DEPUTY PM TO ADDRESS ATICCA CONFERENCE

The Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Trade, the Hon. Lionel F. Bowen (MHR) will be the guest speaker at the Australian Tertiary Industries Consulting Companies Association (ATICCA) one day conference to be held at the Northbeach International on Friday, 9th November, 1984.

Mr. Bowen will address the members of ATICCA and guests of Uniadvise over lunch on trade related matters.

Uniadvise will be participating in the International Exposition on Technology Transfer at Brighton at the end of this month and Mr. Bowen's comments on trade matters will be noted with interest in view of the likely future involvement of University consulting companies in overseas trade initiatives.

There will be a Lord Mayoral welcome to the ATICCA members in the Union Common Room at 6 p.m. on Thursday, 8th November. Members of the Friends have been invited to this welcoming party.

Other speakers at the Conference the following Friday will be Professor Ron Johnston, Director of the Centre for Technology and Social Change, and Frank Lees, Chairman of ATICCA.

Twenty ATICCA members will be attending representing most tertiary institutions throughout Australia.

At the last ATICCA Conference in July 1984 the Governor-General, Sir Ninian Stephen, made the following remarks about the role of ATICCA when he gave the keynote address:

"As a nation we have perhaps more than our share of

intellectual talent and research capability. What we seem to need is a greater capacity to garner the fruit of that research through adequate industrial development. One way of improving our performance in this regard is surely by making greater use in industry of the wealth of resources contained in our tertiary institutions, a wealth which is in large part comprised of human resources but includes also facilities and equipment. To establish firmer links between tertiary institutions and industry can help to reduce the time lag between research and development, while at the same time increasing industry's awareness, not so much of the value of advanced knowledge, which is, I suspect, already well appreciated; but of the possibility of applying it to current and planned production."

"It is in this area that tertiary consulting companies have a particular role. The rapid growth in the number and activity of these companies in the last decade has already done much to promote firm links with industry. ATICCA itself has grown from five consulting units in 1975 to twenty-six today and as well the "Technology Park" concept has been given expression in South Australia, with plans also under way both for Western Australia and for the ACT."

"Tertiary institutions, as well as industry, can of course benefit from closer co-operation between the two: for students there are opportunities to learn about the practical application of knowledge outside the context of classroom or laboratory, for academics there is the reward of a closer knowledge of the needs of industry; research projects within tertiary institutions can gain a sharper focus. From all this Australia as a whole can greatly benefit."

UNIVERSITY REGIMENT RAISES THE FLAG

Lt. Col. Michael Hough, RFD, ED., officer commanding the University of New South Wales Regiment, was a guest of honour at the 150th Anniversary Polish Club Flag Raising Ceremony. The ceremony was held on 20 October in the Polish Club Grounds at Gwynneville.

Lt. Col. Hough raised the Australian Flag, followed by Ald. Arkell who raised the Wollongong Flag and Mr. Tony Suryak, President of the Polish Country Club (Wollongong) Ltd., who raised the Polish Flag.

Earlier that day the University of N.S.W. Regiment Band played for two hours at Open Day/Expo and later on that night the Regimental Dinner was held at the

Mountain Tavern Restaurant in Balgownie.

The University of New South Wales Regiment was formed in 1952 and has the specific role of producing Officers for the Army Reserve as well as providing military training for tertiary students. Currently at an effective strength of 420 the regiment will soon be commissioning 30 Officers per year for the Army Reserve, and these officers will be posted to various units in N.S.W. including Armour, Artillery, Intelligence, Signals and Engineers.

Lt. Col. Hough is an ex-Armoured Corp. Officer and as such is the first non-infantry Commanding Officer since 1959.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY NEWSLETTER

A copy of the September edition of the Department of Science and Technology Newsletter is available from the Editor.

One of the articles, on the Teaching Company Scheme, is quoted below:

"A new scheme to improve links between tertiary education and industry can raise industrial performance, according to the Minister for Science and Technology, Mr. Barry Jones.

The Teaching Company Scheme, based on a successful UK programme, is a means of restructuring industry by placing promising researchers from tertiary institutions into industrial companies. Universities, Colleges of Advanced Education and Institutes of Technology will be able to share knowledge with receptive companies through the transfer of graduates. It is expected that practical co-operation and technology transfer will ensure industrial growth and assist the development of research training programmes which are relevant to industry's requirements.

The new initiative, which received \$130,000 in the Budget, will be jointly financed by government and industry. It is expected that five programmes will be operating in early 1985 but success depends on adequate commitment by academic and industrial partners. Graduates working for the participating companies would be jointly supervised by senior company and academic staff. A secretariat is to be established within the Department of Science and Technology to determine guidelines for the scheme. Proposals will be invited in October/November, after publication of final details."

Uniadvice has made a submission for funding under this scheme, on behalf of the University, and is awaiting a response. Any departments interested in participating should contact Peter Sophios, Manager of Uniadvice, on ext. 3076.

