



Is God left-handed?

MORE than 90 people from the campus and the community attended the first lecture in a public seminar series organised by the Graduate Faculty to highlight important research programs being conducted at the University - particularly those of interest to the lay person.

The University is carefully selecting speakers who can present complex material in an informative and understandable manner to a cross section of people including those with little or no technical background.

Head of the Graduate School of Health and Medical Sciences, Professor Philip Barter, discussed *Cholesterol and your heart* and differentiated between raised blood cholesterol levels caused by high density lipoprotein (HDL) which was not harmful and that caused by low density lipoprotein (LDL) which greatly increased the risk of heart disease.

The style and content of his lecture stimulated considerable interest in the audience and led to an animated question and answer session.

The next lecture in the series will be presented by Professor Leon Kane-Maguire and is called 'Is God left-handed?'

The title might suggest that Professor Kane-Maguire is from the Department of Philosophy. In fact he took up the Chair of Chemistry at the University of Wollongong in 1983, after 17 years as an active chemical researcher and academic in the United States and the U.K.

He has published some 120 scientific papers, and attracted large grants from outside the University to fund his research.

For the last eight years his major research interest has been the role of handedness in chemistry, and the development of ways to prepare drugs in one hand only.



Try to superimpose your left and right hands

We are all aware that our left and right hands, although perfect mirror images of each other, are not identical. For example, our left hand will not fit into a right-handed glove.

Left- and right-handedness is widespread in Nature, which has made use of this in a variety of remarkable ways - ranging from the ability of taste buds to distinguish between sweet and sour foods, to the construction of important biochemicals such as proteins.

This lecture surveys the impact of handedness in nature, as well as in our every-day lives including sport.

Are left-handers more or less intelligent than right-handers? Why are important biochemicals such as proteins

composed of building blocks all of the one (left) hand, when by the law of averages you would expect an equal number of left- and right-handed components?

The lecture concludes with a discussion of the importance of left- and right-handedness in medicine, with particular emphasis on drugs. Why is the one hand of a drug beneficial, while the other hand may be toxic?

Professor Kane-Maguire will describe his research aimed at preparing drugs in only the one desired hand.

This lecture will be held on Wednesday 31 July at 6.30pm in Pentagon 4.

More than 70 Year 11 and 12 students competed, representing 24 schools.

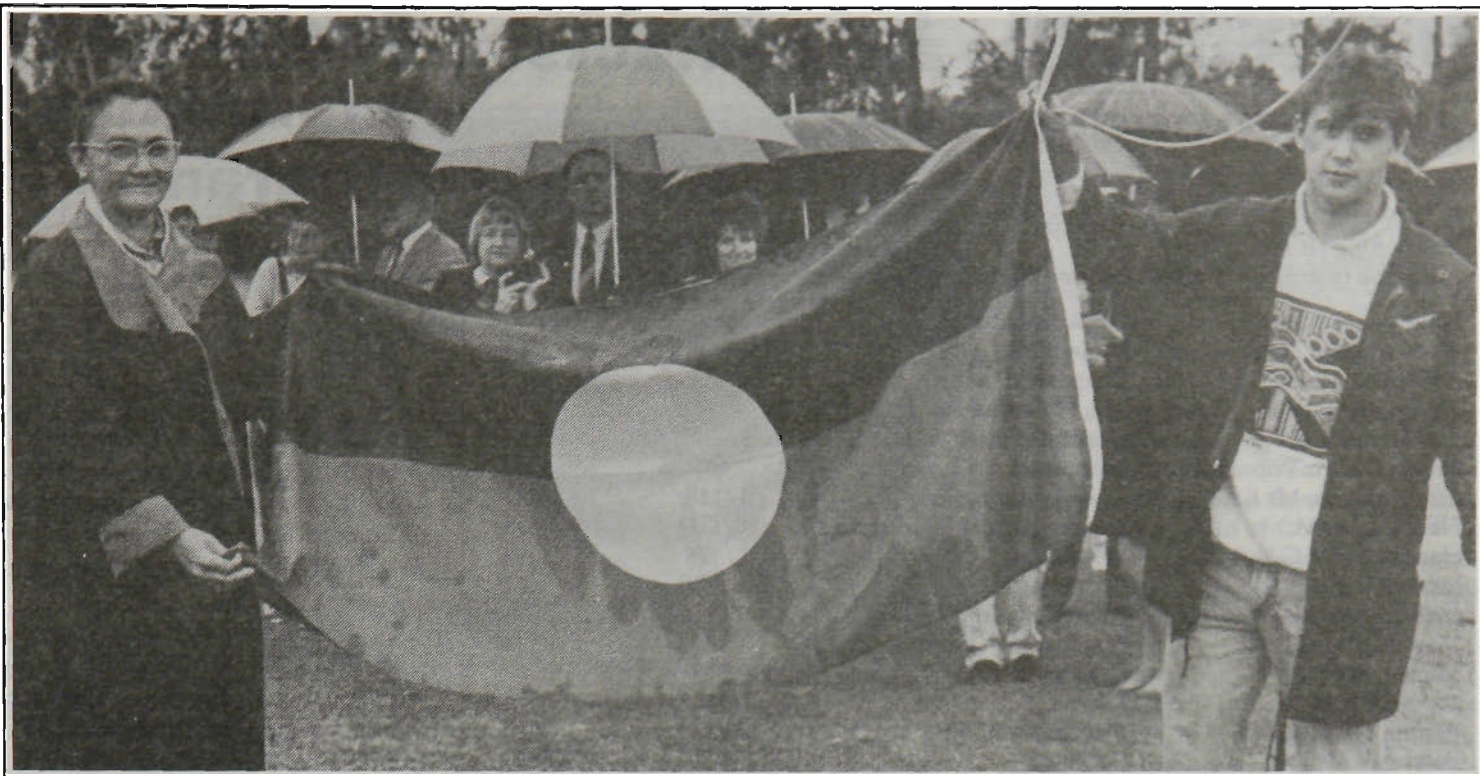
Each team member (teams of three) performed titrations on a different unknown. The combined lowest mean deviations from the true molarity, determined the winning teams.
