MEMBERSHIP

There were 2,268 members of all classes in 1976 compared with 2,209
in 1975. The total of life members as at the end of 1976 was 267.

GENERAL MEETINGS

The Annual General Meeting of the Union was held in the Common
Room on Tuesday, 13th April, 1976, at 12.45 p.m. and was attended by
nineteen members of the Union. The annual report for 1975 containing
financial statements for 1975 was received. A Special General Meeting was
held on Tuesday, 15th June, 1976, as a result of which the Board of
Management set up an Ad Hoc Committee to review the Constitution.
This Committee made recommendations to the Board which will go before
the 1977 Annual General Meeting.

FINANCE

The overall financial result for the year caused the Board considerable anxiety. The large loss (\$38,457) on catering operations during 1976 resulted in the absorption of funds that the Board had intended to use for present and future capital development and clearly if fee levels are not to increase future losses on catering operations must be avoided.

The catering loss was particularly disappointing following the good result in 1975 and it may be helpful to highlight some of the reasons for the poor result.

1. Staffing Levels. The level of staffing, both management and non-management, was too high for the scale of operations. In planning the staffing levels, it had been hoped that, in order to use the Stage III complex to its maximum, all available service points — cafeteria, take-away bar, coffee bar, liquor bar and bistro — could be utilised. It became apparent during the year that, although the sales turnover for 1976 had increased significantly over 1975 levels, it was not sufficient to cover the very large increase in staffing costs resulting from the multiplicity of service points. The level of management staffing had been determined on the basis of a continuing increase in the campus population for a number of years and the consequent expansion of services, operations and facilities. The impact of a steady-state campus population on these assumptions, is such that a full review of management staffing levels was undertaken by the Board towards the end of the year. Some staff resignations and transfers have enabled a good deal more flexibility in these considerations than might have been possible otherwise.

2. Increasing Costs. The continuing increase in the cost of food throughout the year provided another cause for concern. In order to keep down its selling prices the Union often delayed the passing on of cost increases to its members and this resulted in losses in the food service area.

3. Falling Turnover. The annual phenomenon of a fall in sales through the course of the year was even more pronounced in 1976. An examination of enrolment figures showed that there was an abnormally high student "drop-out" rate through 1976 and the consequent reduction in campus population was reflected in food and liquor sales. This is a serious problem as it is often not possible to reduce staffing levels with declining sales turnover.

STAGE III EXTENSIONS

The opening of the Stage III complex at the beginning of the year added significantly to the services that the Union provides for its members. While the building has not yet been used to its maximum capacity it has given a good deal more flexibility to the variety of activities and services which can be implemented, and the current year should see an expansion in this area of Union operations. The utilisation of the building for a variety of purposes has direct impact on the trading operations as well as making the Union a more interesting place.

As with most new buildings, there were a number of maintenance and construction problems which became apparent throughout the year. The resolution of these problems occupied a considerable amount of staff time and often caused inconvenience to members and staff of the Union. The Board appreciates the co-operation of all concerned and hopes that most of the difficulties have been overcome.

POSITION OF SECRETARY/MANAGER

The foundation Secretary/Manager of the Union, Mr. Ian L. Dunn, resigned from the position in the early part of the year to become a senior lecturer in the Department of Accountancy. The Board in recognition of the extensive service rendered to the Union by Mr. Dunn, not the least of which was the realization of the Stage III concept, granted him Honorary Life Membership of the Union. Mr. Dunn thus became the Union's second Honorary Life Member joining its first Chairman, Dr. Frank Mathews. Mrs. H. Susan Stevenson was appointed Secretary/Manager of the Union in November. Mrs. Stevenson, who was Manager of the Union at the University of Manchester Institute of Science and Technology, has taken up this position at an important time in the Union's development and the Board wishes her every success.

