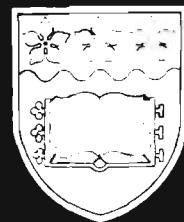

Professor Gerard Sutton appointed Deputy Vice-Chancellor

PROFESSOR Gerard Sutton — Pro Vice-Chancellor at the University of Technology, Sydney — has been appointed Deputy Vice-Chancellor at the University of Wollongong.

The appointment follows the resignation of Deputy Vice-Chancellor Professor Ian Chubb to take up the position of Chair of the Higher Education Council in Canberra.

At UTS Professor Sutton was responsible for research, computing services, international programs and continuing education, and he gained a reputation for his managerial and leadership qualities.

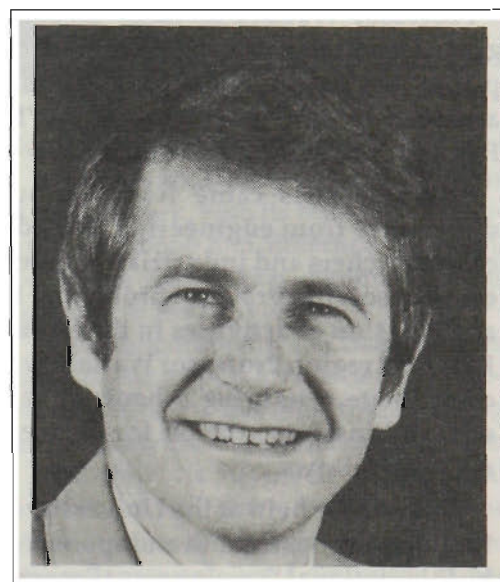
He was particularly successful in rais-

ing the profile and quality of research at UTS and in attracting significant research funding.

Professor Sutton holds qualifications in engineering from the University of NSW and a PhD from the Catholic University of America in Washington.

Professor Sutton said the University of Wollongong is well placed to seize the new opportunities created by the current challenges in tertiary education.

He saw that his role was to work with the Vice-Chancellor to ensure that the dynamism of the University is maintained and its full potential realised. He will take up his new position at the end of October.



Professor Gerard Sutton

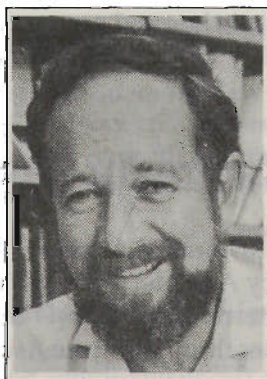
National Centre for Research Policy at Wollongong

THE Minister for Higher Education and Employment Services, Mr Peter Baldwin, has announced the establishment of a National Centre for Research Policy, to be headed by Professors Stephen Hill and Ron Johnston at the University of Wollongong.

The centre, to be funded initially at the level of \$1.2 million over three years, aims to more effectively support and manage the national research effort.

It will focus on ways of strengthening Australia's considerable research capabilities and making Australia more economically competitive, while safeguarding and strengthening environmental and social resources.

The centre will determine the direction Australia should take in developing research, technology and education strategies in order to achieve the goal of becoming a 'clever country'.

The centre has developed out of the highly successful contract research Centre for Technology and Social Change (TASC) established by Professors Johnston and Hill in 1985.

TASC provides advice, consulting, research and training on science policy, innovation and technology strategy and management to a wide range of public

and private sector clients. TASC's turnover in 1989/90 exceeded \$1 million.

Professor Johnston, who has an international reputation in science and technology policy, has contributed significantly to the establishment of research policy as an important areas of inquiry in Australia, and to recognition of the important role of research. He is a member of the Australian Science and Technology Council which

advises the Prime Minister.

Professor Hill is an internationally recognised expert in the sociological analysis of scientific and technological development at the organisation and national level.

He is Chairman of the UN Science and

Intelligent materials research expands overseas connections

PROFESSOR Gordon Wallace has recently returned from a short visit to Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok.

Chulalongkorn and the University of Wollongong signed an exchange agreement last January and the purpose of this visit was to lay the groundwork for some collaborative research and training activities in Bangkok.

Professor Wallace lectured to post-graduate students from various disciplines and more than 50 scientists attended his one-day seminar on 'In Pursuit of Intelligent Materials'.

The scientists came from various disciplines from engineering to medical researchers and industrialists interested in solving practical problems. In an extension of activities in the South-East Asia region Professor Wallace will co-ordinate a training school on sensors and instrumentation for overseas research fellows.

This will be held at the University of Wollongong next month and sponsored by International Development Program (IDP).

