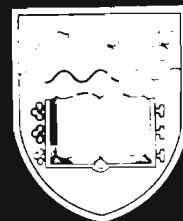

Impressive research on show

THE Graduate Faculty held the University's annual Postgraduate Students' Open Day last month.

An impressive range of research programs were on display which highlighted some of the University's research strengths. The aim of the day is three fold:

- It gives postgraduate students the opportunity to practise explaining their research to lay people and researchers from other disciplines - a talent that is becoming increasingly important when making submissions for funding,

- It allows researchers to identify programs in other departments that may relate to their own interests and thus contributes to a cross fertilisation of ideas, and

- It gives members of the general public the opportunity to see what is involved in university research.

The Deputy Vice-Chancellor Professor Gerard Sutton said when opening the display that the University's status in the next five years would be determined primarily by its profile in research and postgraduate studies.

THE University of Wollongong has an excellent record in providing a safe and secure environment.

Maintaining this environment for students, staff and visitors is a major objective which everybody associated with the University would endorse and support.

In recent years the University has been committed to a program of progressive improvement to security on campus.

The security budget is more than \$750,000 per year. In the past four years we have nearly doubled the size of our security team to permit 24-hour/seven-day coverage; launched a major lighting and pathway improvement

program; and secured the co-operation of local bus operators in improving services.

Each hall of residence has its own bus service to and from the campus.

Under way at present is the installation of an emergency telephone service. Telephones will be placed in strategic external locations on campus with access to security, OOO Emergency and the local taxi service.

The location of these telephones will be circulated widely around the campus.

The University firmly believes that for a community exceeding 11,000 people the safety record on campus compares very favourably with that of other universities and with communities of similar size.

THE Training and Professional Division of the Illawarra Technology Corporation is well underway towards establishing its management courses for middle managers in the Commonwealth, State and Territory governments.

A contract was signed in May this year with the Public Service Commission to design and develop these courses.

Last week Professor Michael Hough, the academic co-ordinator for the courses, conducted a two-day workshop for representatives from most states and the ACT who will act as co-ordinators and trainers.

A pilot program will be conducted during September to November in preparation for the start of the courses early next year.

MOST people have heard of radical experiments in job design at Volvo.

Some have heard of the recent establishment of the Uddevalla assembly factory in Sweden, where they have, in the words of Britain's Financial Times, gone 'Back to the Future'.

In this factory groups of workers assemble whole cars in a form of organisation that goes back to traditional craft days.

The definitive study of all the major Volvo experiments in this area has been written by the Swedish expert Christian Berggren, who will be presenting a paper to the Science and Technology Analysis Research Program seminar at 12.30 on Thursday November 26 in room 19.2003.

The subject of this talk will be 'Lean Production: The End of History?', in which Dr Berggren will take on the recent enthusiasts of the 'Japanese' form of manufacturing and discuss the extent to which all countries (including Sweden and Australia) are necessarily forced to adopt this one global method of production.

THE University of Wollongong is the first institution in Australia to receive prestigious awards from the Minerals, Metals and Materials Society (TMS) of the United States of America.

