The analytic approach to solving many real-world problems in industrial and environmental applications aims at reducing these to algebraic equations. 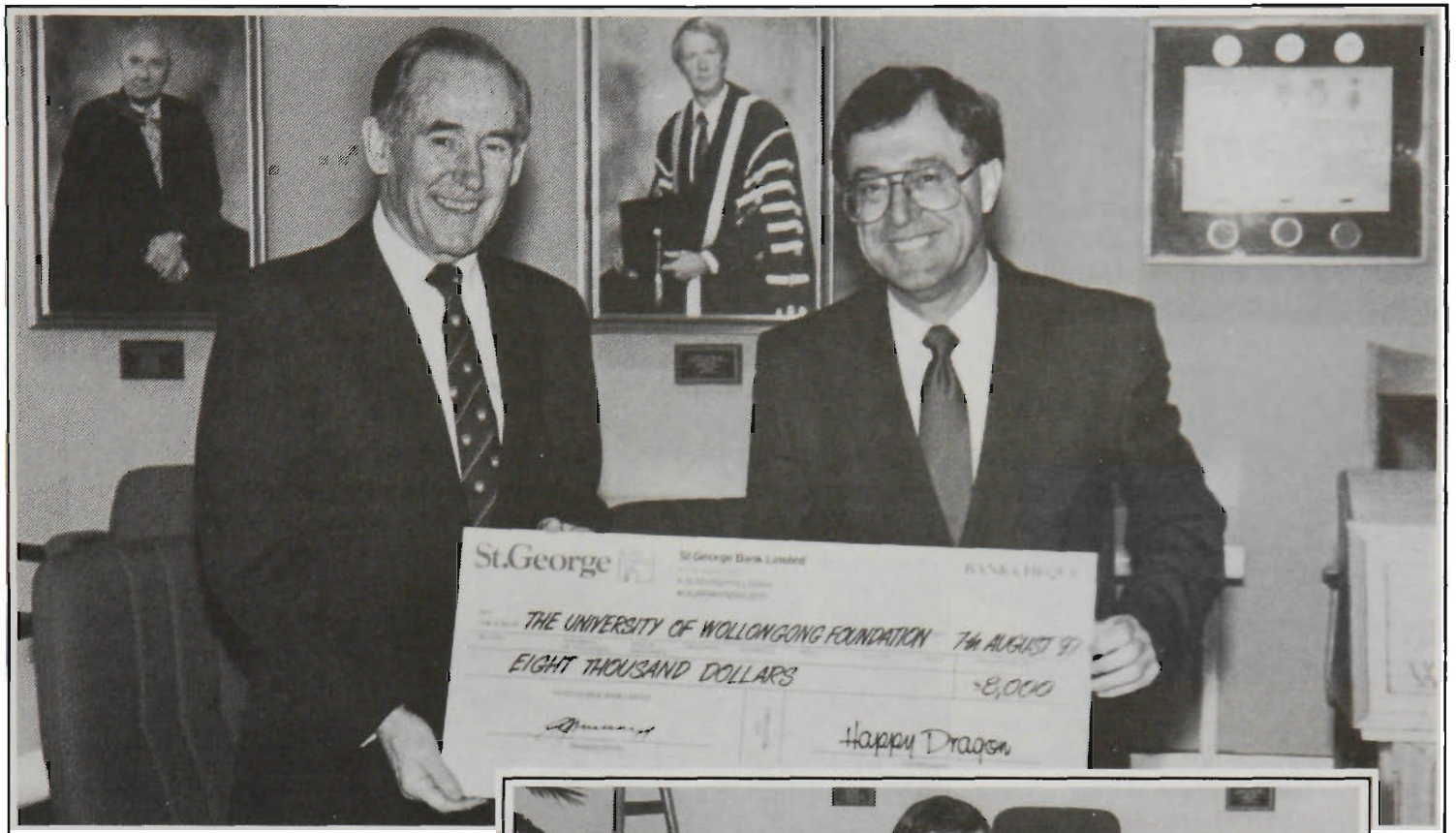

Donald Horne to launch *Australia's Italians*

Professor Donald Horne will launch two books, *Australia's Italians* and the Italian translation *Italo-Australiani*, during his visit to the University of Wollongong on Wednesday 26 August.

