## Radioactive Exit Signs Stolen

### RADIOACTIVE EXIT SIGNS STOLEN

A few weeks before the end of session 1, five self-luminous exit signs were stolen from three locations in the Science Building.

These signs contain a very high concentration of radioactive tritium gas (a form of hydrogen) sealed in borosilicate glass tubes. The gas emits electrons which activate a phosphor coating on the inside of the tubes to produce visible light.

There is no radiation hazard from these signs while the glass tubes remain intact.

However, breakage of the tubes will release the gas and cause a radiation hazard. The gas could be inhaled directly or the tritium could replace hydrogen in water to form tritiated water (heavy water) which could be ingested. In both cases mild radiation sickness could follow.

Obviously the University wants these signs returned for two reasons. First, to recover the stolen property but more importantly to remove the potential radiation hazard.

Any person with knowledge about this matter should contact either the University Engineer, Mr. Ron Kinnell (extension 932) or the Radiation Safety Office, Associate Professor Noel Kennon (extension 912).

The signs can be left with any officer of the University and no questions will be asked, at least at this time. In fact one sign has already been returned anonymously.

Incidentally, should breakage of one of these signs occur the following procedure should be followed:

1. Open all doors and windows in the room.
2. Switch on any extraction fans available.
3. Evacuate the room as rapidly as possible.
4. Contact Associate Professor Kennon at the University (282-912) or at home (29-8767).

## New Travel Service For University

### NEW TRAVEL SERVICE FOR UNIVERSITY

Kennedy's Travel Service, 160 Crown Street, Wollongong (now owned by the National Bank Travel Service) will be the University's Travel Agents for 1982/84.

One of the services offered is that Kennedy's Travel Service is prepared to arrange for a member of its staff to visit the University to advise members on travel matters, whether they relate to study leave, other official travel, or personal travel.

A further service which has been arranged is related to study leave assistance grants. Under this arrangement, the University can pay direct to Kennedy's Travel Service, out of the staff member's travel grant, travel and related costs. This allows the staff member to take advantage of advance purchase fares. Any member of staff who wishes to make use of this service, is also asked to get in touch with Mr Dunn, who will make the necessary arrangements.

## TECHNOLOGY WEEK

Automation in the Library took a significant step forward last week. As part of Technology Week, the Library introduced on-line searching of its catalogue data bank. It is now possible to perform author, title and subject searches of the catalogue from any terminal linked to the University's UNIVAC computer.

Few Australian libraries have on-line access to their catalogue. Even fewer offer this service to their users. The close cooperation between Data Processing and

Library staff has enabled this University to provide a service not available at larger universities.

The Library is anxious to receive comments on the effectiveness of the search programme. Users can assist by completing a questionnaire form available at the terminal in the Library foyer. Staff and students who have queries about the system should contact the Reader Education Librarian.

### GEOFF PAGE TO VISIT WOLLONGONG UNIVERSITY

Geoff Page, Canberra poet, is to be poet in residence at the University of Wollongong from 10th-23rd October. He is to work in the Faculties Sector and in the Institute Sector of the University.

While in residence, Mr Page will -

- give writing workshops
- give a public lecture on the topic "Modern Australian poets and the First World War"
- give a public reading of his works
- be available for discussion with staff and students.

Geoff Page was born in Grafton N.S.W. in 1940 and brought up on a cattle station on the upper Clarence River. He went to school and university in Armidale N.S.W. and after a year's teaching in Sydney moved to Canberra in 1964. Since then he has taught in two Canberra high schools and is currently in charge of the English Department at Narrabundah College. He began publishing his poems in 1948 and has since written five books of poetry. He has also written for radio (for two years a regular contributor to the ABC's Books and Writing program) and has reviewed poetry regularly for The Canberra Times, in addition to occasional reviews in The National Times and The Sydney Morning Herald. For 25 years he has been keenly interested in jazz and is married with one son.

### THEATRE SOUTH

Theatre South winds up its second session in October with Tennessee Williams' masterpiece, *The Glass Menagerie*. It is the most often performed of all Tennessee Williams' plays, and many regard it as his best.

Set against the background of a St. Louis slum, *The Glass Menagerie* is the mainly autobiographical and very moving story of a poor American family and their shattered dreams. Amanda Wingfield (played by Faye Montgomery) is a faded Southern belle who dwells in the past because she cannot come to terms with the reality of her poverty. Her son Tom, (Paul Hunt) is the thinly disguised Williams who tells the story. His crippled sister Laura (Katherine Thomson) is almost a caricature of her mother: her embarrassing shyness and awkwardness are set against the girlish coquetry of her mother.

Geoff Morrell plays the "gentleman caller". His identity, and his expected visit generates much of the tension between Amanda and Laura.

Des Davis, the play's director is confident of good houses for the play. "We have a very strong cast, and a brilliant play", he said. "It is a pleasure to direct."

Original music for the play is being written by David Vance.

The season opens 15th October and will play till 6th November at the Wollongong Technical College Theatre.
