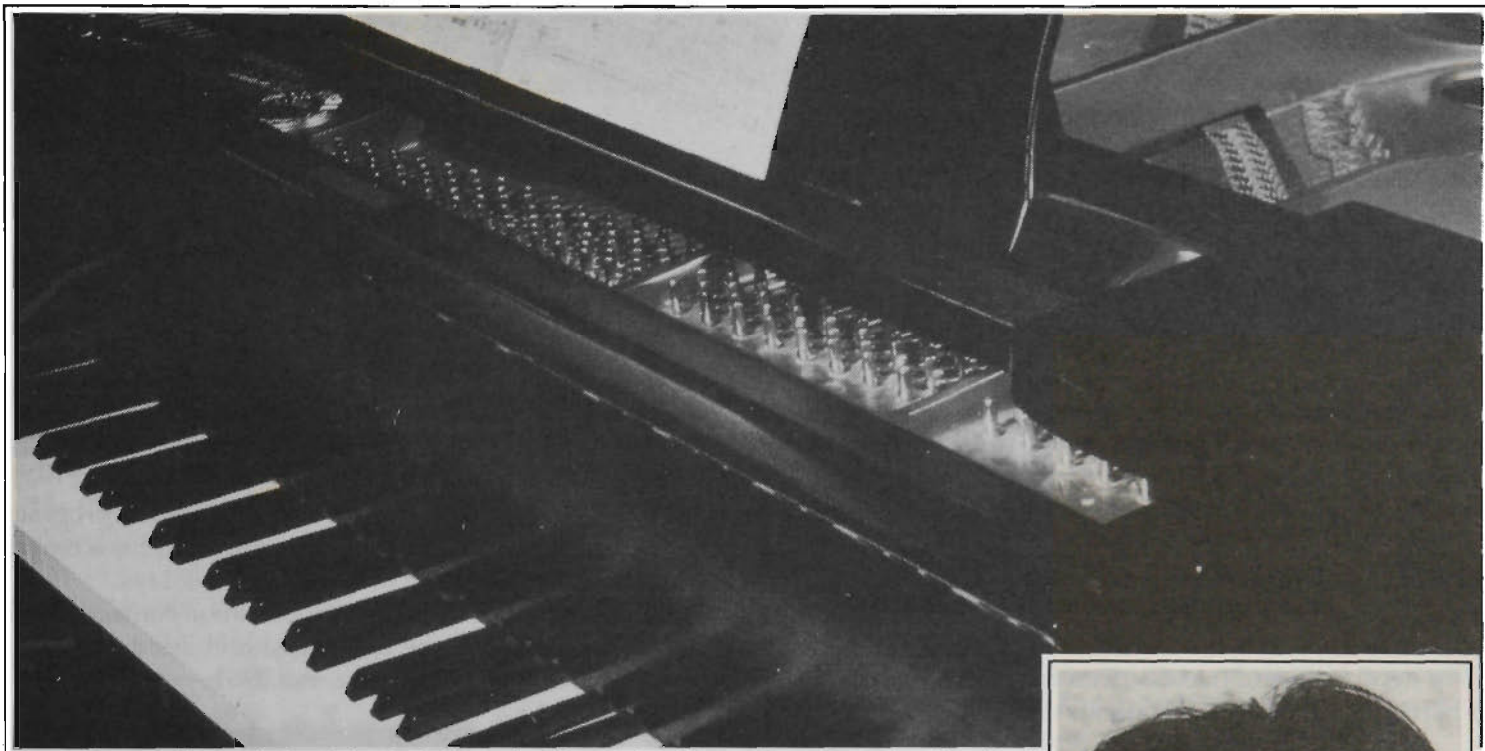


Piano competition winner to perform in Hope Theatre



Xiang-Dong Kong, winner of the Fifth Sydney International Piano competition held last month, will perform in the Hope Theatre on Wednesday 27 August at 8pm.

