## Technological Change

Technological Change is the subject of the University Day Address to be given on the eighth anniversary of the University of Wollongong.

The Address will be delivered on Friday, 12 August, in Pentage 1 at 6 p.m. by Dr. W.J. McG. Tegart, the Secretary of the Commonwealth Department of Science and Technology.

The Address will be followed at 7 p.m. by the 2nd Graduates Reunion Dinner in the Union Hall. The 2nd reunion will emphasize the 1979 and 1980 graduating classes. Tickets are \$14 each for a magnificent smorgasbord, wine and entertainment by Theatre South. Tickets are available at the Union.

The Guest Speaker, Dr. Tegart, is a graduate in Metallurgy from Melbourne and Sheffield Universities. He has held posts in the C.S.I.R.O., the University of Sheffield, Northwestern University Illinois, the College of Aeronautics at Cranfield U.K. and the Broken Hill Proprietary Ltd.

He is a Fellow of the Institution of Metallurgists, the Australian Academy of Technological Sciences, the Australian Institute of Energy and the Australasian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy.

Dr. Tegart holds the Silver Medal of the Australasian Institute of Metals and the Annual Medal of the Australian Institute of Energy.

### OVERSEAS EXPERTS IN BULK SOLIDS HANDLING VISIT UNIVERSITY

Several overseas experts in various facets of bulk solids handling are coming to Australia for the International Conference on Bulk Materials Storage, Handling and Transportation to be held in Newcastle on 22 to 24 August, 1983. This conference is being organised by the Institution of Engineers Australia by its Materials Handling Panel; Dr. Peter Arnold of the Department of Mechanical Engineering is a member of that Panel.

A number of the overseas visitors will be coming to Wollongong in the period 8 August to 9 September, 1983 to have discussions with members of the Bulk Solids Handling Research Group and, in some cases, to lecture to mechanical engineering students taking the bulk solids electives. ## ROBINSON JOINS INTERNATIONAL GROUP

Dr. Ross Robinson, Reader in the Department of Geography, has been invited to join a study team undertaking a major project on Australian-ASEAN shipping. The project is sponsored by the Australian Government in cooperation with the ASEAN Governments (Thailand, Singapore, Malaysia, Philippines and Indonesia) and is the first major study of Australian-ASEAN shipping practices and policies undertaken. It is expected that the study will provide an important basis for Australian Government policy in respect of shipping and maritime development between Australia and the five countries.

The team comprises maritime economists from Monash University, the Office of the Director General of Transport in Western Australia, the Universities in the ASEAN countries. Dr. Robinson expects to visit the major ASEAN ports later in the year and will present preliminary findings at a workshop in Singapore in November.

The study will examine most aspects of shipping relations between Australia and the five countries. It will focus especially on the costs of providing shipping services, trade flows and trade development, shipping policies and the development of national shipping lines and services. Dr. Robinson's responsibility relates particularly to the problems of efficient port handling and port development policies, in the ASEAN countries and in Australia.

For Dr. Robinson the project represents a continuation of earlier work in the Asian region. In November 1980 he presented a paper on 'Containerisation in the ASEAN region: a note at the Third Container Technology Conference, London.

## LANGUAGE BARRIERS STUDIED

Michael Morrissey and Joanne Palzer of the Centre for Multicultural Studies have recently released an important study entitled "English Language Learning in the Illawarra".

The Minister for Immigration and Ethnic Affairs, Mr. Stewart West, made the following comments on the report.

"An area of particular concern to the Government is the provision of English language instruction in the work place," he said.

"The study, 'English Language Learning in Illawarra', highlights the magnitude of the urgent need for more classes to help people learn the English needed in their jobs."

"The studies would influence the future of the Adult Migrant Education Program (AMEP)".

Mr. West said most of the studies, commissioned under the AMEP research and evaluation program, would be published as a special series by the Government.