Professor Horne will be presenting a public lecture on *Freedom and independence for the golden lands of Australia: The coming Australian republic* in Pentagon 1 on Wednesday 26 August at 12.30pm,

At 3pm Professor Horne will launch the books in the University Union Bookshop.

The books were edited by Stephen Castles, Centre for Multicultural Studies, Caroline Alcorso, freelance researcher, Gaetano Rando, Department of Modern Languages and Ellie Vasta, Department of Sociology.

Italians were the largest non-British group to migrate to Australia during the post-war migration boom.

Today there are more than a quarter of a million Italian-born people in the country.

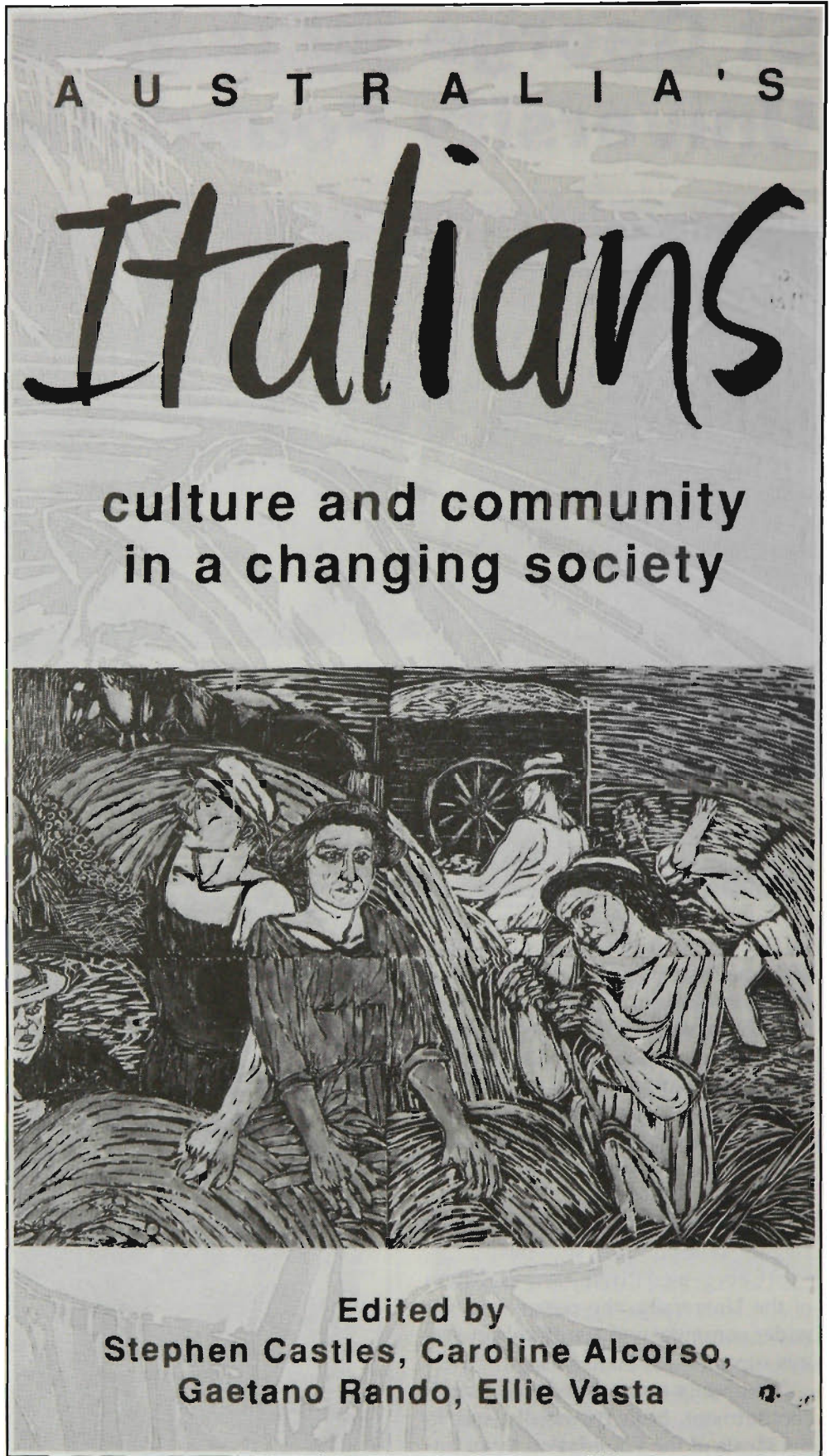
Australia's Italians examines the emergence of Italian culture and community, and the impact Italians have had on Australia. Italians started arriving in Australia in the 19th Century.

