ABC CALLS FOR CONTRIBUTION TO PROGRAMS

The new Executive Producer of TV Science Programs, Dick Gilling, is to visit the University soon looking for material for a new series dealing with science, technology and medicine, which will go to air in May or June. It will deal as much as possible with Australian work but will also cover overseas stories. Dick Gilling says of the series:

"We aim to be as up-to-date as possible, so we hope you will give us your news as early as you can; but we're also going to feature long-term progress reports, so some filming will start early in the New Year. While we're certainly looking for photogenic stories, we want to give space to ideas, too; these may be controversies, or they may be scientific theories or research which don't at present get much coverage on T.V. We want to make the viewers begin to accept science news and views on

the same terms as news about sport or pop music, so we'll be trying to popularise, without diminishing the stature of the work we show.

In next year's series, and increasingly in following years, we'll be including half-hour documentaries as well as five or ten-minute magazine items. This will give us the chance to give coverage in depth to a growing number of subjects.

We hope that our items on Australian work will also be shown on overseas television, so you can see that we need all the information you can provide to help us give an exciting picture of science, technology, and medicine here for domestic and for world viewers.

We believe that our programs will help to wake the community up to the promise science offers us, and to the problems we will have to face as well."

CONSTRUCTION OF ENGINEERING/SCIENCE BUILDING

Construction work on the new Engineering/Science Building will commence on 5th September, 1984.

During the period of construction, estimated at 15 months, the Service Road between the Animal House and the western side of the Workshops will be blocked off and a part of the coal wash surfaced car park will be fenced off as a construction site.

These arrangements are necessary for construction work to proceed and it is hoped that minimal inconvenience will be caused.

INTERRUPTION TO COMPUTER SERVICES

The University Computer was recently shut down when damage was caused to cables during excavation of foundation footings for the new extensions to the Computer Centre.

The University became aware of the Computer network failure early on Sunday, 19th August and University staff worked to restore full facilities as quickly as possible.

Repairs included installing and rejoining 29 new cables, and repairing the main earth system. It was expected that the cable identification and recommissioning of the Computer network cable system would be completed by Friday, 24th August, 1984 and repairs have now been completed.

STAFF SURVEY

It is anticipated that the E.E.O. staff survey will be distributed to all staff at the University on Monday 10th September. You will be receiving two questionnaires. The first is designed to collect:

- * a profile of the members of staff: sex, racial and ethnic origin, age, qualifications, length of service, etc.;
- * information about staff members' work histories including access to training, useful administrative experience, promotion and research opportunities;

The second questionnaire is intended to collect:

- * information about staff members' experiences and feelings about procedures at the University;
- * information about possible instances of discrimination or harassment;
- * suggestions on positive actions the University could take.

All of this information is needed for the preparation of the University's E.E.O. management plan.

Every staff member will get a chance to complete the survey and it is a good opportunity for you to have a say in how things are done here.

Please answer the questions on your own; the questionnaire is designed to reflect your views and experiences. You are urged to give thoughtful and frank answers.

Confidentiality and return of surveys: All the information is confidential. The questionnaires in no way attempt to identify individuals. The questionnaires are to be returned via the internal mail in the envelopes provided. Your name need not be written on either of the questionnaires or the envelopes they go in.

You will find a small card in the package this is to be placed in the internal mail when your questionnaires are returned. This must be sent separately, it is not to be put in either of the envelopes with your questionnaires. This will allow us to work out who we have not received

questionnaires from. We will not be able to identify your questionnaires. Again you must realise, we will be treating all information as confidential and no attempt will be made to identify individuals. The completed questionnaires will not be available to anyone outside the E.E.O. project.

CENTRE FOR MULTICULTURAL STUDIES

Workshop - 12th September.

Australia's Aid Program and the University of Wollongong

The Centre for Multicultural Studies will host a one-day workshop for University academic and administrative staff. The workshop will have two objectives:

1. To brief members of the University on the recommendations of the Jackson Report on Australia's Overseas Aid Program; and
2. To solicit comments on those recommendations and to investigate future options for University programs in the light of the recommendations.

Background:

The Report of the Committee to Review the Australian Overseas Aid Program tabled in Federal Parliament on 7th June 1984 contains the most extensive review of the aid program since the formation of a separate aid agency in 1974. The Jackson Report, as it is known, after the Committee Chairman Sir Gordon Jackson, will influence the direction of Australia's aid program for the next decade.

In presenting the report, Foreign Minister Bill Hayden invited public comment.

This workshop will provide members of the University with a unique opportunity to discuss the aims, purpose and objectives of Australian Overseas Aid.

Underlying the diplomatic language of the report lie controversial issues - don't miss this opportunity to join the debate.

Format:

The workshop will be held in the Northern Lounge, Wollongong University Union.

The morning session (9.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.) will consist of a presentation by a senior official of ADAB (Australian Development Aid Bureau) on the recommendations of the Jackson Report as it affects university programs and possible initiatives. This will be followed by a commentary by Mr. Russell Rollason, Executive Director, Australian Council for Overseas Aid (ACFOA) whose organization has been entrusted by the Minister for Foreign Affairs to conduct some of the hearings

over the next six months on the implications of the Jackson Committee Recommendations. He will indicate the range of discussions that have already been held on these recommendations.

The afternoon session (2.00 p.m. to 4.30 p.m.) will see the workshop opened up to university members to discuss possible initiatives they might want to undertake, and how these initiatives relate to the Jackson Committee recommendations. It will also allow university members to make suggestions about possible limitations of the recommendations so that the Government can take these suggestions into consideration in Government deliberations as to whether the Jackson Committee recommendations should be modified.

Note:

Because of teaching commitments, etc., it is realized that some members of the University may not be able to attend for the whole period. You are invited to attend at whatever times you can. A table will be reserved in the Bistro so that discussions can continue over lunch which unfortunately, cannot be paid for though morning and afternoon tea will be available).

It would be appreciated if those who think they will be attending some or all of the seminar, phone the Centre (ext. 3780) to indicate they may be doing so in order that we can arrange for seating, catering, etc. In return, you will be sent material summarizing the major recommendations of the Jackson Committee Report. Should you not be able to attend the seminar, but still want a summary of the Report, then feel free to phone the Centre and we shall send you the material being provided to participants.

His seminar will include reference to particular cases as examples of Telecom's approach to policy making in the face of technological change. The overall context will concern Telecom as a publicly accountable organisation.

GROWING UP IN THE ILLAWARRA

Winifred Mitchell and Geoffrey Sherington.

Here, in Winifred Mitchell and Geoffrey Sherington's new book, is an important contribution to an all-too neglected area: the local history of the Illawarra.

The Illawarra region has played an important part in the economic and social development of N.S.W., and this fact has been passed over by all but students of economic history and ethnography.

As if in answer to Brecht's question "Who built Thebes of the seven gates?", the authors address themselves to the study of the people who have built the Illawarra. They discuss the displaced Aboriginal families, the convicts whose cheap labour was used to lay an economic basis on which a rural Illawarra was laid, and the dramatic changes which occurred with industrialisation. The "golden thread" which weaves throughout the story is the role of ordinary people: the convicts, the miners, factory workers, migrants, women and of course their children who were growing up in the Illawarra.

"Growing Up in the Illawarra" is a book for all of us, even the recent arrivals from other areas. Leading, as it does, to the very recent past, the book presents as with a cogent pattern of the historical development of this area and places some of the problems being experienced today in a broader historical context.

"Growing Up in the Illawarra" will be read and enjoyed by anyone with even a passing interest in what has been happening here over the last 150 years.
