THE POLICY CIRCLE FORUM

In the first of the new 'Policy Circle' forums organized by the Centre for Technology and Social Change at the University of Wollongong, a number of senior government advisers from the Departments of Science and Technology, Industry and Commerce, C.S.I.R.O. and A.S.T.E.C. met with policy analysts from four Australian universities to review the Federal Government's controversial 'Sunrise Industries' policy.

Discussion focussed around informed papers from Stewart Carter, (Centre for Technology and Social Change) on the policy rationale, Dr. Rod Badger, (Department of Science and Technology) on implementation, and Dr. Stuart Macdonald (University of Queensland) on the policy's undoubtedly large potential. These resulted in important clarifications of the main issues surrounding government policy.

The Director of the Centre for Technology and Social

Change, Professor Ron Johnston, said that the Policy Circle concept was designed to provide an opportunity for government and academic policy analysts to meet in a closed forum where a free interchange of ideas and perspectives on topical policy issues could be encouraged with the general objective of furthering policy development.

"The Sunrise Industries Policy Circle very clearly demonstrated the potential benefits of closer links between government and academic policy analysts", Professor Johnston said, "and further Policy Circles are now being planned as a result of the extremely positive reports from all the participants".

DOUGLAS ENGINEERING SETS THE PACE

Herbert Flugelman is the latest person to join the galaxy of minds and talents that is being drawn together here in Wollongong by Professor Edward Cowie in the School of Creative Arts.

He needs many machines and tools to help him create the kind of sculptures that he has made famous in the Adelaide Festival Centre, the Rundle Mall, Martin Place and the Australian National Gallery.

There are 30 students already enrolled in his course.

Douglas Engineering, member no. 108, was the first to rally to the call with a donation of a timber bandsaw valued at \$800. Mr. Doug Hands said that he hoped many other engineering workshops and tradespeople throughout Illawarra would help to support this very worthwhile initiative in Wollongong.

SCHOOL OF CREATIVE ARTS LAUNCHES PIANO APPEAL

The School of Creative Arts is planning new and ambitious concerts for the people of Illawarra. International artists have pledged support for the musical and artistic life of the School, and plans are advanced to purchase a full Steinway Concert Grand for the Music Centre.

News from Council and Senate

The following items of major interest were considered at Council's meeting on 24th February.

1. Establishment of a new Department in the Faculty of Commerce - the Department of Business Policy and Operations (members are Mr. A.J. Anderson, Mr. K. Wilson, Mr. P.C. Davies and Dr. G. Manger).
2. Vice-Chancellor given authority to approve changes to level, content, credit point values, methods of assessment and session of offer of subjects - previously all these had to go to Council.
3. The report of the Review Committee for the Departments of Mechanical Engineering and Metallurgy. The major recommendation accepted so far is to fill the Chair of Mechanical Engineering as soon as is possible (funds permitting).
4. Revised Delegations Document for Financial and Staff matters.
5. Technological Development and the University: the Vice-Chancellor is authorized to take whatever steps necessary to promote the University's ability to encourage and participate in the technological development of the region.
6. Equal Employment Opportunity Coordinator to become full-time for a limited term.
7. Composition of Selection Committee for Teaching Fellows and Visiting Teaching Fellows.
8. Amendments to General Development Fund criteria to permit or facilitate new developments including new technological developments related to the University's teaching, scholarship and research roles.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOP

"Strategies and Skills for Career Women in Today's Organisations"

On April 10 and again on April 11, Dr. Sharon Lord will conduct a one-day workshop, "Moving Ahead: Strategies and Skills for Career Women in Today's Organisations", at the Sebel Town House, Sydney.

Dr. Sharon Lord is President of Sharon Lord Associates, a management and educational consulting business. Until recently she served as the highest ranking woman in the Pentagon.

Her position as Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defence for Equal Opportunity and Safety Policy was a civilian appointment ranking with that of a three-star general. She was responsible for equal opportunity, safety and occupational health matters affecting the 4.5 million Department of Defence military and civilian personnel. Dr. Lord was praised by Pentagon officials for her work emphasising full utilisation of human resources and, particularly, for her stand on women's opportunities in the Department of Defence. She wrote policies ensuring equal rights for all personnel particularly the 1.5 million wives and female employees.

Dr. Lord served as the first female Professor at the University of Tennessee for eleven years in the Department of Counselling and Educational Psychology, and directed an innovative research centre exploring human development beyond gender stereotypes. During this period she developed and implemented a model training programme in sex-fair approaches to education and psychology, now used extensively by the U.S. Office of Education.

