## VICE-CHANCELLOR TO HEAD UNESCO COMMISSION

The Vice-Chancellor, Dr. Ken McKinnon, has been appointed Chairman of the Australian National Commission for UNESCO.

The Commission is a body of 58 of Australia's leading scientists, educators, artists, and cultural, media and

communications people.

It meets regularly to plan Australia's involvement in UNESCO, and to assist in implementing UNESCO programmes in Australia. It also works with nearby countries on similar matters.

As most would be aware, this year, for the first time, all undergraduate course applications were received on our behalf by the Universities and Colleges Admissions Centre. Under that system applicants may express up to six course preferences for various member institutions on their application form. Applicants expressed a total of 18,159 preferences for University of Wollongong courses, 11,330 were by school leavers and 6,829 were from other applicants.

Applicants received an offer for their highest preference for which they were eligible.

### TRIATHLON WILL BENEFIT UNIVERSITY

The second National Bank Leisure Coast Triathlon, one of the sporting highlights of Wollongong's 150th Anniversary celebrations, will be run on April 15 from the Illawarra Yacht Club.

The event will have some of Australia's finest and toughest athletes among the expected 300 entrants.

Last year's winner, Cronulla's Clayton Stevenson and runner-up Michael Trinca of Wollongong are two of the favorites for the event.

Organisers are also hoping surf champion Robert Chapman and sister Caroline, the current world biathlon champion, will compete.

The event caters for individuals, teams, men, women and children although the minimum age group is under 14 as the contest is a gruelling one.

The triathlon covers three different events: swimming, cycling and running, in that order.

The swimming leg will be held around a one-and-a-half kilometre course on the lake but because of weather

and safety conditions will not be laid until race morning.

The 30km cycling course starts from the Yacht Club and runs through Warrawong, Windang, around Shellharbour and Oak Flats and back along the same course to the clubhouse.

The final leg, an 11km run, also starts from the club but winds in the opposite direction along Northcliffe Drive through Berkeley and back.

Entry is \$7 for individual competitors and \$15 for the teams section and entries close on April 11.

This event is organized by the National Australia Bank and the Leisure Coast Triathlon Committee as members of the Friends of the University. The proceeds of the Triathlon will go to Physical Education students, and the Friends are expecting many such students to support the event by entering.

## CHEATS BEWARE

Following the 1983 Session 2 Examinations, the Academic Review Committee of the Academic Senate found several students guilty of taking unauthorised material into examination rooms.

The penalties imposed by the Vice-Chancellor on the recommendation of the Committee ranged from a "Fail" grade being awarded in the subject, to a five year exclusion from the University for one student.

Students are reminded of the "Rules and Procedures for the Conduct of Examinations" as set out on Page 51 of Volume II, Page 33 of Volume III of the University Calendar and on the front cover of all examination booklets. In particular, attention is drawn to Part (c) of those rules.

## PARKING

It is important that all staff and students note the following message from the University Secretary.

I am sure that you are all aware that some members of the University community (both staff and students) are continuing to disregard the rights of other users of the campus by parking vehicles in areas which are clearly 'no parking' areas, e.g. roads, lawns, loading bays and in parts of parking areas which impede the orderly flow of traffic.

All passive attempts to encourage co-operation have failed. The situation has now deteriorated to the extent that the delivery of goods to certain parts of the campus has been made impossible by vehicles being parked on roads, across driveways and doorways, etc. Concern has been expressed that potentially dangerous situations are being continually created where the access of emergency vehicles - e.g. ambulance or fire-fighting devices would be impeded.

This notice is to inform all staff and students that as of Monday, 9th April, 1984, the former practice of affixing sticky "infringement" notices to windscreens will be re-introduced in an attempt to resolve the problem.

Every effort has been made to avoid taking such measures, but it is clear that appeals for co-operation have failed and that this course of action is the only way that the safety of all can be assured and the business of the University can be conducted in an orderly and efficient manner.

#### ANZAAS

The 54th ANZAAS Congress will be held in Canberra at the Australian National University from May 14-18, 1984.

Over 900 speakers, including 60 from overseas, will speak on topics ranging through pure science, applied science and the social sciences.

Amongst the topics under discussion will be robotics, VDU's, issues in human bioethics, nutrition and athletic performance, Agent Orange, crime, the environment, women, the law, aging, the social effects of exotic disease invasion (AIDS), and the Nuclear Arms race.

Working with the theme, The Horizons of Science, the Congress will include 31 section programmes (conferences within conferences), nine congress symposia, and 30 inter-session symposia. All up there will be 60 concurrent sessions each day.

### CARNEGIE CORPORATION ANNOUNCES NEW PROGRAMME DIRECTIONS

Carnegie Corporation of New York, founded for the advancement and diffusion of knowledge and understanding, announced that the foundation would pursue new directions in grantmaking, concentrating on four broad goals:

- \* Avoidance of nuclear war and improvement in U.S.-Soviet relations;
- \* education of all Americans, especially youth, for a scientifically and technologically based society;
- \* prevention of damage to children and young adolescents;
- \* strengthening of human resources in developing countries.

John C. Taylor, chairman of the board, said the foundation's new programmes "represent a fundamental continuity with past programmes devoted to the education and well-being of children and to policy research, but place these interests in the context of world interdependence and scientific and technological change."

## Book of the Week

Christine de Pizan: **THE BOOK OF THE CITY OF LADIES** - \$7.95.

This is among the most unusual feminist books ever published. Its fascination lies not so much in its closely argued attack on the ancient philosophers and medieval scholar-priests or even its finely developed style, but rather in the fact that the author herself is most definitely not a part of the 20th century women's movement. She predates it; for Christine de Pizan was born in 1365.

Christine was at the centre of political and cultural life when she wrote this, her most important book, at the French court. Respected as an important intellectual by the intellectuals of her day, she had by the time of the publication of this book in 1450, become embroiled in the debate around the Romance of the Rose, which she had condemned as misogynist.

The Book Of The City Of Ladies is an allegory. Christine claims that what she sees is a prophetic truth: the three daughters of God - Reason, Justice and Rectitude - come to help her build the City of Ladies. The building of the city becomes the writing of the book itself. In it, women, who have been attacked throughout history, may dwell in redeemed and recorded truth.

Establishment of a University-wide Aboriginal Forum

As staff and students may be aware, an informally organised Aboriginal Education Interest Group has been functioning within the University for some 18 months.

Initially formulated by staff of the then School of Education, the group has latterly attracted participation on a wider, more diverse front.

For the express purposes of extending this interest and involvement still further - necessarily, perhaps, beyond education - it is proposed to form a new university wide interest group.

It is envisaged that such a group would meet on a regular basis to address issues identified as relevant to the growth of Aboriginal involvement in the life of the university. As well, topics of general interest/relevance to the Illawarra Aboriginal community and beyond could be canvassed and, where practicable, appropriate research/inquiry instigated. Guest speakers, reports on research, inter-cultural enrichment field trips, conferences, paper presentations, etc., could form the activities-base for such an organisation.

### CONFERENCE ON DISCRIMINATION & THE LAW
