## "GOOD TO BE BACK" SAYS COLM KIERNAN

Colm Kiernan, Associate Professor in History, has returned to the University after six years as Professor of Australian History in Dublin. He recounts below some memories of his overseas appointment.

'The six years from late 1979 to September 1985 that I spent as Professor of Australian History in the National University of Ireland, University College Dublin, were interesting. I taught Australian History at three levels. There was a course for second-year honours students on 'Australian Nationalism'; another for third-year honours students on 'The Irish in Australia'; and for third-year pass students a survey course on 'Australian History from 1788 Onwards'.

There was considerable interest amongst students at University College Dublin in Australian History. Although all the courses on offer were optional, more than one hundred students each year elected to take the courses. Student interest in Australian History was due chiefly to the fact that most of them had relatives who had emigrated to Australia; and they wished to know something about the country. Some contemplated emigrating or else visiting Australia, which many of them did.

The selection of students by the National University of Ireland, University College Dublin, is vigorous, depending on a harsh points system; and the fees paid are high, amounting to at least \$1,500 per annum per student. In general, their attitude to degree studies is more professional than it is in Australia. They look to the degree as a means to the end of securing employment, always a prime consideration in a comparatively poor country.

While the financial position of academics in Ireland is worse than it is here, they have some other advantages that go some distance to diminish that. While academics in Ireland are paid the same salaries as their British counterparts, the cost of living is higher in Ireland than it is in Britain. Direct and indirect taxation are also higher in financial terms; the years in Ireland were difficult.

Academically, the going in Ireland is easier than it is in Australia. The long bitterly cold winter months are conducive to little except academic work. The island is a small one, so that it is a relatively easy matter to track down research material.

The Department of History in University College Dublin numbers more than thirty full-time members of academic staff with four full-time Professors of History and one Associate Professor. The majority of the academic staff are lecturers and senior lecturers in the ratio of about three to one. The students write less words in assignments, but participate more in tutorial work and in discussion.

The major undertaking of my time in Ireland was to arrange a conference on 'Australia and Ireland 1788-1988' which, when the proceedings appear in print will ensure that the Irish contribution to Australian history will not be overlooked in 1988. Queensland University Press has agreed to publish the proceedings in association with Gill and Macmillan, the Irish branch of Macmillan and Co. It should appear during 1986, being released in Ireland and Australia simultaneously.

My wife and son who were with me — two daughters married in Australia visited us on two occasions — both enjoyed their stay there. Joan completed the Diploma of Library and Information Studies, a post-graduate diploma in librarianship, at University College Dublin. She went on to take a diploma in china restoration. Matthew completed his schooling and was admitted to study medicine in the Irish university system. He applied and was admitted to study medicine in the University of Sydney, where he has successfully completed his first year.

All in all, the time spent in Ireland was not wasted. By the same token, after an absence of six years, it is good to be back in Australia, to benefit from the better weather and from the lower cost of living as well, of course, to renew acquaintance with many friends and colleagues in the University of Wollongong.'

## SUMMER SESSION HOTTER THAN EVER

The 1985/86 Summer Session looks like being the most successful ever held, with over 50 courses being offered. The Session begins on the 9th December, 1985.

Emeritus Professor Geoffrey Brinson, the Academic Co-ordinator for the Session, said that enthusiasm and support for the Summer Session had grown each year since it was introduced enabling the University to offer a greater number and range of subjects than ever before. "The courses cover a variety of topics suitable to students as well as to people who have never been to University," he said.

As in the past, both University level and general interest courses will be available. All courses are open to members of the community as well as to students currently enrolled at the University and other universities and colleges.

Professor Brinson went on to say that "a particular feature of the Session this year is a series of 14 day Creative Arts subjects under the title "Bask in the Arts". Ten courses ranging from Sculpture to Music, Painting to Theatre, including courses for children, will be available. The ten courses will run concurrently so that participants from each course can see the work being done in the other nine. This group of courses start on 9th January, 1986".

Language courses in Spanish, German, Latin and Japanese are also included in the programme for the Session. These subjects have been very popular subjects in pre-

vious Sessions according to Professor Brinson.

The brochure for the Session contains full details of all courses on offer. In addition to those mentioned above, there are courses in Engineering, Social Sciences, Humanities together with Bridging Courses, Law Courses and a weekend course for Mozart lovers. A series of courses are also available for those over 55 under the "College for Seniors" programme.

