Major bequest to stimulate the study of local flora



UNSUCCESSFUL efforts have been made in the past to establish a herbarium in Wollongong.

Now thanks to the diligence and generosity of the late Miss Janet Cosh this goal will be realised.

The University of Wollongong has received a sizeable bequest from the estate of the late Janet Cosh, a resident of the Southern Highlands.

Janet Cosh also left to the Biology Department of the University a collection of about 1000 plant specimens, a library of books on botany and general natural history (several of them rare and valuable), many water-color paintings of plants and significant funds to support the study of botany.

The Biology Department already had several donated plant collections as a basis of a herbarium and with the addition of Janet's material a very comprehensive collection of specimens of the Illawarra and the Southern Highlands has been brought together.

The Biology Department has renamed the entire collection "The Janet Cosh Herbarium".

This reference collection of plants will be used to provide an identification service for the local region and also to facilitate undergraduate teaching at the University of Wollongong and other institutions.

It is intended to use funds from the bequest to provide student scholarships and technical support for the Janet Cosh Herbarium allowing the University to increase the resources of the Herbarium.

This will ensure that Janet Cosh's desire to see education in botany more widely available in the Illawarra region will come to fruition.

ASSOCIATE Professor Don Lewis from the Department of Economics took up the position of Professor of Economics on August 19.

Professor Lewis was appointed to this university in 1976. He is a recent recipient of the University's prestigious award for excellence in teaching.

ITC increases support to **University despite downturn**

DESPITE the financial hardship experienced during the past year, the Illawarra Technology Corporation Limited continued its contribution to the University of Wollongong.

This contribution was in the form of payments to academic staff, provision of scholarships and other contributions to Faculties and Departments, to a value exceeding \$2.1 million, and a greater overall contribution in kind and through the generation of awareness in the commercial marketplace and the community.

The Board of Directors of the ITC Limited, at its meeting held on August 8, heard that the corporation's operating performance was significantly affected by the severe economic downturn being experienced within Australia and internationally.


Nevertheless, sales turnover rose significantly from \$5.6 million in 1989-90 to \$13.6 million in 1990-91 and the value of research and development projects increased from some \$4 million to over \$11 million.

However, the group result, subject to audit, is a net loss, after extraordinary items, of \$1.345 million.

Markets for consulting and training services, particularly, experienced the dual effects of recessionary conditions and severe competition among service providers, resulted in substantial erosions to margins from the limited work available.

The corporation has undertaken a significant investment in technologies whose potential will be realised in future periods.

Two such examples are the Polymer Systems initiatives which constitute a



long-term research effort with significant potential benefits, and the Automation and Engineering Applications program whose success depends on a recovery in the manufacturing and airline industries.

These programs were started in a

buoyant economic environment, with a long-term view of return.

Research and development continued during the downturn of recent times, in order to maintain a presence in these strategically important sectors.

An investment has also been made in the provision of buildings to the value of \$12.0 million.

These buildings house such significant organisations as Nortel, Australian Telecom and the Electricity Commission's facilities and promote the University's image and reputation as a leading centre of research and development capability.

As a sign of its confidence in the future of the Illawarra Technology Corporation Limited, and in recognition that its primary task is the enhancement of the University's research and development capabilities, the Council of the University of Wollongong, at its meeting held on August 16, voted an amount of \$600,000 in reimbursement of the costs of completion of Stage III of the Illawarra Technology Centre.

1992 Marten Bequest Travelling Scholarships