UNION ACTIVITIES

During the year a wide range of activities took place in the Union including eighteen recitals arranged by the University Musical Society, and the Board expresses thanks to Mr. Abe Segal, the President of the Musical Society, for his services. There were various exhibitions of art, photography and textiles, the most notable of which were exhibitions of Aboriginal Arts and Craft held in the First and Second Sessions. COMMERCE SOCIETY

The Commerce Society held two major functions in 1976. In the first session an informal meeting of commerce staff and students was held over refreshments in the Northern Lounge: the night was a great success enjoyed by all participants. The Fourth Annual Garden Party was held in September. To the music of a lively Dutch band, and the ebb of flowing champagne, the "Gypsies, Tramps and Thieves" had a very pleasant afternoon, which was followed by an equally pleasant evening at a Wollongong restaurant where most revellers continued the party. Our society hopes that 1977 will see further successes.

GEOLOGICAL SOCIETY

This year was the 10th anniversary of our formation and, as such, numerous "Celebration" activities were included with our more normal activities. A number of excursions were held to places including Corunna Lakes (south coast); Bungonia; Araluen district; Tumut and the Snowy Mountains. BRIDGE CLUB

Many members of the University have played Bridge in various rooms in the A.C.S. building in past years, but the need to formalise a Club came with the prospect of Intervarsity Bridge at University of Wollongong in 1977.

FILM GROUP

The Film Group, with 80 full members and over 3000 associate member attendances in 1976, retained its place as one of the largest clubs on campus. Screenings are now taking place in the Union Hall which offers the Group the capacity of 400 seats. The Group held about 40 screenings, totalling around 70 films, throughout the year, including two film festivals. The executive (Messrs. P. Castle, G. Pallister and I. Piper) performed the task of running the Group on a day-to-day basis and would like to thank the small number of other members who helped out on some of the more popular nights.

CAMERA CLUB

President: Mr. K. Donegan

The Camera Club has just completed a very active year. Photographic competitions were conducted at each meeting and these formed the basis of the annual pointscore. Also a Print and Slide of the Year were selected from the competition entries. During September a very successful exhibition of members' photographs was held in the Southern Lounge of the Union.

A large number of members made use of darkroom facilities provided by the club to develop and print their own pictures. In order to make these facilities available to as many members as possible experienced members instructed beginners in the basics of photographic processing.

The highlight of the club's 1976 activities was the entry into colour processing. Several members have started developing their own colour slides following an introductory course arranged by the executive of the club.

METALLURGICAL SOCIETY

A record membership of the Society was established this year with approximately 60 members and 10 life members. Functions held during the year received strong support from both staff and student members and wives and friends.

A barbecue held in Session 1 also served as a farewell to Mr. N. Salasoo departing on his sabbatical leave. At a second barbecue in Session 2 the annual Metallurgy Prizes were presented.

Members of the Society were actively involved in both the Aus.I.M. and Aus.I.M.M. student evenings. We were also represented at the Inter-Society soccer match.

Production of a journal made limited progress due to heavy commitments of the editorial committee. However they are still enthusiastic for a journal to be produced and 1977 should see fulfilment of this undertaking.

Two highlights of the year were the 15th Annual Dinner, at which Professor L. Chipman of the Philosophy Department addressed the Society and a lecture by Professor Octave Levenspiel from the University of Ontario, who is the author of one of the Metallurgy texts. Both these occasions were in October.

PARENTS' CLUB

A child care centre was operated on campus from April until November. A total of 27 children were catered for, the maximum at one time being 13 on Tuesday afternoons.

The method of staffing was reciprocal minding by parents, which proved very unsatisfactory as the sole means of staffing because of the lack of continuity and the tremendous pressures which came to bear on those few parents who did the bulk of the child care and associated work.

In October, the Parents' Club became affiliated with the University Union and began to secure financial support from this body. About the same time, a children's picnic was organised to publicise the plight of students with children. The name Kids' Uni was officially adopted for the child care centre.

The History Society, in conjunction with the History Department and the Labour History Society, invited Professor R. Connell, Sociology, Macquarie University and Professor R. Harrison, Centre for the Study of Social History, University of Warwick, England, to address members of the Society, staff and students.

Annual elections will be held in May, 1977.