Some of the most popular courses are likely to be filled quickly and anyone interested in participating in the Summer Session is urged to make early enquiries.

## PUTTING WOLLONGONG ON THE TECHNOLOGY ATLAS

Professor Stephen Hill, a Director of the Centre for Technology and Social Change, recently attended a five day meeting in Bangkok of the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP).

Professor Hill is an expert in the field of technology policy making and is currently involved, with Professor Ron Johnston, in an ASEAN Science and Technology training program. Professor Hill also recently visited the South Pacific on behalf of UNESCO to assess the need there for training in Science and Technology policy.

Professor Hill's extensive involvement in technology research and development led to the ESCAP invitation. The purpose of the gathering was to produce a working draft of a Technology Atlas for Asia and the South Pacific. Before the Atlas can be completed the group must examine its uses and objectives and formulate guidelines to accomplish these.

ESCAP recognition of the TASC expertise is yet another measure of the University's trail blazing work in the area of Science and Technology.

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## General Notices

### CONFERRING OF DEGREES OR DIPLOMAS

Students who expect to complete requirements for their degrees or diplomas at the conclusion of Session 2 or Summer Session must submit their applications for conferral of their award by 30th November 1985. Graduation ceremonies will be held on 7th, 8th, and 9th May, 1986. Application forms are available from Student Enquiries.

Note for Intending Honours Students:

Regulations 15(4) and 15(5) of the Bachelor Degree Regulations impose restrictions in relation to taking out a pass degree and then proceeding to an honours degree.

As these Regulations only came into effect in 1984, students enrolled prior to 1984 will be permitted to take out their pass degrees if they so wish even though they are proceeding to honours. However, they should note that, if they first enrol in the honours course in 1985

or later, Regulation 15(5) will apply, i.e. they must surrender their testamurs for the pass degree before taking out their honours degree.

Candidates proceeding to honours may, of course, choose not to take out the pass degree and thus graduate only after completion of the honours degree. In this case they should not submit an application for graduation until completion of the honours degree.

## Book of the Week

### A STRANGE BIRD ON THE LAGOON

by Margaret Reeves, Boolarong Publications, Brisbane 1985.

This book is noteworthy in a number of ways. It is the first publication of a mature age student, now a graduate of the University of Wollongong. The publishers have produced a very attractive book, particularly in the cover illustration which features 'the strange bird' of the title.

The author has written not so much a family history as a series of interesting and well recounted anecdotes about her Queensland relations. The original Camerons arrived in Australia as Scottish goldrush immigrants. They became well known and successful as graziers in Queensland's Toowoomba district.

The difficulties of Queensland farmers, including drought, prickly pear and the cattle tick, are seen through the eyes of the author's grandparents, parents and other relatives, all of whom provided a wealth of material in diaries, letters and stories of their experiences. Of especial interest is the Camerons' view of the aboriginal inhabitants; unlike the usual cattleman, the Camerons respected the black tribes people and showed clearly how colonial white aggression and intolerance provoked the black reprisals which in turn led to wholesale white cruelties and massacres of innocent blacks.

### BENGT NIRJE'S VISIT TO WOLLONGONG

Hosted by the Unit for Special Education, Bengt Nirje is to visit Wollongong on November 15, 1985. Mr Nirje is a Research Consultant from the Psychiatric Research Centre, University of Uppsala, Sweden, who is an internationally renowned author in the sphere of intellectual disability. Acclaimed as the "Father of the Principle of Normalisation", the theory and philosophy he has disseminated has established the policy base for service provision for people with an intellectual disability in most parts of the developed world.

The movement towards de-institutionalisation of people with an intellectual disability and their integration into education programs can be attributed in large part to his influence on the international scene. In many parts of Australia, present government action to legally and administratively separate provisions for people with an intellectual disability and mentally ill people are based on the early writings and philosophies propounded by Bengt Nirje.

Sponsored by the Australian Government, since arriving in Australia in August Mr Nirje has been a keynote speaker at the joint AGSSOMD/AAMR/AASE Conference in Brisbane and has travelled to every State of Australia, consulting on service delivery for people with disabilities. Wollongong is his last assignment in Australia.

Mr Nirje will present his public lecture at 11 am on November 15 in CRC 108.
