IMB LEADS PRIVATE SPONSORSHIP OF SEQUICENTENARY

The IMB Building Society has set a scorching pace in private sponsorship of the 150th Anniversary with a grant of \$50,000 which will enable the Opera "Aida" to be staged at Gleniffer Brae on 26 November: Wollongong's Birthday.

Public sponsorship includes over \$250,000 from Wollongong City Council, \$100,000 from the State Government and \$50,000 from the Federal Government, plus many major grants from local industry.

The University, Theatre South and the Friends of the University have an impressive line up of events commemorating our 150th Anniversary.

The University's major contribution is the International Scientific Conference on High Strength Low Alloy Steel which will be held on 20-23 August 1984. This conference will attract many eminent overseas scientists to Wollongong and put us on the steel map. Australian Iron and Steel have contributed \$5,000 towards this event.

A further \$1,000 from Australian Iron and Steel will go towards the main contribution of the Friends of the University, the Friends Festival of Choirs. This will be held in the Town Hall on 30 June. The Festival of Choirs has a \$3,000 budget and will be accompanied by the ABC Sinfonia.

Theatre South's main contribution will be to perform an adaptation of "Les Emigres in Terra Australis", the first play ever written about Australia by Citizen Gamas in 1792 at the height of the French Revolution. The budget for this play is \$5,000 of which \$2,000 has been provided by Australian Iron and Steel. The remainder is being sought from the French Government and French Industry.

The Italian community have joined with the University to write the History of the Italian people of Illawarra. A fundraising drive raised \$12,500 in 1983 and promises of \$12,500 this year. The work is being written by Dr. Gerardo Zampaglione and will be completed in late 1984.

The University Hockey Club has attracted the 1984 National Hockey Intersarsity to Wollongong and this will be held on 14-18 May. This event is sponsored by a \$1,000 grant from Australian Iron and Steel.

The Graduates Committee of the Friends of the University have attracted the 1984 Annual Meeting of the Australian University Graduate Conference. This will be held on 10-13 February. A Mayoral reception will be given on 10 February in the Wollongong City Gallery at 7 p.m. Entertainment includes the Zagreb Croatian Folklore Group and the University Singers. On 11 February the Vice-Chancellor will host the Conference Dinner at the Northbeach International. The guest speaker is Dame Leonie Kramer DBE and tickets are sold out.

The Department of English Language is working on a book of Wollongong place names, a field in which the Department has an international track record. This project lacks a sponsor at the moment, and any member of the Friends who wants to sponsor a sesquicentenary project in partnership with the University is invited to discuss this with Giles Pickford on 270076.

The University of Wollongong Union's main contribution to the 150th will be produced in partnership with the Wollongong Arts Council. It is a two night performance by the Cambridge Footlights Revue : that famous birthplace of British Comedians. The performances will be on 8 and 9 April in the Town Hall and Friends of the University have been given priority booking.

The University will emphasize Heritage Week in its usual way. The 150th Anniversary Heritage Week has been funded by a \$10,000 grant from the Illawarra Credit Union.

University Open Day will once again be held in conjunction with Radio 2WL's 80's Lifestyle Expo. The Town v Gown Cricket Match promises to be bigger and better than ever with \$1,500 of sponsorship coming from Byrt Ford, Carlton United Breweries, and John Swire and Son Ltd.

The Camera Club have organized an exhibition of photography and a Photographic Seminar at the University Union from 7-8 April, 1984.

Dr. Winifred Michell of the Department of History was the guest speaker at the 150th Anniversary Australia Day Dinner, organized by the Business and Professional Womens Club.

No doubt other activities will come out of the University in 1984, but the projects listed above amount to a magnificent contribution to Wollongong's 150th Anniversary.

Our congratulations go to Australian Iron and Steel, the major sponsor of University related events: and also to the IMB Building Society for funding what will clearly be the event of the year - "Aida" at Gleniffer Brae.

VICE-CHANCELLOR WELCOMES PREMIERS ANNOUNCEMENT

The Vice-Chancellor Dr. Ken McKinnon has expressed delight that the Premier had announced the affiliation of the Conservatorium of Music with the University, as reported in the Illawarra Mercury on Friday 6 January.

Negotiations to establish a formal relationship between the Conservatorium and the tertiary sector were commenced in 1981 by the Wollongong Institute of Education (prior to its amalgamation with the University) when the Director, Dr. Peter Rousch, had discussions with Mr. Jim Powell, Principal of the Conservatorium (Wollongong Branch), the Director of the State Conservatorium of Music, and the NSW Ministry of Education.

There were already strong links between the Conservatorium and the University's School of Creative Arts, Dr. McKinnon said, but this move would strengthen these ties and greatly enhance the development of the musical and artistic life of the City of Wollongong.

SCHOOL OF CREATIVE ARTS ATTRACTS DISTINGUISHED SCULPTOR

Mr. Herbert Flugelman, one of the most distinguished sculptors in Australia, has taken up an appointment as Lecturer in the School of Creative Arts from 1st February, 1984.

Mr. Flugelman is well known in Wollongong as the creator of the sculpture "Spiral and Wave" in front of the City Art Gallery. He also has sculptures displayed in Martin Place, Sydney ("Pyramid Tower" - a vertical column of tetrahedra), Kurnell ("Concrete Panels" commissioned by the Australian Oil Refining Pty. Ltd.), Adelaide Festival Centre, Rundle Mall Adelaide, Adelaide University and the Art Gallery of South Australia. His work is represented in the state galleries and the Australian National Gallery and he is the winner of numerous sculpture awards.