IDP also will sponsor a workshop on a similar theme in Singapore in November.

Professor Wallace and three of his staff in collaboration with Dr Hari Gunusingham (NUS) and his staff will run the three-day workshop.

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Stephanie Short on top-level research committee

DEPARTMENT of Sociology lecturer Stephanie Short (pictured right) has been appointed to a top-level research committee by the Minister for Community Services and Health, Mr Howe.

Ms Short was invited to join the National Health and Medical Research Council's Public Health Research and Development Committee which provides grants to support and encourage the development of multi-disciplinary public health research in Australia.



Law Faculty appoints Canadian specialist in Energy Law

Ms SHEILA McALLISTER, a Canadian specialist in energy law, has accepted the position of Professor in the Faculty of Law at the University of Wollongong.

Ms McAllister is General Counsel with the Alberta Petroleum Marketing Commission, the largest marketer of crude oil in Canada.

The commission also regulates the natural gas industry under various statutes and regulations which Ms McAllister is involved in preparing, interpreting and implementing.

She has also had experience with a private corporation, Consolidated Companies, in securities law, pipelines, industry contracts and general corporate law, and has taught in both the Faculty of Law and the Department of Political Science at the University of Calgary.

She is a graduate in law and economics from the University of Calgary and has

been described as being one of that university's highest quality and most successful graduates.

She also has a Master of Education (English) from the University of Maine and a Diploma in Education (Accounting) from the University of Western Ontario.

She has combined a very successful professional career with scholarly and teaching interests.

Ms McAllister's specific experience in natural resources and mining law and her extensive practical understanding of the industry makes her an appropriate and valuable addition to Wollongong University's Faculty of Law.

The Faculty intends to develop several areas of specialisation including natural resources and mining law and court policy and administration. She will take up her appointment later this year.

Technology Policy Asia Network, which is developing international R & D and policy programmes throughout the Asian region.

The commitment of Commonwealth funds to the establishment of the National Centre for Research Policy at the University of Wollongong reflects the growing reputation of the University and its commitment to innovation and leading edge research.

Professor Johnston has just completed a paper on the transformation of in-house research into new products.

The paper, released by the Industry, Technology and Commerce Department, evolved from a survey of 128 companies in the communications and food processing industry.

The paper showed that companies with substantial investment in research and development tend to show a strong rate of growth in turnover.

The paper said the mark of a successful technology-based firm was a focus on a few related markets and products together with a high level of research and development.

ITS Group takes over computer support

THE Information Technology Services (ITS) Group has taken over the University's computer support function.

The group's formation rationalises the previous situation where support was provided by the Computer Services Unit, the Apple Consortium and the ADP Unit within Administration.

Each organisation had its own separate charter and reporting structure.

The ITS Group will provide a more integrated structure to address the needs of a diverse set of users around campus.

The structure and function of the ITS Group have been designed to provide a strong emphasis on support of basic computing services, an infrastructure to support the spread of the Campus Area Network and its use and support for users of PC applications.

The group will have four units: User Services, Business Development, Facilities and Technical Services and Systems Support.

The User Services Unit

(Gary Kelly, Manager Campus Personal Computing)

This unit will provide the campus with an over-the-counter first point of contact for services and information relating to ITS facilities. Where assistance is not based locally in the unit, it will refer problems to the appropriate support personnel within the ITS group.

The unit will also run the University's

retail personal computing outlet, selling Apple Macintosh computers, IBM-compatible PCs and software products.

The unit will be located in the former Apple Consortium Offices within the Library and provide first-line support for users of PC-based desktop applications. User Services will co-operate with the Centre for Staff Development (CSD) in the preparation of user training courses and educational materials and provide the ITS group with its publications, group newsletter and bulletin production services.

Facilities and Technical Services Unit (Manager: Jim McKee)

This unit has the responsibility of managing the University's central computer equipment and facilities and many of the

decentralised PC teaching laboratories.

It has responsibility for the Campus Area Network, with its high-speed fibre-optic backbone and Ethernet extension, being the major data communications resource of the University.

In conjunction with the User Services Unit, the unit operates the Central Response Centre for the reporting, tracking and resolution of service failure incidents.

The unit is involved in technical evaluations for the new campus telephone PABX system and its interaction with the campus network. The Computer Trainee Scheme is administered within this unit.

System Support Unit

(Manager to be appointed)

This unit provides the group with the specialist technical support for central software components such as operating systems, telecommunications systems, database products, security components and major applications like the Library on-line PALS system.