Some worked as itinerant labourers, while others established farms, fishing industries and businesses. Later settlers became 'factory fodder' in the cities. Their lives were hard, but for many, frugality and tenacity led to success.

Assimilationist policies tried to turn the Italians into 'New Australians', but they were determined to keep their culture and language.

They established clubs and associations, churches and welfare associations. Italian neighbourhoods like Carlton in Melbourne and Leichhardt in Sydney gave Australian cities a new cosmopolitan flavour.

Drawing together contributions from sociologists, historians, language ex-



The cover of the book *Australia's Italians*

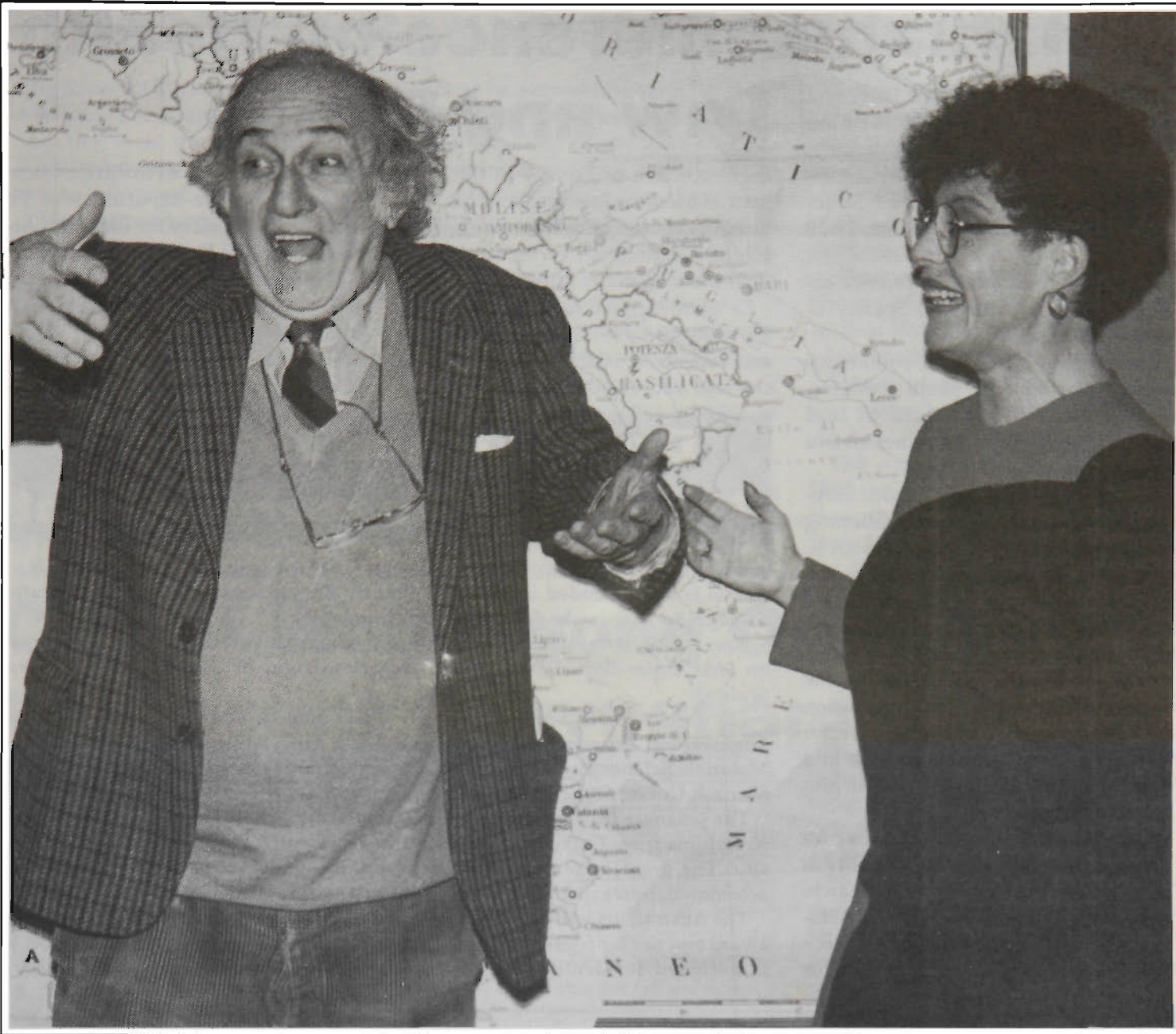
perts and community figures, the editors address a vital theme.

