H.P.S. Puts Shine on Campus

Genetic engineering is possibly the most important technological advance since the computer.

Dr John Shine, an eminent Australian scientist, who worked extensively in America, and who is now doing research at the Australian National University, has been involved with some of the world's most significant developments in gene cloning.

Recombinant DNA has three areas of application:

1. Medical
2. Industrial
3. Agricultural

The technique involves the cloning of genes to mass produce specific genes or genes products such as insulin, relaxin and endorphins.

The detection and treatment of genetic disorders will ultimately lead to gene therapy.

These topics and those related to the ethics of this new technology will be discussed by Dr Shine, who will speak on "Genetic Engineering: Its Implications for the Present and the Future" at Wollongong University at 8.00 p.m., Friday, 24th September in the Main Lecture Theatre, Building 14.

Lilley to Japan

for Photosynthesis Work

Dr Ross Lilley of the Department of Biology will be working in Japan for two months from the 15th September, under the auspices of the Japan/Australia Science and Technology Agreement. During this time he will be doing collaborative research with Professor Y. Inoue at the Institute of Physical and Chemical Research, Saitama. The research project is on adenine nucleotide levels in thermophilic blue-green algae.

Dr Lilley will also visit a number of photosynthesis research laboratories in other Institutes and Universities in Japan.

The Japan/Australia Science and Technology Agreement is supporting collaborative research on "The Integration of Photosynthetic Carbon Metabolism as a Basis of Plant Productivity". Although both Australia and Japan are strong in photosynthesis research, Australian scientists working in this area have traditionally maintained links with overseas colleges in Europe and the U.S.A., rather than with Japan. The aim of the Agreement is to establish more effective links between Australian laboratories and our Japanese counterparts.

VISITING CATHOLIC SCHOLAR FRIDAY, 29 OCTOBER, 1982

The University Catholic Society and a group of people within the Friends have organised a visit by Mr Karl Schmude of the University of New England.

Mr Schmude was born in Sydney in 1947. He was educated at Christian Brothers' College, Rose Bay, and later at Waverley College. In 1964 he began tertiary studies, completing a B.A. at Sydney University in 1966 and a Diploma in Librarianship at the University of New South Wales in 1967.

Mr Schmude first worked at the State Library of New South Wales and later as Librarian-in-Charge at the Inservice Education Library of the New South Wales Department of Education. In 1970 he married and moved to Armidale, New South Wales, where he is now Deputy University Librarian at the University of New England.

In 1977 he was the recipient of a Fulbright University Administrator Award which afforded him the opportunity of a four-month study tour of academic libraries in the United States.

He has been a frequent contributor to Australian Catholic newspapers and journals such as the "Catholic Weekly" (Sydney) and the "Annals". His writings have also been widely published overseas - in journals like the London "Tablet", the Jesuit weekly "America" and the Chicago "Critic".

He has produced a range of pamphlets, including several of a biographical nature (for example, one on G.K. Chesterton). His pamphlet comparing changes in cricket and Catholicism in recent times was reported at length in the "National Times" in January 1981. He is currently completing a book on a new popular Catholic identity in Australia.

VISITING ISLAMIC SCHOLAR MONDAY, 18 OCTOBER, 1982.

Islamic representatives in the Friends of the University of Wollongong, under the leadership of Dr Sultan Aly, have arranged for the visit of Dr S.A.A. Rizvi, Ma, PhD, D.Litt, FAHA, Reader in Asian Civilisations at the Australian National University.

Before joining the A.N.U. he worked as head of the History Department, Jammu and Kashmir University, and earlier as Secretary of the History of the Freedom Movement Committee, Government of U.P. Dr. Rizvi was a Research Associate in the School of Oriental and African Studies, University of London, during 1962-63 and was a Fellow in the same institution in 1969. In 1972 he was a Visiting Professor at the Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi.

Among Dr Rizvi's most important publications are the following: *Source Book on Medieval Indian History*, in Hindi, Vols. I-X (Aligarh Muslim University, 1955-62); *Freedom Struggle in U.P.*, Vols I-VI (U.P. Government, Lucknow, 1957-61); *Muslim Revivalist Movements in Northern India in the 16th and 17th Centuries* (Agra, 1965); *Fatehpur Sikri* (New Delhi, 1972); *Fathpur Sikri* in collaboration with Dr V.J.A. Flynn (Bombay, 1975); Hindi translations of the *Muqaddamah of Ibn Khaldun* (Lucknow, 1961); *Haqa'iq-i-Hindi* (Varanasi, 1957); *Alakh Bani* (Aligarh, 1971); *Religious and Intellectual History of the Muslims in Akbar's Reign 1556-1605* with special reference to Abu'l-Fadl (New Delhi, 1975); *A History of Sufism in India*, Vol. I (New Delhi, 1975); *A History of Sufism in India*, Vol II (in Press); *Shah Wali-Allah and his times* (Canberra, 1980) and *Iran: Royalty, Religion and Revolution* (Canberra, 1980). He has also contributed chapters to the *Cambridge History of Islam*, Vol. II (Cambridge, 1970) and in the *World of Islam* (London, 1976). His research articles have been published in various international Journals.