Her academic background includes a B.A. in English from West Virginia University in 1965, an M.A. and a Ph.D. from Indiana University in Educational Psychology/Developmental-Social Psychology. In addition, she attended the Institute for Administrative Advancement at the University of Wisconsin for Post-doctoral work in 1976.

It is no longer necessary to establish evidence that the traditional role of women is being questioned and broadened in society. More women are entering the workforce than ever before. Some are assuming middle and senior management responsibilities. Organisations must acknowledge this process and fully recognise that women are critical human resources. Women, themselves, must recognise they have the power and ability to contribute at all levels in today's organisations.

This workshop is about tapping that power and developing the ability to "Move Ahead".

Dr. Lord's seminars will focus on leadership skills, personal effectiveness and strategies for change in the workplace.

The Workshop is designed to:

- provide techniques for you to become more assertive and risk-taking;
- clarify work goals and career prospects;
- demonstrate the range of leadership styles necessary for the effective management of people;
- develop personal influencing skills for dealing with peers and superiors;
- explain how to avoid career burnout;
- demonstrate how to tap into potential energy levels;
- provide strategies to break down the barriers in organisations which limit the prospects of women.

The one day workshop will combine a variety of techniques, including lectures, case studies, experimental exercises and shared knowledge. To facilitate the personal impact of the workshop, the number of participants is limited to 40.

- * women who want to discover the power within themselves and learn how to use it effectively
- * personnel and training managers who wish to create an "equal opportunity" environment.

Dear Sir,

I am instructed by my society to write to you as under:

This is a society situated in Uganda and which runs on the work of caring for the needy. A number of people here in Uganda are in need of assistance because of one reason or another. This is especially so in education feeding, clothing and looking after abandoned children.

Assistance in terms of clothing and money is therefore necessary for the purpose of enabling this society to fulfil its aspirations.

I am instructed to appeal to you to assist the society in any form you can. The society assures you that it will apply such assistance to the benefit of those needy.

The United Nations Department of Public Information will conduct a Graduate Study Programme at the United Nations Office in Geneva, from 23 July to 9 August 1984. The aim of the Programme is to provide an opportunity for an international group of young graduate students to deepen their understanding of the principles, purposes and activities of the United Nations and its related agencies through first-hand observation and study. The theme of the Geneva Programme will be "Youth and the UN. International Youth Year: Participation, Development and Peace."

The Programme is not connected with recruitment for employment at the United Nations, and travel costs, travel arrangements and living accommodation is the responsibility of intending participants.

The closing date for receipt of application forms is 15 April 1984.

Ramkhamhaeng University is to host an International Conference on Open Higher Education, in Bangkok from 13-17 August 1984. Conference themes will include the philosophy and concept of open higher education, and development trends in an international perspective. The Conference will allow participants to share

their experiences in organising open higher education, and it is hoped that it will also encourage academic co-operation among the countries that organise open higher education and their respective institutions.

The closing date for those wishing to indicate their intention to submit a paper to the Conference, and for Conference registration is 15 March 1984.

The International Institute for Hydraulic and Environmental Engineering is offering the following full-time postgraduate courses in The Netherlands in 1984:

1. International Course in Hydraulic Engineering
2. International Course for Hydrologists
3. International Courses for Sanitary Engineering
4. International Course in Environmental Science and Technology.

The aim of the International Institute is to promote the transfer of experience and know-how in the field of science and technology related to water and the environment to professionals, especially from developing countries. The 11-month's study programmes offer lectures, laboratory work, workshops, project work and field studies. Successful participants receive an Institute Diploma.

The principal condition for admission to the courses is that candidates must have a thorough previous training at least at BSc. level in civil engineering. (Candidates for the International Course in Environmental Science and Technology should have a university degree in biology, chemistry or chemical engineering). Moreover they should have at least three years of practical experience in a field relevant to the course in which they intend to participate.

Application for admission to the courses which are conducted from the third week of October until the second week of September, should be made as soon as possible.

The Netherlands Universities Foundation for International Co-operation is sponsoring an International Course in Agro-Industry in The Netherlands from 7 May to 9 June 1984. Subjects to be treated during the course include planning of agro-industries, production and the processing of agricultural products, and studies of agro-industries and international co-operation. The programme will involve a number of lectures, and visits to organisations, institutes and industrial settlements which can be helpful in providing ideas for industrial development programmes in participants' countries of origin.

The course is open to government officials and other qualified candidates with some years of experience in industrial development problems with special reference to agricultural project processing, and related agro-industry development aspects. Candidates should be involved with or actively engaged in socio-economic agricultural planning, development banks, processing, storage and distribution, or the marketing and trade of agricultural products.

The closing date for application to the Course is 1 April 1984.
