Schools Beat University In Debate

The first round of the National Bank Travel/Illawarra Mercury Debating Competition got off to an exciting start on 15 June when the Junior Council (representing schools) beat the University Debating Society in a split decision.

University had to defend the statement "That Youth is Wasted on the Young". The University team made a brilliant attempt to lead the Junior Council away from what they obviously saw as an unbeatable position by a series of points about definition and cause and effect. For example "Money is wasted on horse racing" does not mean that the horses waste the money.

Junior Council refused to be lured away from their

fortress and won by a narrow vote of 2 to 1 by the adjudicators.

In the second round Wollongong Jaycees successfully defended the statement "That Australian State Governments Be Abolished" against the Wollongong CYSS team.

The debates are open to the public. The next round will be held on **Saturday, 9 July at 2.00 p.m. in the Illawarra Champions Hotel**. The teams line up as follows:

DAD AND DAVE COME TO WOLLONGONG

Ever since 1980, when he played in Theatre South's first production, The Con Man, people have been telling Geoff Morrell that he'd make a good Dave. The Morrell fans will be able to see Geoff as Dave when Theatre South opens On Our Selection at the Wollongong Town Hall Theatre on July 1.

"Dad" will be played by Harold Baigent who is by no means new to the role. He played the lead in the successful Queensland Theatre Company production in 1981.

As Dad and Dave, Harold Baigent and Geoff Morrell look just as if they'd stepped out of Steele Rudd's book: the long lanky Morrell contrasting beautifully with the stocky gravel-voiced Baigent.

In the production - the biggest Theatre South have mounted so far - Wollongong audiences will see a lot of new faces. Wollongong will see Theatre South's new company members Elizabeth Lord, Pat Craigie, Marina Huddle on stage for the first time. (David Robbins - also a permanent company member this year - has appeared in two other productions for the company). Also working with Theatre South for the first time is local actor Brian Wilcock. And while their faces are very familiar to many Wollongong people, the North Bulli Bush Band will join the company for the first

time, bringing the songs in the show to life, and adding to the gang on the selection.

Peter Duncan who, as Associate Artistic Director for Queensland Theatre Company, directed the 1981 production, will direct On Our Selection for Theatre South, while the Company's Artistic Director, Des Davis will be seen on stage for the second time this year, joining his regular acting company of Geoff Morrell, Faye Montgomery, Paul Hunt and Katherine Thomson.

Theatre South commissioned Adelaide designer Jill Halliday to design set and costumes for the show, and she is at present in Wollongong supervising the finishing touches to the set construction and the making of the costumes.

The show is also a "first" for musical director David Vance: he has directed operas, orchestral concerts, musicals, but never before a show with a bush band.

On Our Selection promises to be a high point in Theatre South's 1983 season, and a good family show for Wollongong audiences.

NATIONAL HEALTH AND MEDICAL RESEARCH COUNCIL

The National Health and Medical Research Council invites applications from appropriately qualified persons for the following Training Fellowships and Research Program Grants:

C.J. Martin Fellowships

C.J. Martin Fellowships are awarded to enable Fellows to train overseas on specific research projects within the biomedical sciences under nominated advisers. The Fellowships are offered to persons who have completed a doctorate and who wish to make medical research a full-time career.

Neil Hamilton Fairley Fellowships

The purpose of the Fellowships is to provide training overseas in scientific research methods including those of the social and behavioural sciences. The Fellowships are not restricted to medical and dental graduates.

Australian Post-Doctoral Fellowships

The purpose of the Fellowships is to provide training in basic research within the biomedical sciences in Australia and to enable Fellows to work on research projects under nominated advisers. The aim is to encourage persons to make medical research a full-time career.

Australian Applied Health Sciences Fellowships

The Fellowships are designed to provide training in scientific research methods within Australia including those of the social and behavioural sciences. The Fellowships are not restricted to medical and dental graduates.

Research Program Grants

A Program Grant is designed to provide guaranteed support over five years for an outstanding individual scientist working as the accepted leader of a research team that normally comprises several independent scientists. To be eligible for Program Grants applicants must have had previous support from the Council averaging not less than \$100,000 per annum over the last six years.

NOTICE FOR CONTRIBUTORS TO THE STATE SUPERANNUATION FUND

Pay Period Ending 30th June 1983 - No State Superannuation Fund Contributions.

Contributions to the State Superannuation Fund are calculated on the basis of thirteen periods each year. Most Fund members receive two fortnightly salary payments within each superannuation period and half of the periodic contributions are deducted from each of those payments.

A salary payment free of superannuation contribution occurs when three fortnightly pay days fall within a superannuation period and deductions are only required in respect of two of those three paydays. This will shortly apply to Fund members whose paydays will be 2nd, 16th and 30th June, 1983; these paydays fall within the thirteenth superannuation period this year.

To ensure that contributions are not overpaid during the abovementioned period, payroll arrangements have been made so that there will not be any normal or reserve-unit contributions deducted on the payday of 30th June, 1983.