REPORT VINDICATES TENURE

The Australian Senate Standing Committee on Education and the Arts Report on the Tenure of Academics, tabled in the Senate on 9 September 1982, represents an endorsement of the concept of tenure in tertiary institutions according to the Federation of Australian University Staff Associations and the Federation of College Academics.

After hearing extensive submissions from individuals and organisations the Committee's findings reject allegations of wide spread incompetence and inefficiency within higher education.

Dr Adrian Ryan, President of FAUSA said that the Report's recommendations substantially supported the maintenance of tenure provisions as essential to academic work.

"The Report", said Dr Ryan, "has failed to deal in a serious fashion with the question of funding, tutorial staff, women in higher education and early retirement."

Dr Ryan said that the problems facing higher education institutions today were a direct result of the funding policies of the Federal Government.

The Report has recommended that academics be sacked when institutions face financial exigency. Both Federations strongly oppose this recommendation as it permits the Commonwealth as the sole paymaster to create funding shortages which can lead to a reduction in staff establishments.

"The Report has also failed to recommend that where institutions are forced to reduce staff numbers funding be supplied to permit adequate financial compensation for those who lose their jobs."

Dr Ryan said that the Report had ignored the plight of untenured staff, especially tutorial staff who do not have the benefits of tenure which are considered essential by the Senate Committee.

"The recommendations of the Report which aim to improve the position of women in tertiary institutions ignore the cost implications of its proposals. While we endorse the call for adequate child care facilities, we note that the Federal Government continues to abrogate its responsibility in this area."

The two Federations support the introduction of tenured fractional appointments for existing academic staff, but only on a voluntary basis with the guaranteed opportunity to return to full-time work.

Dr Ryan said that the two Federations oppose the recommendation to introduce compulsory seven yearly reviews of academic staff. "Although we are not in the business of protecting the incompetent, we would see this development as a potential threat to the job security of academics."

While both Federations welcome the recommendation for portability of superannuation in higher education it is regrettable that the Committee did not regard the concept of early retirement as an urgent issue.

RAFFLE FOR AMERICAN STUDENTS ACCIDENT APPEAL

This raffle which was drawn at 3.15 on Tuesday, 14th September, by Mr. J. Bell was won by Kerin Bell of the Administration.

Susan Gardner, the main organiser, informs us that the sum of \$153.20 was raised and this sum was handed over in toto to the University Union appeal - there being no expenses involved. Our thanks to all those who participated so generously.

The Appeal total had reached \$1,181 on 20 September, 1982.

WEA TOUR OF THE LACHLAN RIVER

"Bushrangers, Goldseekers and Selectors" is the title of a WEA Tour on 2 - 4 October, 1982.

The all inclusive cost of the tour is \$150 per person.

This historical tour will study three aspects of the social life of the Lachlan area in the period 1860 - 1885. These years saw the goldrushes in Lambing Flat (Young) in 1860, Black Ridge (Forbes) in 1861 and Emu Creek (Grenfell), the bushranging activities of Frank Gardiner, Ben Hall and their gangs, the problems and successes of the selectors in the years after the Robertson Act and the changes wrought by the coming of the railways and agriculture to the area.

The three themes of bushranging, goldseeking and selection constantly intertwine as goldseekers often came from or settled onto the land; as bushrangers were often supported by the rural poor, as the goldrushes were a condition for the bushrangers' existence, and as the whole period introduced a new degree of social mobility into what had been a more static pastoral society. It is no wonder Henry Lawson called these years 'The Roaring Days'.

These subjects will be explored by commentary and discussion, both in the coach and at historical sites, by folksongs and poems, by films, the inspection of museums and historical sites and the distribution of copies of contemporary documents.

The route on Saturday 2nd October will be from Goulburn to Crookwell, Binda and Boorowa, where the tour will spend both nights in hotel and motel accommodation. On Sunday visits will be made to Canowindra (bailed up by Ben Hall and his gang in 1863), Eugowra (the site of the Escort Robbery in June, 1862), the Lachlan Vintage Village at Forbes, to inspect the goldfield. On Monday visits will be made to Young (the site of the Lambing Flat goldfields and the anti-Chinese and anti-police riots in 1861), Harden, Binalong and Yass. From there the coach will return to Wollongong.

All meals and other activities are prearranged and such costs are included in the course fee. There will be activities on both evenings.

It is suggested that participants do some reading prior to the weekend, and some books can be suggested.

The Bishop of Wollongong, Dr. William Murray, is supporting this new initiative and he has appointed Fr. Clem Hill of the Wollongong diocese as Chaplain to the University.

THE ECONOMICS OF AUSTRALIAN IMMIGRATION

In February of this year a conference was held at the University of Sydney, bringing together economists from research centres, higher education, industry and government, to discuss the above theme. Over 100 people from many different walks of life attended, and over 200 papers were delivered, in addition to a background paper published by the Department of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs, the conference sponsor.

These papers, together with abridged transcripts of the discussion session, will be published in July, and copies will be available from Sydney University Extension Programme at a price of \$18, which includes postage and handling costs.

This publication is bound to be a significant one. The papers range over a wide area of macroeconomic policy, and though their major emphasis is on labour market economics, they will be of interest to all those who are concerned about Australian social and political issues.