It is available to supply specialist consulting to campus users and provide solutions requiring a higher level of integration of facilities and software products.

Business Development Unit

(Manager: Geoff Hamer)

This unit solicits and develops business opportunities that will generate external revenue while not compromising service to internal University users.

On successful engagement with a client, the unit manages and co-ordinates their needs with the rest of the ITS group.

The unit also handles special projects such as the Computer Literacy Program and co-ordinated tendering and request for proposals for teaching laboratories.

Minimum fee for postgraduate award courses doubles

THE Australian Vice-Chancellors' Committee has condemned new Government directions that will double the cost of many postgraduate award courses from next year.

Courses offered for \$1800 a year for the past two years will rise to at least \$3300 a year. Students part-way through a two-year program or who are studying part-time will be hardest hit.

The universities are asking for a sunset clause to exempt these students if the Government proceeds with its unpopular ruling.

Programs affected are full-fee postgraduate award courses designed for professional upgrading or extension purposes.

The new Minister for Higher Education and Employment, Mr Baldwin, raised the minimum fee to one 'equal to or greater than double the discounted Higher Education Contribution Scheme charge'.

Students who pay the HECS charge up-front gain a discount. Next year's full HECS charge is expected to be \$1960 or \$1670 discounted.

Acting Executive Director of the Australian Vice-Chancellors' Committee, Mr John Mullarvey, said the about-turn in Government policy would deter many from upgrading their professional skills.

'The Minister's decision to double the cost of most courses must surely fly in the face of encouraging people to upgrade their skills,' he said.

'More importantly it is a breach of faith with students who are already enrolled.'

Open Day is shaping up to be spectacular

THE University's annual Open Day, to be held on Sunday August 26, will be a major promotion for the University.

Prospective students will be given information about courses, applications, prerequisites, accommodation, careers and how to approach tertiary studies.

Visitors with an ear for music will be entertained at a recital of Chopin works, performed by students from the Conservatorium.

A Spanish dancing display is also planned for the day. There will also be buskers, clowns, puppeteers, bands and associated activities.

For the second consecutive year, Planning and Marketing will conduct a survey by means of a questionnaire contained in the program. By completing the form visitors will have the chance of winning an Apple Mac Plus personal computer valued at more than \$4000.

The public forum this year will have the economy as its theme.

Speakers will be:

- Senator Bob McMullen, Secretary to the Treasurer;
- Senator Bronwyn Bishop, Secretary to the Opposition Economics and Business Task Force; and
- Chairman, Associate Professor John Steinke.

The Army will again report for duty, undertaking recruiting activities on campus during Open Day and during the following week on behalf of the University of NSW Regiment, University of Wollongong Company.

In the past the University has relied on student volunteers to assist with the day.

The Union's Secretary Manager, Noel Diffey, invited the University's clubs and societies to volunteer to help for the day.

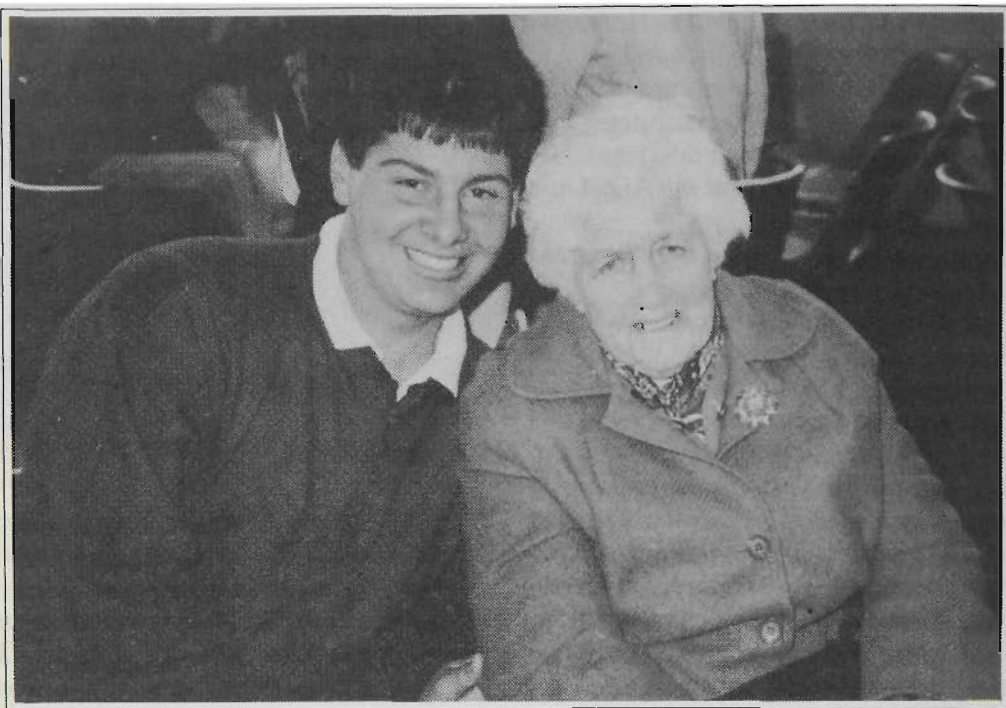
'This is an ideal opportunity to put something back into the University which has given you so much,' he said.