Australia developed as a society modelled on British traditions and culture, and has had great difficulty coming to terms with its place in a post-colonial world.

They argue that the Italians and other

Europeans have changed Australia, making it more open and cosmopolitan, and thus better able to deal with post-European future.

Giovanni Finzi-Contini visits Wollongong

A leading Italian academic and writer has renewed his association with a University of Wollongong Research Fellow while on a trip to Australia.

Professor Giovanni Finzi-Contini, a geo-physicist by training and the Chair of Geophysics Applied to Engineering in the Department of Civil Engineering in the Faculty of Engineering of the University of Florence, is also famous for his non-scientific writing.

Among these is *Tattered Freedom*, a collection of poetry in verse which was translated by Madeleine Strong

Cincotta, Hon. Research Fellow of the University of Wollongong.

This collection will be released in the United Kingdom later this year.

His other works include *Itinerari* (a second collection of poems, not yet translated) and his novel *The Longest Journey of A.M.*

Professor Finzi-Contini arrived in Australia on 23 July for three months.

He will be giving several lectures as visiting professor and writer-in-residence at the Universities of Western Australia and Adelaide.

But most of his time will be spent at the University of Wollongong, where he will be speaking on several topics of general cultural interest as well as on his work and on his unique historical experiences. He also will continue work on his forthcoming novel while in Wollongong.

Professor Finzi-Contini is a member of a very ancient and well-known Jewish Italian family, which was made even more famous by the book and the subsequent film *The Garden of the Finzi-Continis*.

Canadian conference on Health Law and Ethics

Colin Thomson, Faculty of Law, and Paula Boddington, recently Visiting Fellow, Department of Philosophy, presented papers at an international conference on Health Law and Ethics held in Toronto, Canada from 19-23 July 1992.

It was the third such conference organised by the American Society of Law and Medicine.

The major subjects of the conference were AIDS, national health systems, women's health, epidemiology and public health, reproductive health and transplantation.

Discussion of national health services included ethical bases for rationing or limiting services, an issue which is, at a local level, presently before the Ethics Committee of the Illawarra Area Health Service, and, at a national level, a continuing controversy.

There was also discussion of the emerging role of clinicians as managers, a matter under consideration within the Department of Public Health and Nutrition in the Faculty of Health and Behavioural Sciences.

Mr Thomson delivered a paper on issues of privacy and confidentiality in access to medical records for research.

He drew from his work for the National Health and Medical Research Council on the present Guidelines for

the Protection of Privacy in the Conduct of Medical Research and his continuing experience as a member of the Ethics Committee of the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare.

Dr Boddington delivered a paper on the relationships between organ donors and recipients, issues related to those she had addressed in a recent confer-

ence on The Ethics of Health Resources, organised by the department of Philosophy on behalf of the Illawarra Area Health Service Ethics Committee.

The conference attracted more than 400 delegates from a wide variety of countries.

The largest international contingent, 31 delegates, was from Australia."

Druce Dunne shares in Monbusho Research Grant

A collaborative research venture between Japanese and Australian materials scientists is being funded in 1992 and 1993 by the Japanese Ministry of Education through the Monbusho Joint Research scheme.

Four Australian and five Japanese researchers are involved in a research program on *First Order Diffusionless Phase Transformations on Atomic and Mesoscopic Scales*.

The four Australians are Professor Druce Dunne (Department of Materials Engineering, University of Wollongong), Dr Allan Morton (CSIRO Division of Materials Science and Technology), Dr Trevor Finlayson (Department of Physics, Monash University) and Dr Steve Wilkins (CSIRO).