Acclaimed by commentators at the competition for his sensitive interpretation of a Mozart work, Xiang Dong has already been highly successful in other international competitions.

Xiang-Dong Kong started his musical training at age five. After the Cultural Revolution in 1978, he was one of the privileged few to be admitted into the re-opened Shanghai Conservatory of Music, where he studied until 1988.

He has made debut appearances at the Lincoln Centre's Alice Trully Hall in New York, the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam and the Ambassador Auditorium in Los Angeles. He has performed throughout North America,

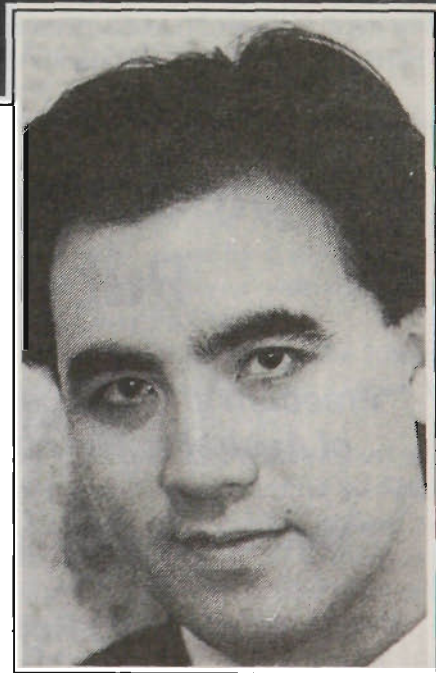
Europe, the Middle East and Asia, and has appeared with many international orchestras.

A native of Shanghai, China, he was the youngest prizewinner in Moscow's 1986 Tchaikovsky Competition and Spain's 1987 Paloma O'Shea Competition. Recently he was named the Xerox/Affiliate Artist for 1992-1994.

He has been the subject of articles in several publications, including being featured as a young artist in Isaac Stern's film documentary *From Mao to Mozart*.

He has appeared in several television and radio productions in China. Currently, he is a third year student at the Curtis Institute of Music, studying with Claude Frank.

Child Care Australia, November 1990 (Catalogue No. 4402.0): This presents the results from the National Child Care Survey, a nationwide survey the ABS conducted in November 1990. The major aim of this survey was to provide information about existing child care arrangements made for children under 12 years of age and the

demand for additional care for these children.

The Labour Force, 1978-1989 (Catalogue No. 6204.0): This looks at the civilian population 15 years of age and over. It covers the civilian labour force, employed persons, unemployed persons and persons not in the labour force. Characteristics shown include labour force status, age, marital status, birthplace, period of arrival in Australia, States and Territories, capital cities, industry, occupation, status of worker, hours worked, participation rates and duration of employment.

Ms Choi will work in the Ceramics and Sculpture studios, hold an exhibition of her work in the Long Gallery and she hopes to construct a major outdoor sculptural piece.

Ms Choi studied for her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree at Keimyung University in Daegu and her Master of Fine Arts at Hong-Ik University Seoul.

She moved to Italy to study in 1982 and gained her Diploma in Sculpture from the Accademia, Florence.

She has undertaken further study in

Ceramics at the Institute of Ceramic Art at Sesto Fiorentino and lately has taken up an offer to continue her work at Faenza, a centre of ceramic art for many centuries.

Ms Choi has taught for the colleges of fine art at Youngnam, Keimyung and Htosung Universities in Daegu.

She has gained recognition as a sculptor in Korea and Italy, where she has received many awards and prizes including:

- 1989 First Prize, National Sculpture Contest 'Giuseppe Pescetti' by the A.I.C. of Florence and Sesto Fiorentino
- 1991 First Prize, National Contest 'Prize Italy' given by the Arts review 'Eco d'Arte Moderna' with the patronage of Certaldo City.
- 1991 Gold Award in the International Contest of Ceramic Arts by the City Gualdo Tadino (PG).