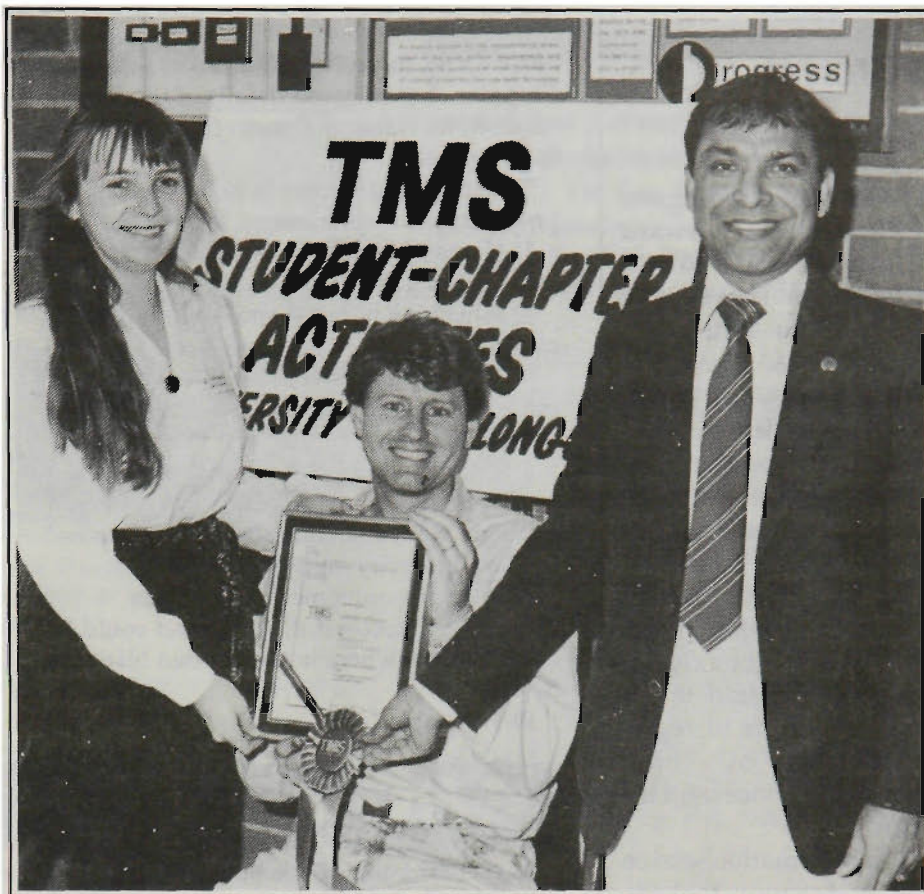
TMS is the largest, non-profit professional materials body in the USA.

It has student chapters at academic institutions in Europe, North America, Asia and the Pacific.

Other institutions to receive such awards are Ohio State University, University of Florida and Stanford University, all in USA.

Two awards, 'the Chapter of Excellence' and 'the Best Chapter 1990' were given in recognition of the scientific and technical activities of the TMS Student Chapter at this university.

'Rite of passage' for theatre opening

THE official opening of the New Theatre at the Western end of campus will be celebrated on October 11 with a concert performed by students and staff from the School of Creative Arts and the Conservatorium, and invited professional artists.

The theme of the opening concert is twofold - a celebration of the event itself, and a celebration of the School of Creative Arts.

The New Theatre is not only usable as a lecture theatre, but also houses the necessary facilities to function as a professional lyric theatre.

This gives the School of Creative Arts an alternative venue for its productions, and provides a space for the University to host visiting artists and theatre companies, both local and from beyond the Illawarra.

Thus part of the focus of the evening will be on the theatre itself, drawing attention to the possibilities it gives the University.

For the School of Creative Arts, the Opening Concert will be a celebration of developing creativity. It will focus on the link it provides between the academic and the world of professional arts. This will be performed as a "Rite of Pas-

sage", describing the growth from student to professional.

Coordinator for the School's involvement, John Senczuk, says the philosophy behind the concert is the metamorphoses "from potential to expertise. For every professional we've invited to participate, there will be a student who has the potential to achieve that expertise."

Consequently, for each item of the concert, students and invited artists will perform together.

Among the professional artists who will be performing are Graeme Murphy and Janet Vernon from the Sydney Dance Company and singer Geraldine Turner.

Invited guests include well-known critics and representatives of Australian art societies, to publicise both the Theatre and the School, and to bring Creative Arts into its context in the art world.

The programme will be compered by Liz Jeneid, Head of the Visual Arts Strand, and Keith Hempton from the Conservatorium.

The New Theatre will be formally opened before the concert at 5pm by the Governor-General the Honourable Bill Hayden AC.