Campus Community Interface

KEIRA GREEN CORRIDOR PROJECT

Ald. Frank Arkell, Chairman of the Membership Committee of the Friends, is pleased to report on progress made by the Keira Green Corridor Project. The Project Chairman, David Walker (Member No. 363) convened a meeting on 3 October, 1984, which considered various matters including the list of desirable species for planting between Mt. Keira and the sea.

The Project was initiated in March 1983, jointly by the Friends of the University of Wollongong and Wollongong City Council, and is a part of the greening of the City of Wollongong.

The aims of the Project are to revegetate the area between Mt. Keira Nature Reserve and Puckey's Nature Reserve on the coast, with many thousands of local plant species. In time, this will create a visual impact in the form of a "green punctuation" from the mountain to the sea, and will provide an improved living and working environment for the people of Wollongong in that area.

In this way, we hope to put back some of the forest which clothed the plain 150 years ago.

Some 16 institutions are taking part in the Project, which include all the educational institutions, government departments, private landholders and conservation groups and industry.

Each institution is undertaking its own normal tree planting programmes under the umbrella of the overall Project, so there is no actual extra cost involved.

Some of the tree planting underway or already completed includes the following:-

University of Wollongong - CEP Project involving the planting of 10,000 trees on the lower slopes of Mt. Keira.

Department of Main Roads - the planting of trees at the Porter Street interchange on the Freeway.

South Coast Advanced Enterprises - landscaping surrounding their new building.

Parameadows - the planting of some 200 trees.

Illawarra State Recreation Area - the construction of several walking trails in the area.

It is envisaged that this Project will run for approximately 5 years and that more corridors/green punctuations will be started in ensuing years, running between the escarpment and the coast.

1. NEXT MEETING OF THE AFFIRMATIVE ACTION WORKING PARTY (A.A.W.P.)

2. E.E.O. CONTACT NETWORK

Letters

Dear Editor,

I write in response to Phillip de Lacey's letter (Campus News, October 26, 1984) on his fear of "discrimination against Anglocelt (whatever that means) males" (his quote from Levin/Lewin). Now, given that intelligence is randomly distributed amongst all humans, this means that when one has an underrepresentation of, say women or Aborigines, there is discrimination afoot. This is the case with Australian academic staff. Equal Employment Opportunity is designed to take steps to expose and eventually end such discrimination so as to ensure that society and its institutions draw on the intelligence and creativity of all sectors of the population rather than on merely a restricted pool of privileged people.

Those occupying privileged positions will always try and hold on to their privilege and, in a highly perverted way, cry "discrimination!" when their privilege and self-justifying standards of 'merit' are challenged. Of course no one wants to lower standards of scholarship in a university. But by drawing on the talents of representatives of the whole population and not just a limited sector, we might hope to raise standards rather than lower them. Discrimination is a world-wide phenomenon. White South Africans steadfastly maintain that the majority of the South African population, the blacks, just don't have what it takes to be equal. What the whites have of course is power and privilege rather than a monopoly on intelligence or 'merit'. Anytime there is measurable discrimination pointing to the systematic exclusion of a proportion of the

population, as is the case with Australian universities, I would have thought that all efforts would be made (especially by educators) to take steps to eradicate such discrimination rather than defend it.

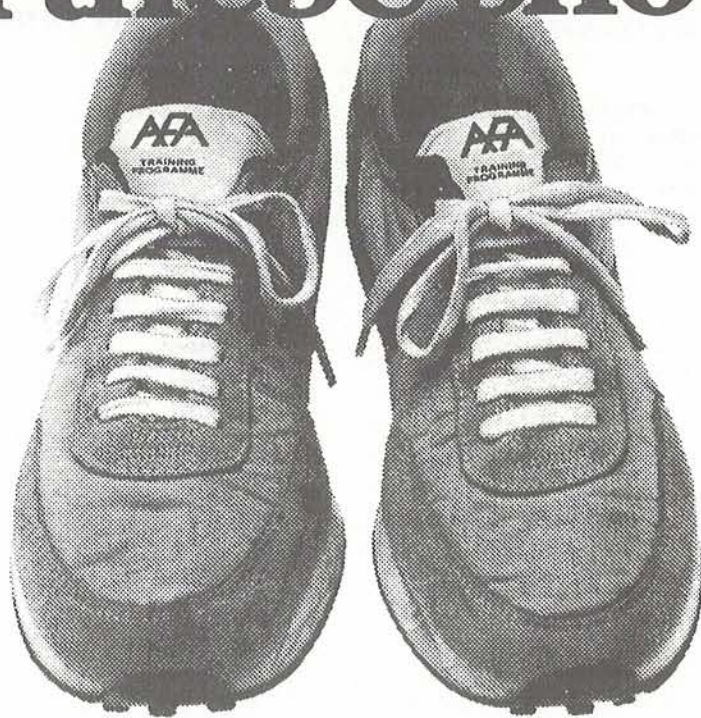
