PREMIER ANNOUNCES NEW ADVANCED TECHNOLOGY CENTRE

The Premier of N.S.W. has announced the formation of the New South Wales Advanced Technology Centre within the portfolio of the Minister for Industrial Development and Decentralisation, the Hon. Don Day.

The Advanced Technology Centre is dedicated to the development, support and growth of advanced technology in the State.

The Centre represents a focal point for Government contact with private enterprise and other bodies and a means by which Government measures designed to aid advanced technology can be co-ordinated.

The Centre aims to provide:

- * Information on the latest technological developments in Australian and overseas and sources of data.
- * A regular bulletin advising of recent developments and matters of interest in advanced technology in N.S.W.
- * Other information related to the development of New South Wales technology e.g. advanced technology firms operating in N.S.W., R. & D. activity, consultants register, sources of R. & D. etc.
- * Identification of new industry opportunities.
- * Facilitation of technology exchange (locally and through Government offices overseas).
- * Technology forums and seminars.
- * The accelerated development of advanced technology activity zones within the State.
- * Support for enhanced availability of finance to N.S.W. advanced technology industry.
- * Industry liaison by establishing and maintaining contact with industry and other relevant bodies and institutions.
- * Support for the N.S.W. Innovation Centre.
- * Location and establishment advice and assistance.
- * Financial and other material support and assistance through the N.S.W. Advanced Technology Development Fund.

Who qualifies for assistance?

Every enterprise in N.S.W. can potentially benefit from access to the latest technology, and the Centre's information services, as they develop, will be available to established enterprises or those intending to establish in N.S.W.

Financial assistance to foster the development of advanced technology enterprises via the Advanced Tech-

nology Development Fund can be extended to established companies meeting the assistance criteria.