The Japanese collaborators are Professors K. Otsuka, T. Suzuki, S. Miyazaki and K. Oshima from Tsukuba University and Professor T. Ohba from Teikyo University. The grant of four million yen (approximately \$40,000) covers travel and accommodation expenses for reciprocal international visits by the researchers.

The Australians will each visit Tsukuba for three weeks during the period of the award and the Japanese will attend a workshop in Australia in March 1994 which is designed to identify and discuss the significant outcomes of the research program.

Professor Ohba – an expert on x-ray diffraction and crystallographic analysis – will be visiting Australia this year under the auspices of the grant.

From 4-9 September he will be at the University of Wollongong for discussions with Professor Dunne and other researchers working on martensitic phase transformations.

Professor Dunne will be mainly associated with Professor Kazuhiro Otsuka in collaborative research on the crystallography of the martensitic transformation in Au-Cd alloys and the interfacial structure of $g_0(\gamma, \text{sup}3(\gamma))$ martensite in Cu based shape memory alloys.

Professor Dunne is planning his stay in Japan for September 1993.

He will also include attendance of the third International Conference on Advanced Materials to be held in Ikebukuro, Tokyo and will visit Osaka and Kyoto Universities to further research interests in welding and thermomechanical processing of steels.

Analysis Research Group's visitor

The Analysis Research Group within the Faculty of Informatics is sponsoring the visit of Professor Igor Kluvánek to the University for two weeks this month.

He obtained his first degree in electrical engineering at the Slovak Polytechnic University in Bratislava, but subsequently turned to mathematics.

While still in Czechoslovakia, he generalised the Shannon sampling theorem of information theory, a result which has applications to information processing.

He took up a visiting position at the Flinders University of South Australia in 1967, and subsequently was appointed to a chair.

Here he pursued his main work, in vector integration and related areas.

Subsequently he spent a period as a research fellow at the Centre for Mathematical Analysis in the Australian National University, returning to Czechoslovakia in 1990, where he now holds a position at the University of Transport and Communications.

He has always been interested in the relationship between mathematics and other areas, and is noted for his work on the application of vector integration to control theory.

He also has done work on clarifying the mathematical foundations of the Feynman integral, originally introduced by the physicist Richard Feynman.

He has a serious interest in philosophical questions, especially those of epistemology and human cognition.

He also has publications concerning pedagogy and the history of mathematics.

Professor Sid Morris, Dean of the Faculty of Informatics, is a former student of his; and so is Dr Rod Nilsen of the Mathematics Department.

He will give a seminar while here, and interact with members of the Analysis Research Group.

The seminar's title is *Still in the footsteps of Archimedes*. It will be presented on Thursday, 20 August from 1.30 pm in room 15.204.

City of Wollongong Orchestra to present Conyngham piece

The City of Wollongong Symphony Orchestra will present its third 1992 subscription concert in the IMB Theatre, Illawarra Performing Arts Centre, on Saturday evening 29 August.

The orchestra will be the largest ever gathered for a CWSO concert, with many additional percussion instruments taking part in the performance of Barry Conyngham's 1986 piece *Recurrences*.

This 15-minute work was written for the University of Melbourne Orchestra and subsequently recorded by the ABC with the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra and commercially released on CD.

This will be the work's first local performance and only the second major orchestral work by Conyngham to be played in Wollongong since he assumed the Chair in Creative Arts at the University of Wollongong in January 1990.

The concert has been entitled *Last Night at the Proms* and overall reflects programming common for the final Saturday evening of London's famous summer concerts.

It features a new or recent work sharing the bill with lots of popular classics, inevitably including Elgar's *Pomp and Circumstance March No.1* with its famous *Land of Hope and Glory* refrain and Parry's anthem *Jerusalem* in which the audience joins 'singalong' fashion.

Among other popular classics to be

heard are the Faure *Pavane*, Handel's *Hallelujah Chorus* (in which items the orchestra will be joined by the University Singers and Illawarra Choral Society), the Overture from *The Merry Wives of Windsor* by Nicolai and the Clarinet Concerto No.2 by Weber, in which the soloist will be Dr Brian Martin, an academic staff member of the Science and Technology Studies department at the University of Wollongong and a well-known author on social and environmental issues and who also hap-

pens to be a superlative clarinet virtuoso!