Physics student wins astronomy's

ROBERT REINFRANK, a 1989 Physics graduate, has been awarded the prestigious Bok Prize for astronomy.

Each year the Astronomical Society of Australia and Australian Academy of Science jointly sponsor the prize to encourage interest in astronomy among undergraduate students.

The Prize commemorates the energetic work of Bart Jan Bok in promoting undergraduate and graduate astro-

nomy during his term as Director of Mount Stromlo Observatory.

It is awarded to the senior undergraduate student submitting the best research report or substantial essay on an astronomical topic.

Reinfrank received the prize for work conducted as part of his Honours thesis — 'A CCD Survey of the Brightest Southern Galaxies'.

Energy efficiency grant for Wollongong

THE Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering has received a grant of \$150,000 from the NSW State Energy Research and Development Fund to develop an energy-efficient electric drive.

The project will build on expertise in the department and the campus-based Electricity Commission Centre for Energy Efficiency.

An electric drive consists of a motor, a set of power electronics to regulate the power to it and a control system. In this project, a novel motor will use powerful neodymium magnets and new control strategies will be incorporated into the power electronics. It is expected that the efficiency can be improved by about 14 per cent.

The chief investigator for the project is Dr Don Platt.

From Wollongong Uni to Goa, India

SECOND-year Bachelor of Commerce student, Miss Delaina Tanner, has been selected as one of ten business students Australia-wide to attend the Asia Pacific Leadership Development Seminars in Goa, India from August 14 to September 3.

The seminars will be attended by 13 member nations of the Asia Pacific region and is organised by AIESEC International.

AIESEC (pronounced eye-sec) is a French acronym for the International Association of Economics and Management Students and has been operating in Australia for 25 years — boasting 22 local committees and 4,000 members on campuses throughout Australia.

Wollongong is the newest addition to AIESEC Australia and already claims the largest membership base.

The organisation is responsible for Higher School Certificate seminars, annual national business breakfasts and also runs one of the largest graduate exchange programs in the world.

The international conference aims to foster and develop managerial and leadership skills; analyse Australia's position in the Asia Pacific region; provide a fo-

rum for the transfer of ideas and information between neighbours and trading partners and travel, listen and learn about different cultures and foster internationalism.

Pre-doctoral scholarship to Harvard

POSTGRADUATE Physics student Vincent McIntyre has been awarded a pre-doctoral scholarship to Harvard.

The scholarship will allow Vincent to spend one year at the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory while working on his thesis. It is expected that he will then return to Wollongong to complete his PhD.

Vincent is working in the Physics Department with Dr W Zealey on an astronomical project relating to starburst galaxies.

These galaxies appear to be undergoing unusually energetic bursts of star formation over extended regions.

It is to be expected that such galaxies will have a high incidence of supernova explosions.

Over the past year he has obtained radio and optical observations of a selection of such galaxies in an attempt to identify the most active sources. These will later be included in a supernova monitoring program which will begin using the Department's 40cm telescope.

Bok Prize

Department's 40cm telescope using the recently-acquired electronic CCD camera.

During this work he laid the basis for a continuing supernova search by obtaining images of several hundred Milky Way systems in the southern sky.

The presentation was made at the ASA General Meeting on July 18 by Dr D Allen, the Deputy Director of the Anglo-Australian Observatory.

AT ITS July meeting the University Council approved the awarding of four Fellowships of the University and an Honorary Doctor of Science degree to be confirmed at the October graduation ceremonies.

An Emeritus Professorship was also awarded.

Four recipients of honorary awards — Mr and Mrs Efrem Bonacina, Mr Fernando Lelli and Mr Franco Belgiono-Nettis — share an Italian heritage with many of the University's staff, students and friends.

