## COMPUTER CENTRE CELEBRATES DECENNIUM

On 13 September 1974 the Illawarra Mercury carried this photograph and a story which began:

"The fastest computer on the South Coast can play gridiron, cricket, chess, noughts and crosses, and beat the experts. Vice-Chancellor designate of the University of Wollongong, Professor L.M. Birt, yesterday opened the new computer centre of which the \$750,000 Univac 1100 electronic data-processing system is the main feature."

The Computer Centre Report of October 1974 recorded the first few months of operation as follows:

"Since September 23, 1974, readings have been taken every half-hour between 9.00 a.m. and 5.00 p.m. of the activity of the computer. A simple average of these shows:

Number of student terminals in use	: 3.4
Number of staff terminals in use	: 2.8
Number of batch jobs being run	: 1.4
Number of print files in queue	: 0.8
Number of pages to be printed	: 22

These readings show that on average the computer is processing between seven and eight jobs simultaneously during the day. Of these, between six and seven are controlled from the terminals.

It is interesting to note that the central processor and line printer are coping comfortably with the current

work-load although the memory size is a limiting factor when the machine is busy. The delays in response experienced from time to time by terminal users are caused by constant swapping of jobs from memory to disc and back as different terminals and batch jobs are serviced.

The Library uniscope and teletypes were accepted on October 11.

The GT40, Nova Interface, DCT 1000, Library printer and Metallurgy's paper tape attachment for the teletype are yet to be installed and accepted."

Computer Centre Manager, Mr. Geoff Hamer, comments that:

"during the last ten years the capacity of the main-frame has been increased ten-fold. Multiply the above statistics by ten or so and today's users would recognise a familiar ring to the report - especially the comment about memory/disc swapping."

All of the original Univac equipment has been replaced during the ten years with the exception of the tape drives and the Communications Controller (CTMC).

The Computer Centre reports that no plans are yet in place to update these items but hopes that funds will become available before 1994!

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### TECHNICAL INFORMATION FACILITY

The University Library has joined with UniAdvice to offer the public a new Technical Information Facility.

The computerised data banks of the world are now no further away than a local phone call. UniAdvice has agreed to handle enquiries from anyone who wishes to have the very latest information on the state-of-the-art.

This type of information is held in huge data banks, like the National Library of Medicine in Washington, the Lockheed data base, and many other specialised systems. The information is up-to-date. Often it is so recent that it has not had time to appear in the technical literature.

The University Librarian, Howard Petrie, has extensive experience in accessing these data bases and his partnership with UniAdvice promises to give local industry and professional groups great value for money.

Access to the international data banks has until now only been available to big businesses with the ability to hire the necessary expertise.

The University Library through UniAdvice now has the ability to bring this valuable service to smaller business and to individuals at a price that they can afford.

This new service will help the region to be even more competitive, as it battles for the available resources and expertise to build new products, new industries, and more jobs for Illawarra.

## SAFETY OFFICER APPOINTED

Reg Whitton intends to develop and implement safety and occupational health programmes, effectively organise and contribute to Safety Committee meetings, continually review Acts and Regulations and prepare implementing programmes as appropriate. Additionally, he will appraise and make recommendations on methods of effecting savings in the University's insurance and workers' compensation covers.

## UNEMPLOYMENT IN THE EIGHTIES

A new book "Unemployment in the Eighties" edited by Rob Castle and John Mangan of the University of Wollongong has just been released. The book, published by Longmans, arose out of a conference held at Wollongong University in July 1982. The conference attracted papers from all over Australia from academics, public servants and those involved with the unemployed. The interdisciplinary approach to the problem of unemployment produced a wide range of insights into unemployment. In particular, the conference highlighted the employment problems of labour market sub-groups such as teenagers, women, the disabled and Aborigines.

The papers chosen from the book "unemployment in the Eighties" provide an in-depth analysis of the nature of current unemployment in Australia, its effects on those who are unemployed, as well as reviewing many of the programmes which have been established to alleviate unemployment. The book also explores the changes in macroeconomic policy and in particular industries such as steel and clothing which led to the current high rates of unemployment. The intractable nature of the problems arising out of "Unemployment in the Eighties" provided the stimulus for a new conference on "Work Income and Leisure in the Years Ahead" which will be held at the University of Wollongong on September 28 and 29. It will explore the ways in which future labour market problems can be overcome and unemployment reduced.

Mrs. Susan Simons, a member of the Friends, is offering members a rare chance to join in the huge celebration of the arts and talents of the peoples of the Pacific. The Pacific Festival of the Arts occurs only once every four years and is organised by Pacific Islanders to express the real significance of their traditional arts and the excitement of emerging contemporary forms.

Nearly 2500 Islanders from 26 nations and territories will join with 1,500 local Melanesian artists in New Caledonia and participate in the Festival's extensive programme. The Festival will open in Noumea on 8 December 1984 and decentralise to smaller regional festivals throughout New Caledonia in order to allow a closer rapport between performers and audiences.

Among the highlights of the Festival are daily performances of traditional and contemporary music, dancing and singing; exhibitions and demonstrations of Pacific crafts; symposia on topics of particular interest for Pacific people; a Pacific film festival; book launch and display of Pacific literature; static exhibitions of stamps, shells, costumes, traditional pharmacopoeia, etc., canoe

## EXHIBITION OF JOHN HEARTFIELD PHOTO-MONTAGE POSTERS

Thirty-three photomontages by the German artist John Heartfield will be on exhibition at the University of Wollongong Library from 6 - 20 September.

Most of the works exhibited originally appeared in the German workers' press in Berlin (1927-1933) and Prague (1933-1938). Heartfield escaped to Prague when the Nazis came to power and fled to London when they invaded Czechoslovakia in 1938. He returned to Germany in 1950 and lived in the German Democratic Republic until his death in 1968 at the age of seventy-six.

Bertolt Brecht wrote of Heartfield,

"John Heartfield is one of the most important European artists. He works in a field which he created himself, the field of photomontage. Through this new form of art he exercises social criticism. Steadfastly on the side of the working class, he unmasked the forces of the Weimar Republic driving towards war; driven into exile he fought against Hitler. The works of this great satirist, which mainly appeared in the workers' press are regarded as classics by many, including the author of these lines."

The exhibition has been made available by the John Heartfield Archive of the Academy of Arts of the German Democratic Republic and arranged in co-operation with the Australian-G.D.R. Friendship Society.

## Book of the Week

### THE URBAN ILLAWARRA - A SOCIAL ATLAS

Keys and Wilson \$25.00

This book is the culmination of two years work by IRIS and the University and represents yet another landmark in the documentation of the Illawarra region. As such it is a significant contribution to the level of knowledge we have about our own region. Significantly, it is being published in the 150th year of Wollongong's establishment.

The 'Social Atlas' is a compilation in map form of data gained at the 1981 census: the statistics have been mapped onto outline maps of the region, with an overlay to aid in identification of local names and features. The area covers the urban portion of the City of Wollongong and the Municipalities of Shellharbour and Kiama.

The statistical features are mapped reports on employment (and unemployment) education, income, ethnic and religious composition, demographic composition and change, family and dwelling characteristics and personal mobility. There are 33 maps.

The book is edited by Prof. Murray Wilson and Dr. C.L. Keys with technical direction by Peter Castle and Ian Piper and contributions from John Steinke and Dr Ross Robinson, all of the University of Wollongong.

'The Urban Illawarra - A Social Atlas' is an excellent production and is evidence of what Wollongong can do. Apart from the raw data and the digitized information supplied by Natmap, the work was done in Wollongong, even down to the computer typesetting.
