## 2 R's Workshops for Parents

Dr Brian Cambourne, Head of the newly established Centre for Studies in Literacy at the Institute of Advanced Education plans to offer workshops for parents during October and November. These workshops will be appropriate for parents of primary and secondary school children and would give them the opportunity to help their children develop literacy skills by complementing the school based programmes.

Dr Cambourne said that this will be the first of several

services to the community which he hopes to introduce in Illawarra. Future plans include a diagnostic, remedial, and advisory service to parents, teachers, schools, employers and any other interested clientele.

## New Man Behind University Travel

Mr Bob Stillfried is the Manager of Kennedy's Travel which is owned by the National Bank of Australasia which in turn is merging with the Commercial Banking Company of Sydney - the University's bank.

Bob Stillfried is alive and doing well in one of the most competitive industries around - travel. So with that sort of person to help us, the University staff should be able to smooth out all the niggling problems that can make travelling such misery.

Some giant of antiquity whose name I can never remember once said that "Travel is nature's way of preventing a person from developing a hatred for his home town". This kind of process can be considerably abated by a good travel agent.

Bob Stillfried says that the total market in travel is not expanding, so the competitive edge can only be gained by service (not price-cutting) to the customer. Bob came to Australia from Germany twelve years ago where he had been working for Haperg-Lloyd, a big shipping company which owns 75 travel agencies.

After arriving in Australia he worked in World Travel Service, Melbourne, and Stewart Moffat in Sydney,

both of which are owned by the Swiss Bank. He went from there to the National Bank Travel Service which is the largest fully owned travel retail chain in Australia. Here he was Manager of the Parramatta office and then North Sydney, a large corporate travel office.

Bob Stillfried wants to play a special role in conference organizing through Dr John Panter the Universities Conference Liaison Officer. Kennedy's Travel Service has an excellent relationship with Qantas and local carriers and can obtain quotes from these and any other carriers of choice.

Kennedy's look after all visas, passports, re-entry permits and also provide a check list of things that should be done before travelling. He warns that Immigration and Customs are getting increasingly demanding about all their requirements. He also arranges hire car services. All University dealings are invoiced at 30 days and so the University and indirectly the staff member have leeway in which to pay.

It is to the advantage of the University and the staff to use the same travel agent. This does not mean using the same carrier all the time. The airline can be chosen by the staff member.

## News from Council and Senate

### Affirmative Action Programme for Equal Opportunity.

Council has approved a programme of affirmative action for equal opportunity in employment. The text of the resolution is as follows:

- i) (a) that Council reaffirms that equality of employment opportunity is the policy of the University of Wollongong: selection is to be based on qualifications and ability to perform particular functions regardless of sex, marital status, nationality or ethnic origin;
- (b) that this policy be publicised throughout the University and specifically drawn to the attention of all Heads of Departments;
- (c) ensure that recruitment advertisements and supplementary information make it clear that equality of employment opportunity is University policy;
- ii) that Council endorses the action of the Vice-Chancellor in appointing a Working Party to devise, implement and review policy for an Affirmative Action Programme at the University of Wollongong;
- iii) that the Vice-Chancellor reports to Council the findings of the Working Party and his recommendations on the action to be taken.

### HERDSA WORKSHOP ON DEPARTMENTAL REVIEWS

The Commonwealth Tertiary Education Commission has agreed to support a two-day workshop devoted specifically to departmental reviews and to the skills and problems associated with their conduct. More and more such reviews are being carried out in universities and colleges but there is at present a lack of the information and guidance needed if they are to be effective.

This is the second major initiative in promoting evaluative skills. Last year the CTEC offered financial support for HERDSA to conduct a series of three-day workshops on an introductory kind of evaluation for senior staff. These workshops which proved outstandingly successful have now been held in five capital cities for a total of more than 100 participants.

## NEW GALLERY OPENS

The Graham Gallery at 135 Cordeaux Road, Kembla Heights, 2526 (telephone 715442) will be officially opened by the Lord Mayor at 11.00 a.m. on 17 October, 1982.

The opening exhibition will be a display of ceramics by Wollongong's Karl Preuhs which will run through to 13 November 1982. This will be followed by a Christmas Exhibition featuring work by Joan Meats, Karl Preuhs, Irene Amos and Gino Sanguinetti running from 14 November to 18 December 1982.

The Gallery is named after the Graham Family who have lived in Mt. Kembla for over 100 years. The Gallery will be managed by Coralie Barr, the daughter of Maude Graham.

Coralie Graham Barr has been actively interested in art all her life - is a practising artist and has been Secretary of The Illawarra Society of Artists, Chairman of the Wollongong Art Purchase Committee for 8 years, Secretary of The Lord Mayors Gallery Appeal Committee and the inaugural Trustee of the Wollongong City Gallery.

Coralie Barr studied at the National Art School, Wollongong; the University of New England, Summer School, Armidale; the Desiderius Orban School of Painting, and travelled overseas 1964 to Salzburg, Austria to attend the Oskar Kokoschka Academy (Diploma).

She has exhibited with the Illawarra Society of Artists, the Wollongong Art Purchase Prize Selected, Desiderius Orban School of Painting, the 1973 Archibald Competition, the 1974 Portia Geech Competition, and various mixed exhibitions, Sydney and Wollongong.

She was co-winner in 1963 of the Helena Rubenstein Portrait Competition. Portrait of Ebo Leidtorp. Judged by John Henshaw.

In 1966 she was awarded Highly Commended for a portrait of David Tooze in the Helena Rubenstein Portrait Award Competition, judged by John Santry, and in 1969 she was awarded Highly Commended for portrait of Prudence Bond in the Shoalhaven Art Society Competition, judged by Ivan England.

She is represented in private collections in Australia, America and New Zealand, and in 1974 she was commissioned to paint the past chairmen of the Illawarra County Council.

## THEATRE SOUTH PRESENTS "THE GLASS MENAGERIE"

If you asked Faye Montgomery or Katherine Thomson right at this moment, they would probably tell you with feeling: "Don't put your daughter on the stage!"

In the next two months, they will be two of the hardest-working women in Wollongong.

With two plays running concurrently, and their children's theatre work going all the time, these two Theatre South actresses illustrate what it's really like to work in professional theatre - very busy.

Theatre South opens Tennessee Williams's play, *The Glass Menagerie* on October 15, with Faye Montgomery in the role of Amanda Wingfield, and Katherine Thomson as her daughter Laura. That play runs till November 6.

*The Glass Menagerie* is a modern popular classic. It is the winner of the New York Drama Critics' Circle Award, and is Williams's most often performed play, even out-ranking his other masterpieces like *A Streetcar Named Desire* and *Cat On A Hot Tin Roof*.

On October 24, and until October 31 the actresses will move between their American mother/daughter roles in *The Glass Menagerie* and the very different roles of the many Wollongong working women who make up *A Change In the Weather*, Theatre South's contribution to the state-wide Women and the Arts festival.

*The Glass Menagerie* runs from Wednesday to Saturday: *A Change In The Weather* runs from Sunday to Tuesday (with matinee performances on the days when they have time between school shows).

The two actresses laugh about the fact that they almost seem typecast as mother and daughter. They played the two roles in *Travelling North* in 1981, and in Theatre South's last production, *Diggers' Darling*.

"We've thought about adoption", joked Des Davis, Faye Montgomery's director husband, "but I don't think we could stand the pace. Two workaholics in one family seems enough for us."

Nimrod Theatre Company asked Theatre South to perform *A Change In The Weather* in its Downstairs programme, but the actresses had to say no. The reason? They just didn't have the time.