Research fund submission details

PRO Vice-Chancellor, Professor Lauchlan Chipman, has released details of the format required for National Priority (Reserve) Fund Submissions

The following format is to be used in the preparation of submissions:

- 1) Name of Institution(s) involved
- 2) Project Title
- 3) Whether it is Part A and/or Part B application.
- 4) Identification of relationship with one or more of the 1992 priority areas.
- 5) Objective(s)
- 6) Rationale: purpose; correlation between proposal and the University's profile and strategic plan; and commitment to proposal by the University and/or Universities
- 7) Intended outcomes and benefits
- 8) How, if successful, the project could be emulated elsewhere in the Unified National System.
- 9) Timetable

10) Proposed monitoring/ evaluation: costs to be included and identified in Budget

11) Contact Officer and Contact Number

a) within Academic Unit

b) within Planning and Marketing (Mr Canio Fierravanti, tel: 042 - 21 3373)

12) Detailed Budget

a) costs to include: Labour, Equipment, Materials, Travel, Overheads

b) Breakdown of DEET, University of Wollongong, and -if applicable- other institutional or industrial contribution.

Costing should be in 1991 prices. In calculating the University's overheads (power, space etc.) add in a third of total cost (labour, equipment, materials and travel).

To meet DEET Guidelines on presentation, the maximum length for a proposal should be restricted to two pages (excluding the Budget and letters of support from any collaborating bodies).

THE EEO Disability sub-committee would like to draw attention to some of the problems experienced by disabled students and staff on campus.

The indiscriminate riding of bicycles and skateboards by some people poses a danger to the most able-bodied among us. How much more of a threat is posed to people who are less nimble?

A recommendation has been made by the Disability sub-committee that bikes should in future be walked within the campus, due to the dangerous manner in which they are being used.

Concern has also been expressed at the lack of consideration shown to the disabled, particularly when accessing buildings which do not have automatic doors.

Reports have been received of people in wheelchairs being hit by doors due to inconsiderate behaviour by people who enter before them.

The Disability sub-Committee would like to ask staff and students of the University to be more aware of safety issues by considering the needs of the disabled and to be willing to provide them with assistance when necessary.

gong Police. We will continue to work vigorously to maintain, and indeed improve, the level of safety on campus.

However this issue is too important and too wide-ranging to be the sole responsibility of the University's administration; it requires the active commitment of all of us.

Inevitably, as in any community, there will from time to time be incidents we all regard as undesirable, both on and off the campus.

It is in these circumstances that the University's administration needs the commitment and support of the whole University community, both students and staff.

In a practical way, all campus users can help maintain personal security in the following ways:

- Report any suspicious incidents immediately to either Security, Wollongong Police, or the Counselling Service.
- Be sensible, especially at night. Walk with a friend, offer to accompany a friend, use the University Security Escort Service which is available to escort campus people to the car parks at nights.
- Use main pathways where ever possible and the well lit walkways.

■ Use bus services, especially the ones connecting the residences. Timetables are available from the residences.

The Security Service is located at the northern end of the Administration Building.

Security staff are equipped with radio and telephone equipment so that they can be reached quickly.

Computer system planned for port management and planning

THE Illawarra Technology Corporation's Centre for Transport Policy Analysis and the Illawarra Ports Authority have been awarded Commonwealth Government funding under the National Teaching Company Scheme.

The director of the centre, Dr Ross Robinson, said the award had been made to develop PORTINFO - a port management planning system.

The aim of the project is the development of an effective desktop management and planning tool comprising powerful graphics, statistical and modelling components.

The computer package will be capable of reproducing maps, diagrams,

photographs and technical drawings of the port, its berths, navigation channels and buildings and will enable the monitoring of port operations.

Dr Robinson said the ability to constantly update port information will enable port managers to assess port performance and identify port and operational problems as they arise. The computer package, developed at a cost of \$100,000 over two years, will be funded by the National Teaching Company Scheme for an amount of \$50,000.

The balance will be funded by the Illawarra Ports Authority and the Centre for Transport Policy Analysis.