In 1990 Ms Choi collaborated with two members of the staff of the School of Creative Arts, Peter Shepherd and Lindsay Duncan, in an exhibition of sculpture, painting and drawing at the Teorema Gallery in Florence.

The exhibition of Ms Choi's latest work will be held in the Long Gallery from August 4-25.

The exhibition will be officially opened by Associate Professor Peter Shepherd on August 14 at 7pm.

A highlight of the week was the 'Trial of Goldilocks' performed at the Court House on Sunday and again on Thursday.

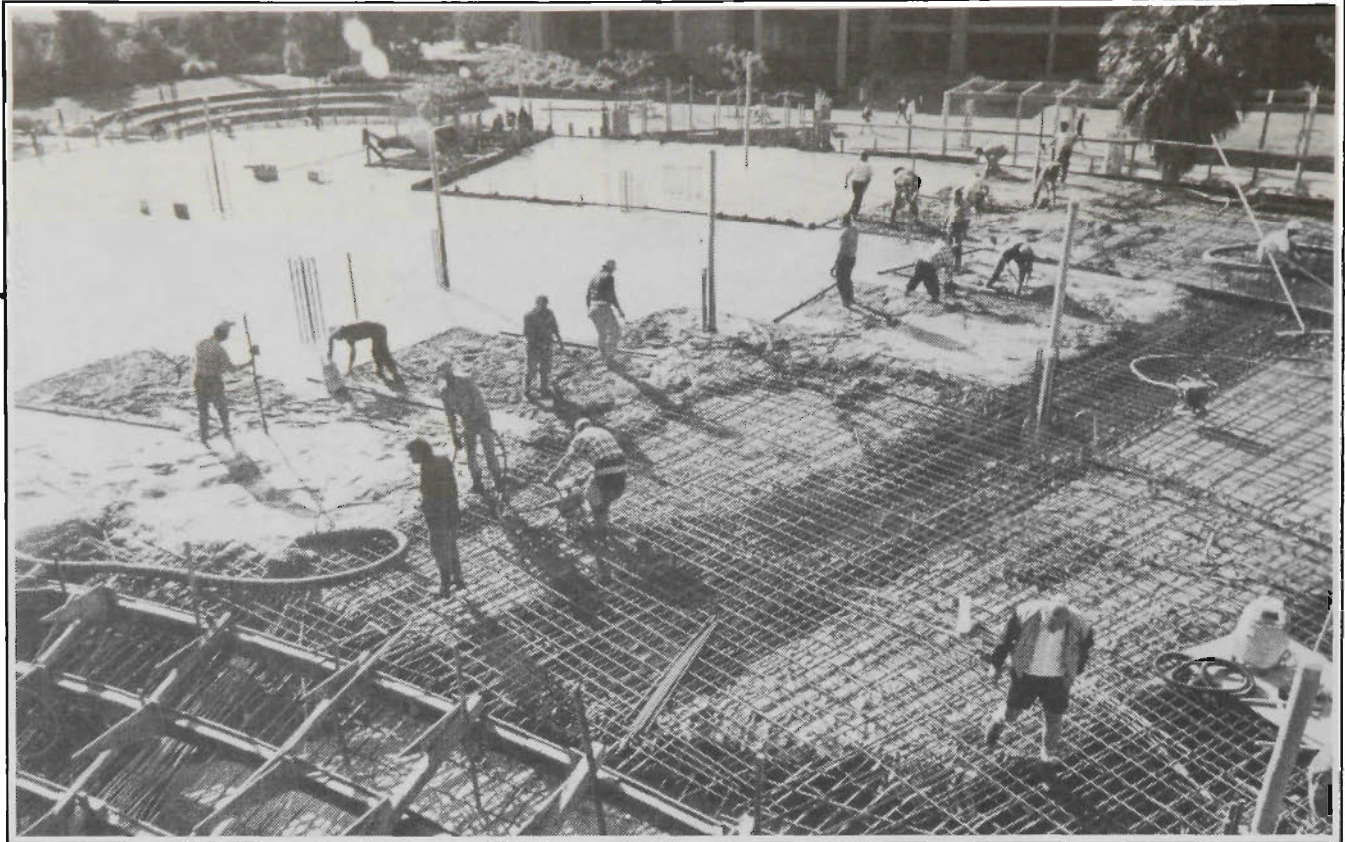
Students of the Faculty of Law and members of the local bar performed in the play in the Supreme Court.

