MODELS FOR UNIVERSITY DEVELOPMENT

The transition has to be real--not a paper transformation

The Vice-Chancellors' Committee has spelled out a series of models for the transformation of colleges of advanced education into universities. This follows its earlier comments on the Queensland Government's decision to give university status to three institutions from 1993. The AVCC had expressed concern about the potential impact of this decision on the international standing of Australian universities.

The chairman of the AVCC, Professor Brian Wilson, said that the events of the past few months had shown that the concept of a university was becoming more diffuse in Australia. He said: 'We are starting to see the development of a system where national coherence of philosophy and consistency of standards related to universities may be lost.

'Obviously, universities have never been static: the university of today is very different in size, style and content from those of even 30 years ago. The AVCC's recent attempts to redefine the university have been prompted by the more rapid changes following the Federal Government's White Paper on Higher Education'.

Professor Wilson said that the current attempts to establish new models were a healthy development, so long as the central goal of the university – the education of postgraduates and undergraduates in a broad range of courses; the creation of new knowledge through research and scholarship; and the preservation of transmission of that knowledge – was not ignored.

'The development of new universities takes time and care and, most importantly, can be assisted by the involvement of existing universities in the process,' he said.

The AVCC was confident that the amalgamation of colleges with universities, if carefully handled, would protect the quality of existing universities without damaging the important characteristics of the former colleges.

Equally, there were some complex institutions, such as the big institutes of technology, which could be



transformed into universities of technology with appropriate financial support.

The AVCC believed, however, that there was a number of other models which could be useful aids to further development of other colleges:

The University College: this method was used to establish universities such as the University of New England, the University of Newcastle and James Cook

Human Movement research into scrum safety

The Australian and New Zealand Rugby Unions have provided \$14,000 for a further study into the biomechanics of rugby scrummaging techniques to be completed under the direction of Dr Peter Milburn. This comes in the wake of a study which supported the adoption of law changes designed to increase scrum safety. Since the adoption of these changes, there have been no serious scrum injuries in games played under these laws.

The present study will examine shearing forces experienced by front-row players under a variety of different scrummaging techniques. A series of piezo-electric force plates built into a scrum machine will detect the three orthogonal components of force experienced at engagements as well as the sustained forces on the hooker

and props during the scrum.

It is anticipated that preliminary proposals regarding the safety of the scrum can be documented in time for the International Rugby Board's annual general meeting in April.

... and into training programs for netball players
Dr Karen Chad and Ms Julie Steele were recently awarded
\$12,500 to undertake a research project entitled 'The
relationship between physical requirements and
physiological responses to match play and training in elite
netball players: the basis of a tailor-made training
program.'

The study will involve an evaluation of the physical capacities of elite netball players as well as determination of the energy requirements of positional play during match conditions and training sessions. This will permit recommendations for individualised training programs, specific to netball, to be developed. The grant was

awarded under the Applied Sports Research Program, funded by the Australian Sports Commission.

... and for fishing gear for the disabled The same granting agency also awarded Mr Harry Fuller \$13,000 to design and develop fishing-tackle prototypes to increase the effectiveness and independence of disabled fishers. The target population involves disabled people who may possess a degree of strength and motor coordination but lack fine motor control in the hands and fingers. They find difficulty in using a rotary motion to wind in standard fishing reels, and manipulating standard drag-control mechanisms which allow the safe playing of fish. They consequently become discouraged by excessive tangling of lines.

The project is supported by the Australian Recreational and Sport Fishing Confederation and has secured the sponsorship of Alvey Reels Australia and John Dunphy Imports.

University. The institutions had begun life as university colleges affiliated with universities and after a period of development and assistance had been given independent status.

The network: the creation of a multi-campus network with more autonomy for the individual campuses than under the university college model but with overall responsibility exercised by the experienced governing body.