## CENTRE FOR MULTI-CULTURAL STUDIES

Dr. Ron Witton has arrived on campus to take up his position as the new Head of the Centre for Multicultural Studies. He has had a variety of experience in the field of multiculturalism. Dr. Witton, aged 30, was born in Sydney of immigrant parents - refugees from Hitler's Germany - and gained his B.A. and M.A. at Sydney University in the field of Indonesian and Malayan

Studies. He then gained his Ph.D. in Sociology and Southeast Asian Studies at Cornell University, New York, before becoming Lecturer and then Senior Lecturer in Sociology and American Studies at Flinders University, South Australia, from 1971 to 1978. Between 1979 and 1981 he worked for TAFE in South Australia on ways of making further education more accessible to non-English speakers in Australia and was also the South Australian and Northern Territory co-ordinator of a Schools Commission survey of Ethnic Schools. Prior to coming to Wollongong University, he spent 18 months as a visiting lecturer at the University of the South Pacific, Fiji, where the multiracial nature of Fijian society became an area of particular interest to him.

With his appointment, the Centre for Multicultural Studies enters a new phase. It is now at a new location at 53 Northfields Avenue, opposite the University Union, and approval has been granted for the appointment of two new members of staff. The Centre has a brief from the University not only to develop a graduate teaching program, but also to continue to solicit outside research in the pressing area of making institutions in Australia more responsive to the multicultural and multilingual nature of the Australian population.

Since arriving on campus, he has already taken part in research in Adelaide as part of the Centre's \$20,000 research grant from the National Advisory Council on the Handicapped. This research focuses on the adequacy of Commonwealth provisions of services to Australia's disabled population who are of migrant background.

Dr. Witton is particularly interested in relating the Centre's research to activities and programs developed by ethnic organizations in Australia, at a local, state and national level as well as having input to policy reformulation presently occurring in Australia at a national level. To this end the fact the local federal member is also the new Minister of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs potentially gives the Centre a unique role in this. Dr. Witton stresses that he welcomes contact with ethnic organizations and individuals working in the field of multiculturalism and sees the Centre as an active link between the University and the community. In particular, he is interested in hearing from people working in the multicultural area who might be interested in taking part in the Centre's graduate program next year.

## NEW EDITOR FOR PSYCHOLOGY JOURNAL

Chairman of the Department of Psychology at the University of Wollongong, Associate Professor Linda L. Viney has been appointed editor of 'The Australian Psychologist', one of the official journals of the Australian Psychological Society.

The honorary appointment, which was officially approved in November 1982, will continue for three years and may be extended for a further two years.

The first issue of the journal under the editorship of Professor Viney will be published this November and, in the continuing policy of the journal, will contain articles dealing with research in various areas of applied psychology.

Published three times a year, the journal has a circulation of 4000 including an overseas readership.

### WORLD FAMOUS AUSTRALIAN WILDLIFE ARTIST TO LECTURE IN WOLLONGONG

Charles McCubbin, grandson of the famous Fred, is coming to Wollongong for the weekend 6th&7th August. Mr. McCubbin is to be guest lecturer in Wild-life Illustration in the School of Creative Arts at the Institute of Advanced Education, Wollongong University.

He will be taking students into the rainforest on Mount Keira and teaching in studios at the University.

Charles McCubbin is one of the world's greatest illustrator painters. His book on the Butterflies of Australia is one of the most beautiful of its kind, and his collection of designs of butterflies has appeared on the new Australian National stamp series.

Mr. McCubbin walked the Simpson desert from North to South a few years ago, and has offered to give an illustrated lecture on his adventures in Wollongong City Gallery on the evening of 7th August (Sunday) at 7.30 p.m. This ought to be a sell-out in view of the magnificence of his work and experiences! ### OBITUARY - JOHN CRABB

John Crabb, who was born in the United Kingdom on 30th March 1927, died suddenly on 22nd July 1983 at Hospital. He was a PhD student in HPS at this University and held a Commonwealth Post Graduate Research Award. He previously held a visiting lectureship in Accountancy during 1980. John had held positions as adviser to the United Nations, to the International Development Bank, and to the Hong Kong Government. He had published two books and about 50 papers. Earlier this year he was invited to China and Japan to launch his second book which dealt with micro-processors and the new technology and their impact on our lives. Soon after his return he suffered a heart attack after nearly being run down by a car at Kiama where he and his wife, Mireille, lived. He was working on his PhD right up to the last. It was a study on the introduction of micro-processors into small business industries. This area of investigation is highly relevant to Australian society where computer technology is playing an ever-increasing role. His loss will be greatly felt, particularly by members of the HPS and Accountancy Departments.