Biggest concrete pour seen on campus

On 31 July more than 180 trucks entered the University grounds to deliver 800 cubic metres of concrete for the biggest single pour seen on the campus.

They operated continuously from 5.30am to 7pm.

This pour represented an important stage in the construction of the Keira View Building which will house the

Faculties of Law and Education and will also contain restaurants and conference facilities.

Nippy Crete, in conjunction with Boral Industries provided the concrete, and three pumps provided by Cleary Bros were operating. Costing \$13.1m, the building is due for completion in 1994.

Tom Horner retires

One of the longest serving academics on the staff of the University, Dr Tom Horner, retired on 31 July.

He joined the Mathematics Department of the Wollongong University College of the University of NSW in May, 1961. Accommodation was at that time shared with the Technical College in Gladstone Avenue, the move to the present campus was made in early 1962.

The Mathematics staff then consisted of two full-time lecturers, and some part-time staff.

Before joining the University, Tom was a school teacher, for three years at Narrandera High School, and more than four years at Wollongong High School. Tom and his wife Barbara have three children, Robyn, Graham and Kathryn, all graduates of the Uni-

versity of Wollongong, in Science, Civil Engineering, and Commerce, respectively.

Tom has a BSc (Honours in Mathematics) and a DipEd from the University of Sydney, and a PhD from the University of Wollongong.

The title of his PhD thesis was 'Chebyshev Polynomials in the Solution of Partial Differential Equations', and the study of Chebyshev polynomials and their applications, together with Numerical Linear Algebra, remains his main interest in the field of Numerical Analysis.

He has been Head and Acting Head of the Department of Mathematics on several occasions, in particular being Head of Department during 1987 and 1988.

The department held a farewell function for him on 7 August.

The University's Occupational Health and Safety Committee have identified this week as University of Wollongong Safety Week.

A range of activities have been organised to promote occupational safety awareness on this Campus and you are invited to participate.

One of the features of Safety Week will be the launch of a Laboratory Safety Manual prepared by Occupational Health and Safety Co-ordinator, Jeff Owers, and Ross Lilley from the Department of Biology, and an address by the Director of the National Safety Council of Australia, Dr Pat Copping, on Thursday 13 August.

All staff are welcome to participate.

A Safety Package has been distributed to Departmental Heads. The package includes all University policies and procedures, which are safety related, a list of safety videos available from the Occupational Health and Safety Unit in Personnel Services Branch and extracts of supervisors legislative responsibilities under various acts. A request will be made for Departmental Heads to use this kit as a catalyst to discussion and review of safety practices in their department.

On Monday there was a presentation, aimed at technical staff in workshop environments on machine guarding.

On Tuesday Mr Owers discussed 'Occupational Hazards for Cleaning Staff' and Mr Sandy Gardiner from the Royal Australian Chemical Institute presented a short address on 'Occupational Health and Hygiene in a University Environment - Exposure and Control Levels'.

Today, Wednesday 12 August, Mr Len Smith from Wollongong City Council will present a lecture, Evacuation Procedures and Problems.

A demonstration and practice in the use of fire extinguishers will be presented by BHP Fire Fighting Unit from 12.30-1.30pm in Building 14 and adjacent grass area.

On Thursday 13 August from 12.30-1.30pm in the Union Building there will be a demonstration of Chair-mate by Security Staff.