Sponsorship: this approach was being used in NSW where the University of Western Sydney was being established under the sponsorship of The University of Sydney. The Sydney Vice-Chancellor was also acting Vice-Chancellor of the new institution; five of the 18 members of the Board of Governors were from The University of Sydney; and two-fifths of the Academic Board would come from the University of Sydney until 1996

Contractual arrangements: the Northern Territory University had been formed by the amalgamation of a university college and an institute of technology. However the contractual arrangement which had existed between the university college and The University of Queensland would continue, with the Northern Territory University offering University of Queensland degrees in arts, sciences, economics and law. This would ensure the quality of the degrees until the Northern Territory University developed.further. Professor Wilson said these models had the advantage

of giving colleges the assistance and oversight of established universities as they moved to diversify their offerings and develop their research base. The above models had been, and could continue to be, applied to colleges where development to university status was considered appropriate.

He said that the issue was not whether some colleges should become universities – many existing universities had started out as colleges – but how best to ensure that the transition was real rather than simply a paper transformation. This process would require time, money and informed advice if the current high standing of the title 'university' was to be maintained internationally.

Brilliant Wollongong PhD student to give recital at Performing Arts Centre

Currently enrolled in the Doctor of Creative Arts program at The University of Wollongong, brilliant Australian pianist Marilyn Meier will give a recital at the Illawarra Performing Arts Centre on Friday April 21 at 8 pm. She will perform works of Mozart, Chopin, Debussy, Cowell and Stravinsky.

On Australia Day, Marilyn Meier was honoured as an Australian Achiever of 1988 – finalist for Young Australian of the Year – for outstanding achievements as a concert pianist.

Described by the eminent Bela Siki as one of the most talented pianists of her generation, Marilyn went to the USA at age 15, progressing through the University of Washington, Seattle, to the University of Cincinnati where she gained her Bachelor of Music (Hons) at 19, and the Artist Diploma. From 1985, she studied with Professor Hans Leygraf at the Mozarteum in Salzburg where, in May 1988, she was awarded the Performance Diploma.

Marilyn has performed throughout Australia, USA, Spain, West Germany, Austria and Switzerland. Her 1989 tour of Europe and the USA from May-July will include performances in Vienna, Salzburg, Zurich, Cincinnati and New York.

Further example of invention and imagination – another first?


In 1976 the Buildings and Grounds Maintenance Section started making furniture in a small workshop in the southwest corner of Building 6. The demand for this service grew and the Maintenance Section staff was encouraged to branch out into a production-type joinery, making furniture, mostly suitable for campus needs. There is now a superbly equipped workshop at Campus East.

The Maintenance Section found it was able to produce personalised furniture, designed for a specific area and use, at an acceptable cost. In some cases, items were manufactured and supplied in a shorter time than would have been needed by an outside company.

The range of furniture being produced includes desks for professors, general staff and students, workstations, conference room tables and cupboard furniture, bookshelves, glass-fronted noticeboards, pinboards, whiteboards, video trolleys, display and advertising stands, indoor garden boxes and settings, ergonomic furniture, computer furniture, pigeonhole units and essay boxes, personal locker units, filing units, drawer units, lollipop lights around the campus, floor-to-ceiling cupboard and shelving units, material covered room dividers.

Specialised items of furniture can be designed and manufactured using the eight trades including 25 permanent staff and 11 casual tradesmen and unskilled workers within the section. User equipment can also be installed and in some cases, equipment can be designed and manufactured. Any costs involved would be charged against the user's account.

...brings good news for women

You may be interested to hear that the disturbing judgement handed down by Mr Justice Einfeld, President of the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission, not to award damages in a NSW sexual harassment case (Campus News for 30 August 1988) has been overturned by the Appeal Court.

The case concerned Dr Attalah Sheiban, who was before the Commission facing charges of sexual harassment against three women while they were employed by him as receptionists in 1985. Although Justice Einfeld found Dr Sheiban guilty he refused to award the receptionists compensation for loss of wages or injury to feelings.

The Appeal Court overturned this decision as well as declaring that the period of sexual harassment be extended to cover the time the three women were being interviewed for the position. Justice Einfeld had determined that since the women had been successful in obtaining the position, no detriment had occurred to them in the pre-employment period despite the fact that they were subjected to offensive questioning during the selection interviews. The Appeal Court has also ordered Dr Sheiban to pay compensation.

This is certainly good news for women in the workplace and in education. Our sex discrimination legislation is very important and a valuable asset that could easily have been undermined had Justice Einfeld's decision been allowed to stand.