By their individual achievements, the four recipients were also seen as models of commitment and initiative to members of their community and members of the University.

Fellows of the University

Efrem and Giulia Bonacina received Fellowships for their 'outstanding service to the Illawarra community and support of the University'. They are both Life Members of the Friends of the University and take an active part in supporting the University in the community.

Mr Fernando (Nando) Lelli, one of the region's most prominent union leaders over the last 20 years, was also honoured with a Fellowship for 'services to the trade union movement and commitment to the people of the University's surrounding community'.

Mr Bert Flugelman received his fellowship 'for services to the arts and to the University campus and its students'. Mr Flugelman, a prominent artist and sculptor, has been a Lecturer and Senior Lecturer in Creative Arts since 1984.

The honorary award of Doctor of Science was awarded to *Mr Franco Belgiono-Nettis*, CBE, AM, BSc 'for his achievements in engineering, his support for the arts and his management and development of Transfield Ltd., a company of importance to the Illawarra'.

Radio survey with CSIRO

MEMBERS of the Astronomy and Astrophysics Group in the Department of Physics have increased their involvement in radio astronomy in the last year.

This has in part been stimulated by the recent commissioning of the Australia Telescope operated by CSIRO and their moves to encourage collaborative projects with the universities.

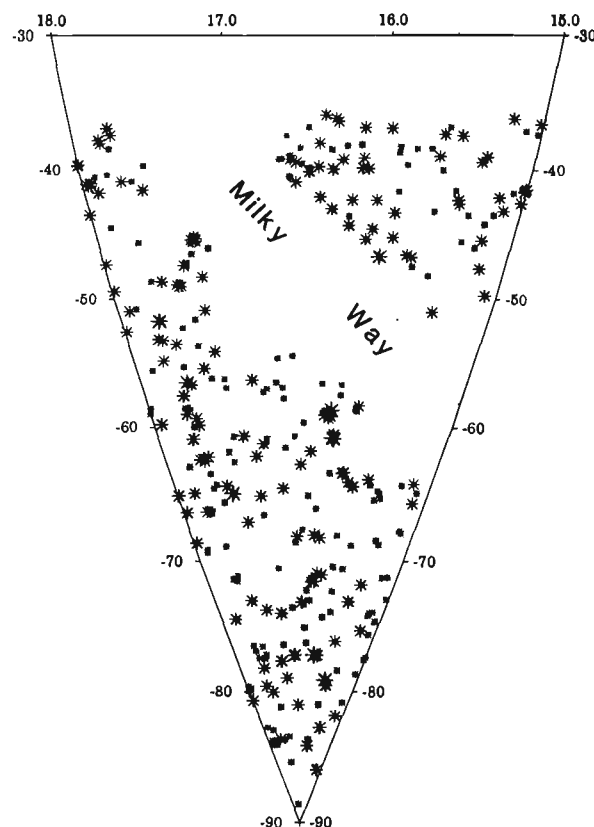
The involvement is a logical extension of our existing research in multi-spectral observations of star forming regions both in our own Milky Way and in other star-burst galaxies.

The collaboration resulted in M Suters, P Randall, V McIntyre and Dr W Zealey taking part in the CSIRO-MIT-NRAO 6cm Survey, carried out in May/June using the 64-metre Parkes radio telescope.

For 16 days the 1000-tonne telescope continuously scanned the sky, closely monitored by CSIRO staff, university students and academic staff.

The exercise provided a unique experience for the postgraduate students involved.

access to the catalogue of tens of thousands of objects, many of them previously unknown at radio wavelengths.

The work of establishing infra-red and optical identifications will be aided considerably by the computer image processing experience.

Participation in the International Astronomical Union meeting

THREE members of the Physics Department presented papers at the International Astronomical Union Asian-Pacific regional meeting at the University of NSW.

The IAU allows the development of astronomy in all of its aspects through international co-operation.

Dr W Zealey offered two papers on 'Astronomy and Astrophysics at the University of Wollongong: A Targeted Approach' and 'Star Formation and Outflows'.

Mr V McIntyre and Mr M Suters contributed papers on 'Starbursts in Ring and Irregular Galaxies' and 'IRAS Colours of Young Stellar Objects'.

The regional meeting was preceded by a symposium on the magellanic clouds. The Physics Department's Mr G K G Moore presented a paper entitled 'Long Period Variables in the Small Magellanic Cloud' at the symposium.

A highlight of the meeting for the Physics Department was the presentation of the Bok Prize for Astronomy to Mr R Reinfrank who graduated from the Department in 1989.