Chair-mate is a manually-operated wheelchair lift for transporting wheelchairs on stairs in an emergency situation.

Also on Thursday from 12.45-1.30pm in the Union Function Rooms there will be a launch of the University of Wollongong Laboratory Safety Manual.

A keynote address will be made by the Dr Copping, Director, the National Safety Council of Australia and there will be a presentation of certificates of commendation for Safety Awareness resulting from site safety inspections.

During the week the Sports and Recreation Centre will screen sports safety videos.

The Occupational Health and Safety Committee is comprised of employee representatives, nominated through major unions on campus, and employer representatives.

All major safety issues on campus should be directed to this committee.

The committee has been active in the last 12 months ensuring the safe removal of asbestos from several University buildings.

A policy directly addressing the safety issues of asbestos on campus has been implemented.

The committee has also been involved in the personal safety issue which concerned staff and students at the end of last year and is continuing to monitor a range of strategies to address this problem.

New and improved bus services between central Wollongong and the University

Avoid parking fines, save the \$2 admission fee, cut down on pollution, meet new friends, take a long lingering look at the escarpment, finish your project, lend dad your car, have a drink at the bar, deprive administration of income, go into town at lunch time without losing your parking space, give your right foot a rest, hold your breakfast toast with both hands, but try the bus for a change. You know it makes sense!

With the amalgamation of the Horrell and JJ Hill services a greater variety of route options are available for members of the campus community to travel by bus from the University to central Wollongong and all points in between.

The following services travel between the University and the City, and the colour of the bus, be it brown or green is not important:

Route 10: the old Horrell service runs via Gwynneville, Porter St, Weerona, Flinders St and Burrelli St to the beach.

Route 53: runs through West Wollongong and via the Central Railway Station into the City and then heads south to Warrawong, Warilla etc to Shellharbour Square. This is the fastest route to the city centre.

Route 65: runs via the North Wollongong beach area to the Central Railway Station. From there it proceeds to Port Kembla via Cringila, Lake Heights and Warrawong.

Professor Morse presents two papers

Professor Carol Morse, from the Department of Nursing, has presented research papers at two recent world conferences.

The conferences were in Stockholm Sweden, in June and in Brisbane in July.

One of the papers was on the interactive affect between psychological state and ovarian hormones in premenstrual syndrome sufferers undergoing a specially designed cognitive therapy programme.

The second was a report on the dif-

ferential characteristics of middle-aged women who seek help and treatment during menopause compared with those who do not.

Professor Morse also was invited to participate in a symposium on methodological issues in premenstrual syndrome research.

The symposium included experts on premenstrual research methodology from Edinburgh, New York, Sweden, Wisconsin and New Zealand.

She chaired a symposium on women's health centres in Australia, Eastern Europe, Scandinavia and Britain.

The Stockholm congress was attended by about 750 delegates from Australasia, Asia, Europe, Scandinavia and North and South America.

The congress was hosted by the International Society of Psychosomatic Obstetrics and Gynaecology and held at the Stockholm Conference Centre, 17- 21 June.

At the World Congress of Behaviour Therapy at Jupiters Casino, Gold Coast, 4-8 July, Professor Morse presented a paper emphasising the contributions of cognitive therapy to women's health.

This conference, hosted by the World Behaviour Therapy Association and the Australian Behavioural Modification Association of which Professor Morse is a former state president, attracted participants from North America, Britain, Australasia and Japan.

Professor Morse's papers originate from her extensive research activities in women's health particularly related to psychoendocrine functions during the menstrual cycle and reproductive years of women.