Mr. Flugelman has a reputation not only as a sculptor but as a fine teacher. He has held teaching positions at the University of NSW, University of Sydney, National Art School and leaves the position of Head, School of Art, South Australian College of Advanced Education to come to Wollongong.

UNDERGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS ESTABLISHED

Commencing in 1984 the University of Wollongong will offer ten scholarships each year for undergraduate study.

Each Scholarship will have a value of \$1,000 payable in four instalments.

The following students will be eligible to apply.

Students who:

- a) are in their first year of registration at the University; and
- b) are registered as candidates studying full-time for a 3 or 4 year undergraduate degree or undergraduate diploma of the University; and
- c) have matriculated within the preceding three years at the NSW Higher School Certificate Examination or an equivalent interstate examination; and
- d) are not in receipt of a traineeship/cadetship/scholarship or any other similar form of award apart from TEAS.

Selection for the scholarships shall be on the basis of the highest aggregates obtained at the NSW Higher School Certificate Examination or, in the case of applicants with interstate qualifications, the converted interstate aggregate.

The award of the scholarships shall be determined by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor after receiving recommendations from the Chairman of the Undergraduate Studies Committee.

Application forms will be available at the enrolment centre on February 6, 7 and 8.

STATE SUPERANNUATION FUND NEWS

Investments:

New investments by the Board during 1982/83 totalled \$501.37 million being \$100 million higher than new investments of the previous year. Again, at year's end, significant funds were invested short term (almost \$95 million) as a result of the Board's general investment policy which sought to hold funds against opportunities arising in the 1983/84 year.

As at 30th June, 1983, approximately 42% of the investment portfolio was invested in the public sector.

The average earning rate on the Fund's investments was 11.76% compared with 10.68% in the previous year. Yields on recent investments are, of course, well above this average rate and it should also be noted that calculation of the average rate does not take into account capital appreciation which has not been realised by the sale of the assets concerned.

Administration:

The development of new computer systems to improve the services which the Board is able to offer Fund members continued throughout the year. As the year ended, the Board's new computer system covering payment of pensions was being finalised and it is expected that a new system covering the reconciliation of contributor accounts will be developed during 1983/84.

Valuation of the Fund:

Though the Report by the valuing actuaries in regard to their investigation of the Fund as at 30th June, 1981, was not finalised during the year, it was subsequently completed and presented to the Board in September

and was tabled in Parliament, together with the Board's Annual Report, on 23rd November, 1983.

Review of the State Superannuation Fund:

The major review of the State Superannuation Fund being carried out by the Superannuation Advisory Committee on the basis of proposals developed by the State Superannuation Board and the Bureau of Government Superannuation Research, continued throughout the year. At year's end, comparative costing of the proposals for amendment and the scheme as it operates at present was being finalised by the Government Actuary. The costing results have since become available and the proposals are now being considered in the light of that information.

REVIEW OF COMPUTING IN THE UNIVERSITY

The Vice-Chancellor has established a Working Party to Review Computing Needs in the University, with the following membership and terms of reference.

Members of the Working Party: Professor A.M. Clarke, Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Chairman); Professor R.C. King, Chairman, Academic Senate; Dr. C. Bellamy, Manager, (Director of Computing), Computer Centre, Monash University; Mr. J. Sewell, Commonwealth Public Service Board; Mr. G. Gately, General Manager, Corporate Planning, United Permanent Building Society.

Terms of Reference: To make recommendations on a policy and practice for effective and efficient hardware and software systems to meet the teaching/research and administrative (including Library) needs of the University for the foreseeable future, but specifically for at least the next four or five years.

MEDICARE LEVY

Commencing with the pay on 9th February 1984, the Medicare levy will be paid automatically as part of tax instalment deductions from salary or wages. The majority of employees will be liable to pay an amount equal to one per cent of taxable income and the Australian Taxation Office has supplied new schedules which incorporate the levy. They do not incorporate a levy component where the weekly wage is less than \$126.

A relatively small number of employees may be exempt from the levy or entitled to pay only a reduced amount. Generally these are low income earners with dependants or persons whose medical expenses are covered by Veterans' Affairs or Social Security arrangement - in such cases a Medicare Levy Variation Declaration needs to be lodged with the Salaries Section in order for the reduction to be applied.

Employees wishing to determine their eligibility for the above are advised to contact the Taxation Office, phone 285011. Declaration forms are available from the Salaries section if required.

The advent of Medicare has removed the responsibility for individuals to arrange their own basic health insurance. Consequently all the Health Funds have advised the Salaries section of the new equivalent rates to which members will be automatically transferred in the pay of 9th February 1984.

Therefore as a consequence in the pay of 9th February 1984 staff members will be aware of an increase in their tax deduction and for those contributing to Private Health Funds a reduction in their contribution, generally resulting in a small increase in net pay.

The Salaries section is unable to answer staff members' queries in relation to personal health cover. Enquiries of this nature should be directed to the appropriate Health Fund.

STATE SUPERANNUATION BOARD HOUSING LOAN INTEREST RATES

The State Superannuation Board wishes to inform home loan borrowers and applicants for housing finance, that the interest rates attaching to housing loans provided from the Fund have in most cases been reduced by 0.5% per annum, effective from 3rd February, 1984.

The new rates applying to Fund member borrowers are 11.25% for loans less than \$50,000 and 12.25% for loans of \$50,000 or more. The rates attaching to loans to ex-Fund members are 12.25% for loans of less than \$50,000 while loans of \$50,000 or more continue to attract a rate of 12.75%.

Borrowers will be contacted by the Secretary of the Housing Co-operative which provided the loan and asked to indicate whether they will be reducing their monthly repayments or leaving existing repayments stand, thereby effecting savings in overall interest.
