Chair Of Chemistry Filled

Professor Leon Kane-Maguire has accepted the Chair of Chemistry and is expected to arrive in Wollongong on 1 November, 1983.

Born in Queensland, Professor Kane-Maguire took the University of Queensland Medal in 1964 and holds a Ph.D. from that University. He has held posts in the Northwestern University, U.S.A., University College London, Cambridge University, and University College at Cardiff, Wales.

He is author or joint author of 87 publications and has 5 articles in press.

His major research interests to date have been:

- Mechanisms of nucleophilic attack on coordinated hydrocarbons,
- INDO molecular orbital calculations and synthetic applications of such reactions,
- Mechanisms of nucleophilic attack on coordinated carbon monoxide,
- Mechanisms of ligand substitution in organometallic complexes,
- The coordination chemistry of ruthenium,
- The chemistry of coordinated N-heterocycles,
- Field desorption Mass Spectroscopy,
- The recovery of protein and cellulosic components from sewage,

- Removal of toxic metals from sewage sludge.

Professor Kane-Maguire plans a future research programme which would be of great interest to industry. He will be concentrating on synthetic and mechanistic studies of organometallic reactions of relevance to industrial processes, the utilization of waste materials, and the environmental effects of toxic metals. Some specific future projects are outlined below:

The projected short-fall and increasing cost of crude oil supplies has caused intense interest in alternative sources of liquid fuels and petrochemical feedstocks. Much recent attention has been focussed on the reduction of coal-derived CO/H₂ (synthesis gas) mixtures via Fischer-Tropsch and related reactions. These catalytic processes, both heterogeneous and homogeneous, are believed to involve coordination of CO to a metal centre, causing activation towards nucleophilic attack and reduction by a hydride source. A critical disadvantage in the current design of such catalysts is the lack of mechanistic information in general, and, in particular, the almost complete absence of quantitative information concerning the factors controlling carbonyl ligand reactivity.

Professor Kane-Maguire will be looking for a high degree of interaction with the CSIRO and industry in his Wollongong research programme.

LIBRARIAN APPOINTED

The University's new Librarian, Mr. John Howard Petrie, M.Sc., M.Inst.Inf.Sci., will take up his appointment in January 1984.

Mr. Petrie hails from Nottinghamshire originally, but his present appointment is Sub-Librarian (Systems and Information) at the University of Strathclyde in Stirling, Scotland.

Here he has been responsible for automation and systems developments within the University Library and for the provision of an online information service to academic staff and students.

A range of library housekeeping functions are automated including circulation, cataloguing, serials, short-loan collection. He has developed, and is presently marketing a software system for a micro-computer for assisting on-line information retrieval.

Mr. Petrie has also held posts in the Commission of the European Communities in Italy, Germany and Luxembourg. He is a member of the U.K. Institute of Information Scientists and a member of the ASLIB Council. The latter is the governing body of the Association of Scientific Libraries and Information Bureaux.

His research interests are twofold:

- The application of microcomputers to library and information problems. He is particularly interested in the man-machine interaction using microcomputer terminals for information retrieval. He is writing a review article for J. Doc. on microcomputer applications in Libraries.
- The structure and representation of information in research papers. This work is being carried out with a view to introducing a structure into papers which would improve readability. The developments could also have an impact on the representation of information in future online journals.

THREE CITIES SCHOLARSHIP FUND FOR PAM MILDENHALL

The cities of Canberra, Goulburn and Wollongong have joined together to establish a scholarship fund to assist an outstanding young musician who has contributed greatly to the educational and cultural life of all three cities.

Pam Mildenhall graduated last year with distinction in B.A. (Music) from the Canberra School of Music and also won the prize for the outstanding graduate. Since then she has been teaching at the Canberra School of Music and the Goulburn College of Advanced Education as well as continuing to play a major role in the musical activities of both these cities as a performer.

Pam's roots and family-ties, however, are in Wollongong. She studied singing at the Wollongong Conservatorium and graduated from Wollongong Teachers' College before teaching for some years in local primary schools, prior to embarking on full-time musical studies.

Her many performances in Wollongong have given much pleasure to local music-lovers and she has been associated with almost all Wollongong music groups, including the City of Wollongong Symphony Orchestra and the Illawarra Choral Society. In 1980 and 1981 she was a finalist in the National Operatic Aria Competition organised by the Illawarra Music Club and was the winner of the Olive Brown Memorial Prize in the first

of these contests.

In mid-1983 Pam Mildenhall plans to travel to Europe to extend her experience and training. Arrangements have been made for Pam to study with Eva Brunner in Geneva. The Three Cities Scholarship Fund has been set up to support Pam Mildenhall during this extremely important phase of her musical career. She has already brought great credit to her home city and she will undoubtedly continue to serve as an outstanding ambassador for us all.

CO-ORDINATION OF YOUTH POLICY

The Commonwealth Government is moving to give effect to its commitment to enlarge and integrate the range of options available to youth in education, training and employment.

The Minister for Education and Youth Affairs, Senator Susan Ryan, announced today that the Government had decided that her department would have overall responsibility for the co-ordination of all Commonwealth policies, programmes and proposals to the extent that they affected youth.

Co-ordination would be achieved by a Standing Committee on Youth Policies, chaired by the Secretary of the Department of Education and Youth Affairs, Dr. Peter Wilenski, and would include Second Division Officers from DEYA, and the Department of Employment and Industrial Relations and Social Security, and the Office of the Status of Women.

She said that the Government aimed to:

- . rationalise the various schemes of income support for young people; and
- . relate education and training to changing social, economic and technological conditions.

Options would be prepared for the Government this year in these high priority areas after an initial review of the current education, training, employment and income support programmes.

Senator Ryan said that programmes would be designed to minimise the inconsistencies which forced many young people into unemployment instead of education, and remove the gross inequities of the present system.

The Government had also decided that the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development would be asked to undertake a review of Australia's youth policies and programmes later this year. Senator Ryan said that the Government wished to draw upon international experience in developing new directions. She expected the OECD review to assist the Government in its preparation for the 1984-85 budget.

TERMS OF REFERENCE OF THE JOINT SELECT COMMITTEE ON ELECTORAL REFORM INQUIRY

To inquire into and report upon all aspects of the conduct of elections for the Parliament of the Commonwealth and matters related thereto, including -

- a) public funding and disclosure of funds;
- b) franchise and registration of voters;
- c) voting systems;
- d) polling procedures;
- e) legislation governing, and the operation of, the Australian Electoral Office;
- f) ballot paper format, and
- g) electoral distribution, procedures and systems.

The Committee is required to report to Parliament by 31 August, 1983.