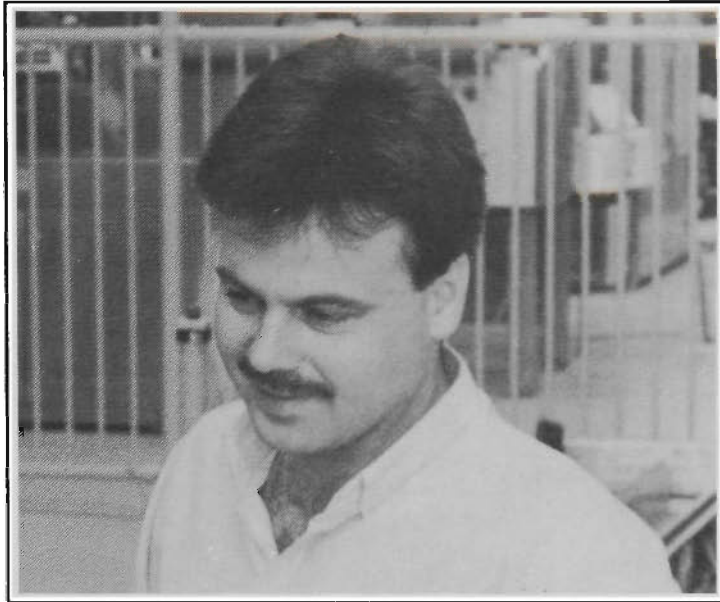
Dr Elias Siores shares award

Dr Elias Siores from the Department of Mechanical Engineering shared the Ramsey-Moon Award with Mr I. Squires from BHP-SPPD, Welding Research and acting Director of the newly-established Co-operative Research Centre in Materials Joining.

The medal and cheque for \$100 were recently presented to Dr Siores by the Chairman of the Welding Technology Institute of Australia as recognition for the best 1991 paper titled *The Future for Research and Development in the Fabrication Industry*, which was published in the Proceedings of the 39th institute's conference.

The paper debates the issues facing the welding fabrication industry including co-operative research between industry, research organisations, and government.

It discusses the need for appropriate technology and the development of training skills to support this technology, the definition of goals to direct technological development and the

need to produce at the quality level appropriate to customer's operations.

The award is the most prestigious offered by the institute. Also, in 1991, Dr Siores was offered a Fellow Membership from the institute as recognition for his continuous support and services

he has provided to the institute.

Most of all, for his initiative taken to found the Illawarra branch of the institute in 1990, a branch that has at least 100 individual members and more than 15 corporate member organisations in the last two years of operation.

Lively interest in research into reading

A recent one-day conference organised by the Applied Cognitive Research Group from the Psychology Department of the University of Wollongong brought together researchers and speakers regarding the process of reading and the nature of specific reading disabilities.

The visitors had a comprehensive knowledge of Australian and International Research.

Speakers from the USA, UK and Australia examined several important issues relevant to teachers, special educators, counsellors, psychologists

and parents, and summarise current literature that examines the causes of reading difficulties.

More than 100 people attended and provided a lively and interactive audience.

Later in the week Professor William Lovegrove, Head of the Department of Psychology gave a public lecture, *Understanding and treating Dyslexia: The contribution of visual processing*, which was attended by 120 teachers, parents and interested members of the campus and Wollongong community.

This lecture is part of a series of lec-

tures presented by the Graduate Faculty to explain some of the outstanding research to the general public.

The lectures are designed to be understood by the lay person but also have something of interest for the professional.

Ultimate challenge for would-be economists

The Department of Economics was one of the NSW locations for the 'Managing the Australian Economy' competition which is sponsored annually by Mobil.

More than 400 school teams attended various locations throughout NSW on 24 July and attempted to run a computer model to simulate the Australian economy over 10 years.

The model had a range of variables including monetary and fiscal policy. The teams had to decide on policy options such as income tax, interest rates and sales tax. They received a score based on the 'health' of their economy.

Eighteen teams from Illawarra schools, organised by Ed Wilson from the Department of Economics, used the Department's micro computer labs to test their knowledge of economics and political acumen.

A team from Bulli High School won the Illawarra competition. The winning NSW team will go to Canberra in August for the national competition.
