the news that the new board would be established as a statutory authority with

the responsibility to report publicly its advice on policy and resource allocation, and that the board's annual report to parliament would include sections on the four councils.

'The opportunity for public scrutiny of the work of the board and councils will be important if public confidence and credibility is to be maintained', Professor Wilson said.

Professor Wilson indicated that the AVCC was willing to co-operate with the Minister in developing the detail of the new structure. If the new system is to be given credibility and support, it must maintain a sound operational knowledge of institutions and their research, teaching and administrative activities. This may be difficult if it has to rely on the staff of a very large government department rather than on a dedicated secretariat for operational support, and especially for determining detailed institutional allocations. While the AVCC was obliged to voice its concerns, it was also willing to help find solutions and welcomed the Minister's intention to consult with education providers.

### PROFESSOR MCKINNON WARNS AGAINST 'JAPAN INC' UNIVERSITIES

The Vice-Chancellor, Professor Ken McKinnon, continued his criticism of government higher-education policies when he addressed a London conference in October. Reporting on his address, the *Sydney Morning Herald* for October 22 commented:

Australian universities are in the early stages of an agonising reappraisal from which there is no going back.

The outspoken Vice-Chancellor of Wollongong University, Professor Ken McKinnon, said this at a London University conference on higher education.

He criticised the three major players in the present higher-education revolution.

He said the rhetoric of Mr Dawkins, the Federal Minister for Education, showed an "underlying scorn for universities and academics" and pushed to increase the pace of change with reckless disregard for traditional values.

Those academics who resisted government moves for accountability often claimed to be "keepers of the eternal and unchanging Holy Grail", he said.

And industry, when it was involved in the debate, directed its rhetoric towards self-interest and profit.

Professor McKinnon described the present Federal Government as the most determined he had seen in 30 years.

He accused Canberra of wanting to introduce what he called a "Japan Incorporated" model of government, industry and university co-operation.

Such a corporate model, with close ties between universities and industry, could raise serious ethical problems, he said.

He mentioned the pharmaceutical company Travenol's establishment within the University of NSW and said it created misgivings about secrecy, the delayed publication of academic research and the diversion of publicly-supplied resources to the exclusive use of one company.

Even where academics shared the Government's desire to improve the economy, Professor McKinnon said, they worried about tailoring research too closely to applied problems.

He said academics also had a "profound distrust" of the abilities of bureaucrats to choose the right problems.

## ENGINEERS/MATHEMATICIANS

The University of Wollongong has established scholarships with funds donated by BHP and is seeking high-quality postgraduate students interested in taking part in this new initiative. The scholarships are intended to provide the opportunity to undertake a PhD in an environment involving substantial industrial collaboration. An attractive stipend of \$16,000 (after tax) is being offered to attract applicants whose enthusiasm for research matches that of the staff who will supervise the projects.

### BARRY RUSSELL APPOINTMENT

## PIONEERING FAMILY ESTABLISHES UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP

Descendants of Mary Wade, who was transported to New South Wales at the age of 11, have established a memorial honours scholarship in Australian History at The University of Wollongong. The descendants include well-known Wollongong pioneering families – the Harrigans and the Brookers.

The family has published a family history – *Mary Wade to Us - a Family History - 1778-1986* – the proceeds of which will be used to establish the scholarship.

After a period on Norfolk Island and at old Sydney Town, Mary Wade settled in the Campbelltown district until 1823, when she and her husband, Jonathan Brooker, moved to the Illawarra. Their sons took up land in the Tarrawanna area. Mary Wade lived until 1859 when an obituary in the *Illawarra Mercury* saluted her as mother of one of the 'largest families in the world'.

The Acting Vice-Chancellor, Professor Ian Chubb, commented, 'It is appropriate that the Mary Wade Memorial Scholarship has been established to commemorate one of Wollongong's pioneering families in the University's 25th Anniversary year. As Australia approaches its bicentenary, this fine gesture will encourage further scholarship in Australian History'.

## MUELLER MEDAL 1988

Nominations for the Mueller Medal, to be presented at the ANZAAS Centenary Congress in Sydney at the University of Sydney 16 to 20 May 1988 are now being sought.

The Mueller Memorial Medal honours Baron Sir Ferdinand von Mueller, one of the great pioneers of exploration and science in Australia, who arrived in the country in 1847 and was Government Botanist in Victoria for 44 years. The medal may be awarded at each ANZAAS Congress, to a scientist who is the author of important contributions to anthropology, botany, geology, zoology or biology, preferably with special reference to Australia and published within the British Commonwealth. A selection committee will be appointed by ANZAAS Council.

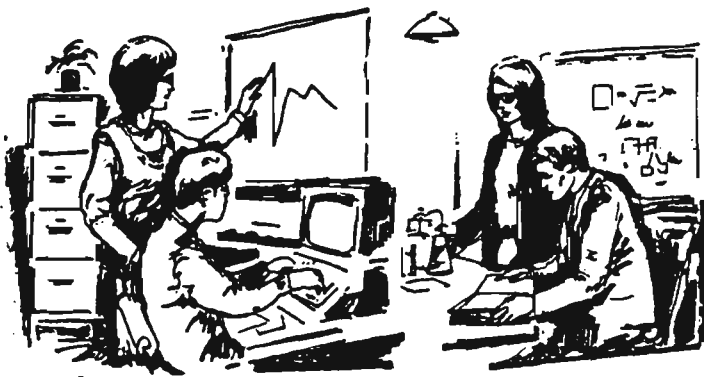

### ASSOCIATION OF COMMONWEALTH UNIVERSITIES 1988 FELLOWSHIPS

The Association of Commonwealth Universities offers a number of fellowships in two categories.

The first category, the Administrative Travelling Fellowships, is intended to offer opportunities for senior officers already established in their administrative careers to attend brief and intensive training programs and/or to visit other countries of the Commonwealth and study matters of professional interest to themselves, their universities, and the university system in their country. Of course, an application for the Fellowship could be considered in conjunction with an application for the University's Development Leave for General Staff program.

### THE ROLE OF THE RECREATION AND SPORTS ASSOCIATION ON CAMPUS

As one of three student bodies created and endorsed by a fledgling University Council in 1975, with its beginning extending beyond that to the formation of its first clubs in the early 1960s, and its first General Committee in 1971, the Recreation and Sports Association has grown tremendously as the campus population has exploded.

Originally it provided a co-ordinating and encouraging role for sporting clubs of the University College and then the University itself. But expansion in demand for recreational activities has forced a shift in emphasis towards its other objectives.

- 1) Developing and extending recreational facilities on campus, and
- 2) Establishing recreational activities, and catering for the widest possible cross section of the campus population.

From its humble beginnings in April 1981 the Recreation Program has grown to include a wide variety of activities and recreational pursuits. The original four lunchtime volleyball teams have expanded into over 1000 'Intra-Mural' social sports participants each week. Learn to Play activities and Outdoor Recreation have also boomed with increased awareness, among staff and students, of the activities that are being offered.

One of the catalysts for this sharp increase is the recently completed \$1.1 million University Recreation Centre. A focus for the Association's geographically isolated facilities, the Centre is providing a bonus to the campus and the community for a variety of leisure activities not possible before the facility was built. Since completion in April this year the Centre has become the home of:

Illawarra Volleyball Association  
Illawarra Netball Association: Indoor Netball Competition  
National Indoor Soccer League: IMB Stingers

Various community groups make active and regular use of the Centre for training and instruction in various activities (and standards!). From the Illawarra Hawks to the Edmund Rice College, the Centre has fulfilled a need both on campus and in the community.

By far the most popular casual used facilities in the Centre are table tennis and badminton. In between lectures and after class the students descend on the tables and courts for the hour or two they have free. At times the air is thick with shuttles, ping pong balls, the blood-curdling cry of the Kendo fencing exponents or the clash of weights.

Moves are already in progress to begin Stage 4 of the Recreation Centre: a heated, indoor swimming pool. At \$1 million it is no drop in the bucket, but with the incredible recreational, educational and rehabilitation needs of the

campus and surrounding community, I feel the demand will be so great it will be considered an absolute necessity in the near future.

## EEO news...

At its meeting on October 9 the Council of the University endorsed the policy statement on Equal Employment Opportunity. The statement has been revised to incorporate the Commonwealth Affirmative Action (Equal Employment Opportunity for Women) legislation and confirms the University's commitment to equal employment opportunity and affirmative action in recognition of the principles of equity and justice; and to the implementation of policies and programs to ensure that people possessing equivalent skills or qualifications have an equal chance of obtaining positions, and of advancing, within the University.

Affirmative Action is a systematic approach to the identification and elimination of barriers that target-group members encounter in employment. Affirmative Action involves the development of specific programs in consultation with all members of the University community and their respective unions or associations. This is the process in which the University has been engaged under the state Equal Employment Opportunity legislation. This legislation is now complemented by federal Affirmative Action legislation. The federal legislation provides, among other things, for action to:

- identify and eliminate discrimination in the University's employment process and policies;
- establish appropriate representation of target groups in employment throughout the University.

The policy statement outlines both the Commonwealth and NSW Anti-Discrimination legislation and gives an overview of the implementation of the EEO Management Plan to date.

The statement will be available from the EEO Unit in brochure form by the middle of November. Copies will be sent to all staff.

Classical Music and All That Jazz is a light orchestral concert featuring the Conservatorium Show Band, the Conservatorium String Orchestra, the Conservatorium Swinging Strings, and the Conservatorium Pops Orchestra and the distinguished soloists, Don Burrows, Don Harper and Bob Barnard.

The Conservatorium String Orchestra and the Conservatorium Show Band are the Conservatorium's high-profile groups.

Classical Music and All That Jazz represents the first attempt by the Wollongong Conservatorium since the time of the very successful Conservatorium Theatre Company to reach a broader audience; that audience which feels more comfortable with Bacharach than Bach; more comfortable with Miller than Miles (Davis).

## **NEW WAVE THEATRE ON CAMPUS**
